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An eventful year for PH mining industry

VARIOUS metals are vital in any civilization because it supports several industries that preserve their longevity and survivability. Without these metals, societies wouldn't be able to enjoy the comforts they have today.

It's this very reason why governments across the globe invest heavily in the mining industry and secure the ores they need to build infrastructures, technology, and more. This 2022, the Philippines fortified its mining efforts to get the most from it.

Early this year, the Philippines' local industry regulator shared that the coun-

try will expect a dozen new metal mines in commercial operation, most of them being nickel projects. Moreover, the Philippine Mines and Geology Bureau reported that the country's nickel production totalled 386,359 in the previous year, with a 17 percent increase and the highest in six years.

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Global Ferronickel Holdings Inc. president Dante Bravo believes the additions to nickel mining would increase the country's ore production, even though existing local nickel miners were already performing outstandingly.

However, local mining companies still faced challenges due to rising fuel prices, inflation, labor shortages, supply chain bottlenecks, and increasing freight rates.

Nevertheless, local mining companies persevered and kept the industry at a steady positive rate.

During the fourth quarter of the year, Department of Environment and Natural Resources Secretary Maria Antonia Yulo-Loyzaga expected the mining sector to remain on its projected course with an upbeat performance.

Since the beginning of the year, the value of Philippine metal production has been on the up-side. It implies the industry's recovery from inconsistencies in the rules governing the mining sector.

MGB also reported earlier that metal production reached P48.61B in the first quarter, representing an expansion of 36.21 percent. The value of metal production surged by 39.42 percent to P112.66B during the first semester. By September, the MGB said the local metallic mineral production grew by 29.21 percent to P175.61B.

The local government is also looking at the mining sector's potential to drive the country's economic growth through more small-scale mining sites. According to MGB, "it is the government's strategy [for] an orderly, systematic, and ecologically balanced administration and disposition of small-scale mining areas."

Yet aside from intensifying mining production, the country also enforced strict mining laws throughout the year, under the initiative of President Ferdinand "Bongbong" Marcos Jr.

He recently ordered the DENR to reinforce its regulatory powers on small and large-scale mining to ensure that standards are updated and that mining firms strictly implement their respective safety and health programs for workers.

Marcos certified several bills on mining safety as urgent to prevent losses during their time on the field.

Indeed, 2022 has been an eventful and fruitful year for the Philippines' mining industry. Something which local players are ecstatic to see despite inflation, the pandemic, and other struggles.

The Philippines' mining industry is eyeing to enter 2023 with a positive outlook, thanks to its outstanding performance in 2022. Besides fortifying its metal production, from common ores to metallic minerals, it also aims to welcome small-scale players while securing the miners' safety.

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Machine turns food waste to water

The ORCA technology digests food wastes into earth-friendly water in 24 hours

SUBIC BAY FREEPORT – Subic Bay Metropolitan Authority Chairman and Administrator Rolan Paulino recently revealed that a company in this premier freeport is distributing a machine that produces earth-friendly water from food wastes.

During his tour at Dunbrae Philippines Inc. located inside the Subic Gateway Park, Paulino was shown the ORCA Machine being distributed by the company.

Dunbrae officials presented to the chairman how it turns food waste into earth-friendly water.

According to Dunbrae general manager Reida Ibabao, natural microorganisms, combined with the action of the ORCA technology, digests food wastes into earth-friendly water in 24 hours.

“It’s compact, efficient, clean and undeniably green,” the company said.

Ibabao said his company is the sole distributor of the machines made in Canada. She said that companies in the Philippines have already purchased these waste disposers and are currently utilizing it as part of their sustainability efforts.

Paulino lauded the company’s efforts in reducing food waste saying that if every food-related company in Subic Freeport will utilize the machine, a drastic reduction in the food waste hauled here is expected.

‘Our technology creates meaningful cost savings for customers while diverting food waste from landfills.’

“The ORCA machine is being utilized in dozens of countries, why can’t we use it here? Since Subic Bay Freeport is Central Luzon’s number one tourism destination, the area produces a lot of food wastes that need to be addressed,” he said.

He added that if there is an ORCA machine in every major restaurants here, these will drastically reduce the tons of waste disposed in the landfill and reduce the cost of collecting and hauling trash bags to the dumpsite.

Ibabao said the water that the ORCA machine produces can be safely repurposed or returned to the environment once treated.

“Our technology creates meaningful cost savings for customers while diverting food waste from landfills. Landfill diversion reduces both carbon dioxide and methane gas emissions. ORCA also helps to increase labor efficiency by keeping employees in the kitchen and reducing the number of strains and sprains,” she added.

With four different model sizes, ORCA can accommodate any kitchen’s food waste volumes and space limitations.



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SMALL NATIONS CHAMPIONED

PRESIDENT Ferdinand "Bongbong" R. Marcos Jr.'s resolute push in his just-concluded trip to Brussels for wealthy nations in Europe and the rest of the First World to compensate high-risk countries for "loss and damage" from planet warming has buttressed his already growing stature as the champion of developing economies seeking compensation from the world's heaviest carbon polluters largely responsible for rising temperatures and its consequent climatic disasters.

Camarines Sur Representative LRay Villafuerte said President Marcos, who had made climate change one of his key advocacies in all of his overseas trips since assuming office last June 30, has "pushed the envelope in his just-concluded journey to Belgium by pitching for more concrete guidelines on how affluent economies that are the

world's biggest greenhouse gas (GHG) emitters could compensate highly vulnerable economies like the Philippines that have contributed little to planet heating for their 'loss and damage' resulting from the increasingly deadlier climate-induced natural disasters."

"In making such a pitch for loss-and-damage compensation, whose concept was agreed upon by participant-countries in last month's COP27 summit in Egypt, President Marcos has focused global attention anew, whether he likes it or not, on his rising international stature as the champion or unofficial spokesman of the world's most vulnerable economies that are seeking climate justice from wealthy nations like those in Europe that have grown even richer from being the heaviest carbon polluters," Villafuerte said.

The congressman was referring to the landmark global accord on a "damage and loss" funding mechanism for rich nations to compensate econo-

mies hardest hit by more frequent natural calamities, which was reached at the end of the 27th session of the Conference of the Parties (COP27) to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC).

This amount is intended for financing reconstruction efforts, among others, in developing economies like the Philippines whose physical and social infrastructures have been damaged by the increasingly worsening natural calamities wrought by climate change.

COP27 was held on November 6 to 18 at the resort city of Sharm el-Sheik in Egypt.

Villafuerte, who is president of the National Unity Party (NUP), lauded Mr. Marcos for "earning an early win on his climate justice advocacy while still in Brussels after getting the support of European Council (EC) President Charles Michel on his proposal to quickly operationalize the green fund on climate change and the 'dam-

age and loss" policy."

"We couldn't agree with you more," Michel was quoted in an Office of the Press Secretary (OPS) statement as having told President Marcos after the latter's call at the ASEAN-EU working luncheon for more concrete financing guidelines on the loss-and-damage compensation mechanism that was arrived at last month at the COP27 summit.

At the Association of Southeast Asian Nations-European Union (ASEAN-EU) working luncheon with EU officials and businesspersons in Brussels, President Marcos called on these European leaders to step up their aid for climate change-vulnerable developing economies such as the Philippines.

"Climate action is particularly important to the Philippines," Mr. Marcos said, especially because the country is "regarded as probably one of the most, if not the most vulnerable countries in the world to the effects of climate change."



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Aboitiz: Nuclear energy needs gov't participation

Aboitiz Power Corp. said developing nuclear energy in the country needs active government participation to ensure that only the best technology will be deployed.

"I don't need to be specific, but it needs government participation, anyone who wants to develop nuclear power," Aboitiz Power president and chief executive officer Manny Rubio said.

Rubio pointed out that since nuclear is the only carbon-free alternative to coal or other fossil fuels for its baseload capacity, any developer should only tap the most effective technology for its development.

"Nuclear energy is a baseload so when technology is effective, nuclear energy can be a viable power source. We want to simply just say that we need a variety of technology for this technology," Rubio said.

Carlos Aboitiz, chief corporate services officer of Aboitiz Power, also noted that nuclear power development has become a global conversation, which means that many power generators globally see the benefit of such an energy source.

"Other power industry giants have signified their interest to develop nuclear in the country to generate additional power, especially during summer months when demand is historically higher.

Early this month, the Manila Electric Co., the country's largest power distributor, said it applied for a United States Trade and Development Agency grant to bankroll a development study on small modular reactors or SMRs.

The government has long been exploring nuclear power as a viable energy source in line with the global push to reduce fossil fuel use due to its hazardous carbon emissions.
