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DENR: Small-scale fishers to benefit from demolition project in Manila Bay

Small-scale fisherfolk will benefit from the rehabilitation and dismantling of illegal fishing structures in the Manila Bay, Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) Usec. Benny Antiporda said Wednesday, Sept. 8.

Antiporda made the assurance as several fisherfolk and fishers' group PAMALAKAYA raised concerns and opposed the department's project by saying that at least 15,000 individuals living in the coastal municipalities, whose livelihood depends on the Manila Bay, would be affected.

"The law is giving us 15 kilometers from the shoreline what is called the 'municipal waters.' These municipal waters are usually the ones where illegal structures are installed, which occupy space and prevent our small fisherfolk from fishing nearby. They even have to sail farther," he said in Filipino in a press briefing.

"So small fisherfolks, those who use small boats, would be the first ones to benefit from the dismantling project. Would you imagine what would happen to the municipal waters once we demolish the illegal structures within one kilometer or a few hundred meters from the shoreline? They can finally fish easily," he added.

On Monday, Sept. 6, several fishermen trooped to the DENR office in Quezon City to oppose the department's activity, which was scheduled to start on Tuesday, Sep. 7.

PAMALAKAYA chair Fernando Hicap said "rehabilitating Manila Bay should be to restore its marine resources for the benefit of small fisherfolk. But the DENR's thrust says otherwise" as he believed that the fishing structures in the area, which were tagged by DENR as "illegal," "do not pose any pollution or harm to marine biodiversity" as compared to "industrial and commercial establishments rampantly discharging solid and liquid wastes into the water."

Antiporda, in the same briefing, also clarified that mussel and oyster farmers, as long as they are legally operating, would have nothing to worry about as only illegal fishing structures would be dismantled.

"Yan pong tahungan ay pinapayagan po iyan sa kautusan po ng atin pong Korte Suprema doon po sa mandamus na ang shellfish po ay pinapayagang. Ika nga ay magparami ng shellfish diyan sa ating Manila Bay (Mussel cages are allowed based on our Supreme Court mandamus. The higher court is even encouraging us to grow more)," he said.

According to Antiporda, at least 271 illegal aquaculture structures in Cavite City are set to be demolished, while 97 in Kawit and two in Noveleta.

The activity, which was supposed to start Tuesday, was postponed on the same day as the department would still hold a meeting with various agencies to "finalize the composition of the teams which will undertake the actual marking of illegal structures for demolition and to discuss the schedule for the said activity," DENR's CALABARZON (Cavite, Laguna, Batangas, Rizal, Quezon) office said in a Facebook post.

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DENR defends plan to dismantle 370 'illegal' fish pens in Cavite amid opposition

Metro Manila (CNN Philippines, September 8) — The Department of Environment and Natural Resources said small-scale fishermen stand to benefit from its plan to demolish "illegal" fish pens and cages in Cavite, even as a fisherfolk group warned that thousands of people will lose their livelihood.

In a briefing on Wednesday, DENR spokesperson Benny Antiporda said the unauthorized aquaculture structures only help big companies and the workers they pay, to the detriment of small fishermen.

"Nung itinayo po 'yan, nawalan po ng espasyo para makapangisda ang ating maliliit na mangingisda, at kailangan pang bumiyahe sila ng 15 kilometers away from the shoreline," Antiporda said.

[Translation: These structures take up space that would have benefited small fishers, forcing them to travel 15 kilometers away from the shoreline.]

The bamboo poles from the pens and cages, he added, also contribute to pollution in Manila Bay, as they are washed away during storms. According to Antiporda, 370 of these structures will be destroyed: 271 in Cavite City, 97 in Kawit, and two in Noveleta.

He also said there is no truth to reports that mussel farms or "tahungans" will be dismantled, assuring that mussel growers with permits will be allowed to operate.

The impending demolition by the DENR has been heavily opposed by some fishermen and activists, including fisherfolk group Pamalakaya which believes it is a "precursor to a massive reclamation plan in Cavite."

The group said the demolition will wipe out their livelihood and displace their communities. It also accused the DENR of using the Manila Bay rehabilitation program to justify its "unjust and anti-fisherfolk" plan.

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Exporters seek refund after DENR relaxes wastewater standards

ELECTRONICS EXPORTERS fined for noncompliance with wastewater standards are now asking the government for reimbursements after the rules were relaxed.

Semiconductor and Electronics Industries in the Philippines, Inc. (SEIPI) President Danilo C. Lachica in a Viber message on Wednesday said the copper standard on industry wastewater was reverted to one PPM or parts per million of total copper starting in the third quarter.

The Department of Environment and Natural Resources' (DENR) general effluent standards, or standards related to liquid waste discharged into rivers or seas, sets parameters for the concentrations of copper released into water.

The standards were issued to preserve the country's fresh, brackish, and marine waters by preventing water pollution.

The electronics exporters industry group had been appealing to the government for a review of these revised wastewater guidelines that tightened the copper standard to 0.04 PPM of dissolved copper. SEIPI earlier said the standard was comparable with Thailand's drinking water, not treated industrial wastewater.

Mr. Lachica told the ABS-CBN News Channel on Wednesday the Trade department, the Philippine Economic Zone Authority (PEZA), and Anti-Red Tape Authority (ARTA) had helped the industry group with its appeal.

"The only concern that we have right now would be for those who were given fines and penalties for not complying with the revised standard, we're appealing to the DENR to reverse that," he said.

"Initially, the response was they can't because it's already been collected but we encourage them (to reimburse)."

SEIPI is retaining its 7% growth target for the year, which is backed by a rebound in demand in the industrial, mobility, consumer, and medical electronics sectors.

Mr. Lachica in a general membership meeting last month cited a mismatch between industry skill demand and employee training to keep up with global technology shifts, noting that electrical and computer engineering graduates have been declining. — **Jenina P. Ibañez**

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Sitio Mahayahay in Pardo, Cebu City considered hazard area for landslides, rockslides

CEBU CITY, Philippines — The Mines and Geosciences Bureau in Central Visayas (MGB-7) has marked Sitio Mahayahay in Barangay Poblacion Pardo, Cebu City as a hazard area prone to landslides and rockslides.

In a letter to Pardo Barangay Captain Arcadio Araw-araw, III, the MGB-7 said they inspected Sitio Mahayahay after a rockslide was reported in the area on September 5, 2021, amid torrential rains.

Photos of the incident reached MGB-7 of the situation in Sitio Mahayahay and a technical team was deployed to assess the area.

As a result of the assessment, MGB-7 has raised the hazard level of the area from "moderate" to "high to very high" due to the recent rockslide with anthropologic factors.

"Limestone boulders with diameter of about 2 meters are reportedly observed along the steep sloe cut along the newly opened road leading to Barangay Toong. The said incident reportedly triggered by the road-cutting opening of the road and was further aggravated by the moderate to heavy rainfall that affected the area in the last few days prior to the rockslide. At least 9 households are reportedly situated along the same slope face," said Ronnel Dalugdog, MGB-7 geologist.

Based on the report on the field investigation conducted by technical personnel almost a year ago on September 14, 2020, the subject road opening area is located on the flank of a mountain in an area characterized by generally undulating terrain.

It is also underlain by calcerous rock formation, which when highly weathered, may yield clay that may aggravate ground and slope movement.

In the recent observations of the MGB-7, they recommended to the barangay to monitor and observe the presence and progression of mass movement especially after rainy movements. The barangay is encouraged to immediately clear the area should a landslide or rockslide occur in the area to prevent further aggravation of the soil.

The barangay is also encouraged to set up a designated evacuation site or relocation site should there be a need to relocate or evacuate residents to a safer area for immediate or long term safety.





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"Considering the prevailing weather system affecting the region, the Mines and Geosciences Bureau Regional Office VII, hereby advise your good Office to initiate readiness measures for potential landslide occurence in areas dtermined to have moderate, high and very high susceptibibilities to landslide," said MGB-7.

The MGB-7 also highly encourage preemptive evaciation when the Philippine Atmospheric Geophysical and Astronomical Services Administration (PAGASA) raises a heavy rainfall forecast over the area.

"Attention should be focused on the settlement areas or communtities located at the foot of the steep slopes which could be burried by potential landslide debris," said MGB-7. /bmjo





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Moalboal conducts control operations to stop crown of thorns outbreak

MANDAUE CITY, Cebu — The Municipality of Moalboal in southern Cebu has been conducting underwater operations to stop the outbreak of the crown of thorns starfish.

Rolie Alderite, the town's tourism officer, said they have been injecting acetic acid (vinegar) solution on the COT starfish found in the town's three coastal barangays namely: Basdiot, Tuble, and Saavedra.

Alderite said the move came after receiving reports of the 'alarming' presence of the COT starfish, locally known as "dap-ag," that would eat hard coral polyps, eventually killing them. Saying corals are one of their local attractions, the tourism officer said they have to do preventive measures to save their marine tourist spots.

Moalboal is known for its white-sand beaches and dive spots.

Apart from injecting acetic acid which could kill the COT within 24 to 48 hours, removing them from coral reefs and burying them in the land is another method to eradicate the COT.

"Mao na nga to make it balance, atong gihimoan og pamaagi like atong gina control through injecting or collecting the crown of thorns," he said.

Alderite said coral beds in the said barangays are not far from the shore. Divers, tourists, and snorkelers could already see them around five to 10 meters during high tide.

The first operation was conducted on August 28, 2021, by the Moalboal Underwater Task Force (MUTF), which is composed of personnel from the local Philippine National Police (PNP), Philippine Coast Guard (PCG), municipal tourism, Bantay Dagat, as well as dive operators and volunteers.





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They will be having their second operation this Sunday, September 12, with additional personnel from the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR), Cebu Police Provincial Office (CPPO), and other volunteers.

While they allow volunteers to participate in the operations, he emphasized that only certified drivers are allowed, stressing that they cannot let anyone join without certification.

More operations will be conducted until the COT starfish outbreak in the town will be controlled. Alderite clarified that it could be considered as an outbreak when there are 30 or more COTs in one hectare of coral bed.

Though it is not yet the season for the laying of eggs of the starfish, the tourism officer said that their sheer number and sizes alone is already a threat to the town's tourism industry. He also noted that the appearance of the nocturnal starfish is quite appalling. /rcg

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China to support local medical waste management

AMBASSADOR Huang Xilian recently revealed that the Chinese government will provide \$1.07 million to support medical waste management efforts in the Philippines during the pandemic.

In a Facebook post, Huang said the project, funded under the South-South Cooperation Assistance Fund, aims to "effectively improve" the country's response to the health emergency in the areas of waste management and preparedness.

Specifically, the envoy said the project would provide "appropriate health-care waste treatment facilities" to two hospitals, as well as provide capacity-building on waste management and knowledge sharing from China's health-care professionals, local government staff, and other essential service providers. "I would like to extend my deep appreciation to UNDP [United Nations Development Programme] and relevant government departments of the Philippines for all the efforts on this project," he said.

It was not yet mentioned, however, which hospitals will benefit from the aid.

Late in July, Huang said China will "donate more and [substantially] increase" the supply of vaccines to the Philippines.

In 2010 the UNDP and Chinese government signed the agreement on strengthening South-South cooperation, which marked the first time China signed an agreement with a multilateral partner, according to the UN agency.

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E-commerce platforms urged to reduce plastic use, explore sustainable alternatives

MANILA, Philippines (Updated 12:44 p.m.) — As the holiday season draws near, environmental group Greenpeace called on the country's largest e-commerce companies to reduce the use of unnecessary plastic packaging and adopt sustainable alternatives.

More and more people are shopping online than ever before because of the COVID-19 pandemic. E-commerce giant Lazada reported that Filipinos spent 420 million minutes shopping on the platform during its 12.12 sale last year, while Shopee said that 12 million items were immediately sold in the first 24 minutes of the sale.

The significant increase in e-commerce sale has led to an overwhelming amount of plastic waste, most of which will end up in landfills and are not recycled.

Data compiled by Oceana suggested that plastic packaging use will more than double: from 942 million kilograms in 2019 to 2.056 billion kg in 2025.

"What we have now is a perfect storm of incoming holidays, the persistence of pandemic, and of course, the burden that these events produce to our planet in terms of packaging waste," Greenpeace campaigner Jefferson Chua said in a briefing ahead of the 9.9 shopping events.

Taxpayers are shouldering the costs of managing e-commerce waste, the organization stressed.

"The mounds of unnecessary plastic waste produced burden our households and communities. While buyers do have the responsibility in segregating our waste properly, these companies who have the capital and resources to be sustainable cannot and should not pass it all to consumers," Chua said.

Online petition

Over 14,000 individuals have signed an <u>online petition</u> launched in November last year, which called on Lazada and Shopee to integrate zero-waste systems in their businesses.

They demanded the two e-commerce giants to reveal data on waste estimates, reduce waste production by introducing reduction targets, and redesign current systems by exploring reusable and returnable packaging and incentives.

"This deposit and return system is what we hope to relive in our online transactions since we are in the era where everything is a click away and we're seeing its environmental effects. That pushes us to rethink and redesign the way we're doing our business," said Rachelle Lacanlale, founder of JuanBag, an initiative that collects plastic packaging that will be upcycled into reusable bags.





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In a statement, Lazada said it remains to be committed in building a sustainable e-commerce ecosystem and in addressing the environmental impact of waste.

"We have rolled out several key initiatives with our brand-merchants and other industry partners all geared at equipping consumers with the knowledge to make more informed and discerning consumption choices, and to provide them with access to sustainable packaging options," it said.

Greenpeace said the petition will be transmitted to the country offices of the two companies.

"The ball is really on their court to reveal their waste estimates and publicize sustainable programs, reduce current trends in waste generation, rationalize packaging system, and more importantly, redesign the ways products are delivered to consumers with more sustainable packaging," Chua said.

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NCR's largest pumping station damaged by tons of trash

The Tripa de Gallina, the largest pumping station in the National Capital Region (NCR), was damaged by tons of garbage during continuous rains brought about by Tropical Storm Jolina on Wednesday.

According to Jun Veneracion's report on "24 Oras," around 2 tons of trash were estimated to have been collected from the pumping station.

"Nabawasan 'yung capacity ng pumps namin. Pag may basura, halos 80% na lang 'ang napapump namin na tubig. Ang epekto po noon, mabilis tayo mataasan ng tubig," plant engineer Allan Tubao said.

With the huge volume of garbage, the trash rake of Tripa de Gallina was destroyed.

To make it operational again, the special team of the Metropolitan Manila Development Authority dived under the sewage water to check the pumping station.

"Nung bago ako turuan, hindi ako sanay, pag ano ko nito, mabibitawan ko, makakainom ka kasi hihinga ka, eh," Gary Makiling, a diver, said.

Makiling said he had gotten used to the large amount of garbage as he has encountered the same problem in the past five years.

"Yung amoy, kapit sa katawan lalo na kapag may na-ano pa diyan na ano, 'yung hindi masasabi na galing sa tao," he said.

He said clumps of trash below the sewage water blocked the trash rake and caused it to malfunction.

At least 67 tons of trash were collected from all the pumping stations in NCR. -- Joahna Lei Casilao/BAP, GMA News

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Climate change: Fossil fuels must stay underground, scientists say

Almost 60% of oil and gas reserves and 90% of coal must remain in the ground to keep global warming below 1.5C, scientists say.

The forecast is based on close analysis of global energy supply and demand.

It is a "bleak" but realistic assessment of "what the science tells us is needed", the researchers say.

And they have "painted a scenario of the future" that leaves much less room for fossil fuels to be extracted than previously estimated.

'Bouncing back'



Scientists say that limiting the global temperature rise to 1.5C should help the world avoid the most dangerous effects of climate change.

Globally, the researchers calculated, production of fossil fuels needed to have peaked in 2020 and be on a steady decline of 3% every year until 2050.

"Through the Covid pandemic, we have seen a large decline in production - but that is bouncing back," UCL associate professor of energy systems Dr Steve Pye told BBC News.

The research focuses on how much energy is required and what the limit must be on carbon emissions.





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Dr James Price, also at UCL, said: "We say to our model, 'Meet all those demands from now until 2100 without emitting too much carbon dioxide.'

"The result we get is a rapid reduction in fossil fuels - and a large amount of fossils fuels [left in the ground] - simply because the carbon budget is so tight."

'Bleak picture'



The study, in the journal Nature, also found the decline in oil and gas production required globally by 2050 - to stick to that tight carbon budget - means many regions face peak production now or during the next decade.

A carbon budget is the cumulative amount of CO2 that can be released in a period of time while keeping within a temperature threshold - in this case 1.5C.

Many fossil-fuel extraction projects already planned or in operation are likely to hurt the world's chances of meeting internationally agreed target limits on global warming set out by the 2015 Paris Agreement.

And this "bleak picture", the scientists say, "is very probably an underestimate of what is required".

The carbon budget determined by the modelling would give the world a 50% chance of limiting warming to 1.5C.

But the study says: "That does not consider uncertainties around, for example, climate-system feedbacks

"So to ensure more certainty of stabilising at this temperature, [even] more carbon needs to stay in the ground."

'Stark numbers'

The researchers highlight bold national policies to entirely phase out fossil-fuel extraction, including an alliance devised by Costa Rica and Denmark, set to be launched at the crucial United Nations Climate Change Conference, in Glasgow, this year, asking states to stop issuing fossil-fuel exploration permits.

And the scientists say they hope the "stark numbers" will inspire the political will to make swift and urgent change to move away from a reliance on fossil fuels.

Dr Price told the BBC: "The physics doesn't care about the political will.

"We know technically how to do this, it is just about actually doing it."

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Signal No. 1 up in parts of Luzon due to 'Jolina', 'Kiko'

MANILA – Tropical Cyclone Wind Signal (TCWS) No. 1 has been hoisted over some parts of Luzon due to Tropical Storm Jolina and Typhoon Kiko, a weather forecaster said Thursday.

TCWS No. 1 due to "Jolina" is in effect over the western portion of Pangasinan (Anda, Bolinao, Infanta, Aguilar, Sual, Labrador, Dasol, Bugallon, Burgos, Mabini, Agno, City of Alaminos, Bani, Lingayen, Mangatarem) and the northern portion of Zambales (San Antonio, Botolan, San Narciso, San Felipe, Cabangan, Palauig, Iba, Masinloc, Candelaria, Santa Cruz).

The eastern portion of Cagayan (Buguey, Lal-Lo, Santa Teresita, Gonzaga, Santa Ana, Gattaran, Baggao, Peñablanca) and the northeastern portion of Isabela (Maconacon, Divilacan, San Pablo, Cabagan, Palanan) are also under TCWS due to "Kiko".

These areas may experience strong winds. The TCWS hoisted due to "Jolina" may be lifted later in the day, according to Benison Estareja of the Philippine Atmospheric, Geophysical and Astronomical Services Administration (PAGASA).

"Jolina may intensify again into a severe tropical storm. It is likely to exit the Philippine Area of Responsibility by Friday," Estareja said.

Light to moderate, with at times heavy rains may be experienced over Zambales, Bataan, and Pangasinan.

Estareja said residents of these areas must take precautions against possible flash floods) landslides.

"Other areas that were affected by 'Jolina' yesterday, Calabarzon, Bicol region will have fair weather. Only isolated rains are expected," he said.

"Jolina" was last seen 145 km. west-northwest of Iba, Zambales, or 175 km. west of Dagupan City, Pangasinan. It packs maximum sustained winds of 85 kph near the center and gustiness of up to 115 kph.

Typhoon Kiko, on the other hand, packs maximum sustained winds of 185 kph near the center, and gustiness of up to 230 kph.

It is expected to bring heavy rains in Cagayan including the Babuyan Islands, and northern Isabela starting Friday.





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Meanwhile, moderate to strong winds and moderate to rough seas will prevail over Luzon and the Visayas.

Over Mindanao, winds will be light to moderate with slight to moderate seas, based on PAGASA's forecast. *(PNA)*






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Kiko nagbabantang maging 'super typhoon'



MANILA, Philippines — Health authorities on Thursday listed 22,820 more coronavirus cases, pushing the country's total to 2,161,892.

This is the highest daily rise recorded since the pandemic started.

The new figures saw active cases up by 15,537 from the 151,135 on September 8. The Department of Health said five laboratories did not submit test results.

- Active cases: 166,672 or 7.7% of the total
- Recoveries: 12,337, bringing the number to 1,960,487
- Deaths: 61, or now 34,733 in total

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FDA: Very low breakthrough infections

- The Food and Drug Administration said it recorded only 242 or 0.0017% <u>breakthrough</u> infections out of the 13.87 million Filipinos vaccinated for COVID-19
 by end-August.
- DOH added 5,132 COVID-19 cases on the 12,751 it reported on September 8, with the corrected figure at 17, 883. It attributed the delay to issues in its COVIDKaya system.
- The Professional Regulation Commission canceled the September 2021 <a href="https://physician.nlm.nih.gov/ph
- Some 122 children and personnel in an <u>orphanage</u> in Quezon City tested positive for COVID-19, the local government announced. Most were kids under 18 years old.

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Masks washed, recycled at pandemic's onset

Amid allegations that the government procured overpriced Covid-19 personal protective equipment (PPE), Trade Secretary Ramon Lopez and testing czar Secretary Vince Dizon recalled the challenges in sourcing gears at the onset of the pandemic last year.

During President Rodrigo Duterte's public address which aired Wednesday, the two officials noted that there were no local manufacturers of PPE when the novel coronavirus struck the country in 2020.

"If you talk of March, April, May (2020), prices were high back then," Lopez said in the vernacular.

Dizon, who serves as deputy chief implementer of the National Task Force Against Covid-19, said the administration responded with a sense of urgency to address the issues at that time.

"Secretary Galvez and I went to a Cebu hospital at the height of the surge in April and we saw masks hanging on the clothesline. Secretary Galvez and I asked, 'Why are the masks hanging there?'" the official recalled.

Not washable

"Because there are no more masks. Even if they are not washable, we need to recycle them,' the health worker told us. That's when our hearts really bled," Dizon added.

He emphasized that all PPE brought by the national government were given to health workers "for free."

"It's important to remember how difficult it was. But thankfully, we managed to obtain supplies and we were able to save many lives," Dizon added.

Lopez also pointed out that only Bataan-based Medtecs International Corp. Ltd. was manufacturing medical-grade masks in the country when demand for masks started to increase in early 2020 due to the Taal Volcano eruption and the Covid-19 outbreak. Medtecs' output at the time was only limited for exports, Lopez added.

The trade chief also noted that local firms found it difficult at that time to begin their own mask and PPE production since raw materials, equipment and other tools had to be imported.

Lopez added that the government had to source out PPE from other countries since local firms were not capable of producing pandemic supplies needed for health workers.





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Senate probe

"That time was challenging because even the fabric used to produce masks were expensive, and there was also a shortage," he said.

Opposition lawmakers have questioned the government's emergency deals to buy medical supplies from a lowly-capitalized company known as Pharmally, which was linked to Duterte's former economic adviser, Michael Yang.

The President has since denied irregularities in the procurement of pandemic supplies as he vouched for the integrity of Cabinet officials.

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Breakthrough cases merely 0.0017% — FDA

Working-class people aged 45 to 64 at most risk due to mobility required by their jobs

Covid-19 breakthrough infections or infections affecting fully vaccinated individuals are most prevalent among the 18 to 44 age group, the Philippines' Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has said.

FDA Director-General Eric Domingo said Thursday in a media forum that the next most affected group for breakthrough infections is the 45-64 age-bracket.

For an infection to be considered "a breakthrough," an individual must have already been fully vaccinated for 14 days or more before being testing positive anew for the virus.

Domingo said most people in the most affected group belong to the working population and are, thus, more exposed to the virus.

"They are also the ones who are actively moving and working. Even in the reports of the DoH (Department of Health), this is the same age group that contracts Covid-19," he added.

As of 29 August, out of 13.8 million fully vaccinated individuals, only 0.0017 percent contracted the dreaded respiratory disease, Domingo said.

"Based on data gathered by the FDA, individuals who got infected with Covid-19 more than 14 days after their second dose was only 242 or 0.0017 percent out of 13.8 million individuals inoculated with Covid-19 vaccines," he said.

Moreover, out of the 33.3 million jabs, 0.18 percent had suspected adverse reactions. Of this number, only 0.006 percent reported serious adverse reactions.

Domingo added that breakthrough mortality or cases of fully vaccinated individuals dying due to Covid-19 involved mostly senior citizens and those with pre-existing conditions or comorbidities.

Despite the reported cases of breakthrough infections and mortality, he reiterated that "the benefits of getting the Covid-19 vaccine continue to outweigh its risks."

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Vaccinated 10 times less likely to be hospitalized with Covid-19

BERLIN – Vaccinated people are 10 times less likely to be hospitalized with Covid-19 than those who are unvaccinated, Germany's top health expert said on Wednesday.

Professor Lothar Wieler, head of the Robert Koch Institute (RKI), said vaccines continue to offer strong protection against Covid-19, despite the emergence of new variants such as the Delta strain.

"The risk of hospitalization due to Covid-19 is 10 times less likely among vaccinated people compared to those who are unvaccinated," he told a news conference in Berlin.

Wieler said a RKI study found vaccinations prevented at least 38,000 deaths and 77,000 hospitalizations in Germany between January and July this year.

Nearly 20,000 people were saved from landing in intensive care units, he added.

"Vaccines are our most powerful tool against Covid-19," he stressed, adding that the jabs protect not only recipients but also others by slowing the spread of an infectious disease and curbing new variants.

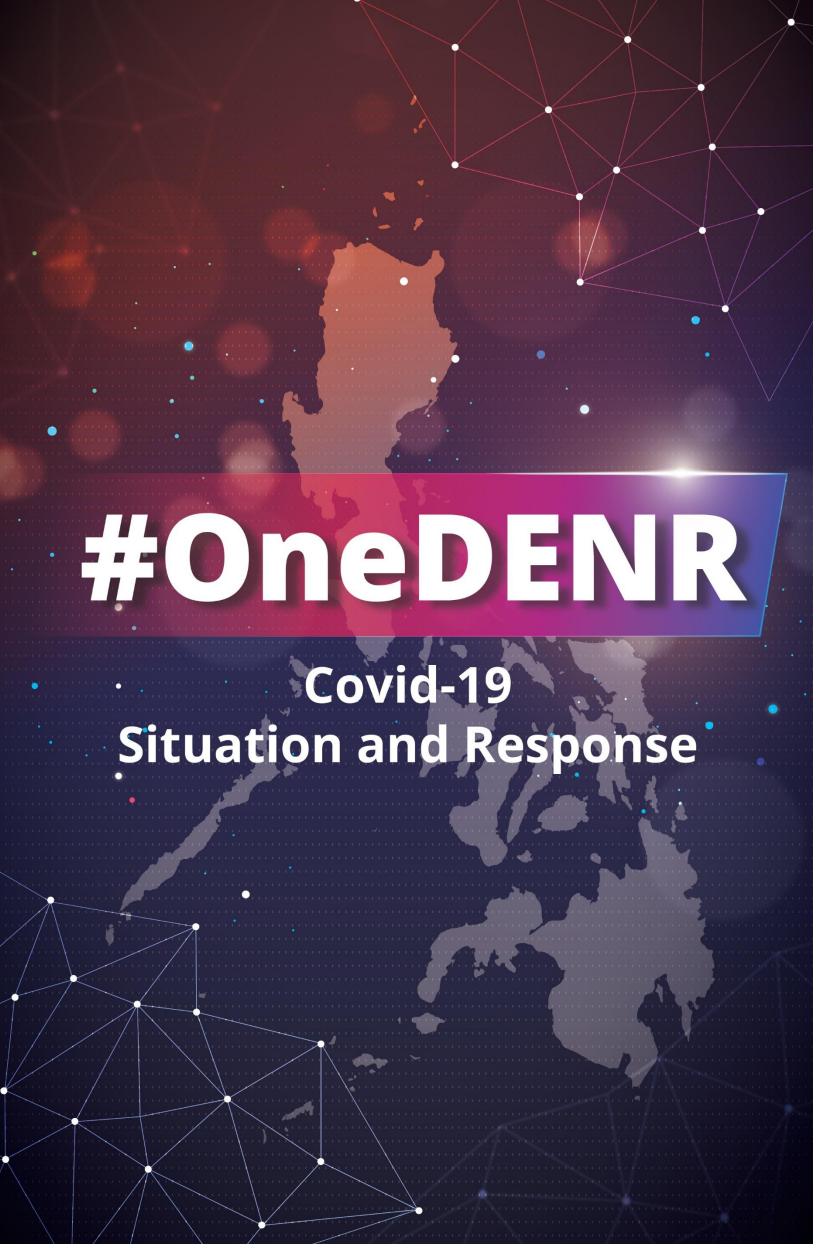
Wieler called on people who are still undecided to get vaccinated against Covid-19 without delay, saying Germany may face a big resurgence in the fall and winter if it fails to meet its vaccination target in the coming weeks.

"If we cannot significantly increase the current vaccination rates, the current fourth wave of the pandemic can take a fulminant course in autumn," he warned.

Some 54.9 million people in Germany, or 66 percent of the population, have received at least one dose of a Covid-19 vaccine so far, while 51.2 million, or 61.7 percent, have been fully vaccinated.

The government is aiming to vaccinate 70 percent of the population by the end of September, but seems set to miss the goal as the pace of the rollout has slowed down in recent weeks. (*Anadolu*)

DOH, FDA: ONLY 0.0017% GOT COVID-19 OUT OF 13.8 MILLION FULLY VACCINATED INDIVIDUALS

The Department of Health (DOH) and the Food and Drug Administration today announced that as of August 29, 2021, out of 13.8 million fully vaccinated individuals only 0.0017% got COVID-19.

Based on the data gathered by the FDA, individuals who got infected with COVID-19 more than 14 days after their second dose was only 242 or 0.0017% out of 13.8 million individuals inoculated with COVID-19 vaccines.

"Out of 13.8 million na fully vaccinated, sobrang konti lang ang nakakuha ng COVID-19. Saan ka pa tataya? Kung wala tayong bakuna laban sa COVID-19, mas marami pa ang puwedeng makakuha ng malalang sakit," said Director General Eric Domingo.

Moreover, out of the 33.3 million jabs, 0.18% had suspected adverse reactions. Of this number, only 0.006% were reported as a serious adverse reaction. The DOH and FDA said that the benefits of getting the COVID-19 vaccine continue to outweigh its risks.

The DOH and FDA also encouraged individuals to report experiences of adverse reactions to the FDA website or their City Health Office (CHO).







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




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




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




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




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




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




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




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




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
