Refocus, improve efforts to mitigate climate change: DENR

December 12, 2021, 6:30 pm



MANILA – The Covid-19 pandemic should serve as a moment of reflection to "refocus and rethink" climate change mitigation efforts.

The recent 26th United Nations Climate Change Conference or Conference of the Parties (COP26) in Glasgow, Scotland indicated it is also time to increase awareness on and secure commitments to deal with climate change, according to Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) Secretary Roy Cimatu.

"This pandemic enables the people to reflect and think about their lives in the future. Therefore, this is also the best time to educate them about how their consumption behaviors affect climate change," Cimatu said in a news release on Sunday.

Human activities, like burning fossil fuels, natural gas, oil, and coal, are largely blamed for climate change or the long-term alteration of temperature and typical weather patterns that result in warmer, wetter, or drier conditions.

Undersecretary Analiza Rebuelta-Teh of the Finance, Information Systems and Climate Change also said the pandemic is the time to limit climate change as the world faces the challenges of urgently addressing the ongoing health crisis.

"The conclusions in the Intergovernmental Panel for Climate Change or IPCC's 6th report demand collective action to transform our economy, our behavior, and our lifestyle at all levels -- individuals, communities, businesses, institutions, and governments," Teh said in her opening message during the recent public webinar "Code Red: The State of Climate and Humanity".

According to the report, climate change will be "bringing multiple different changes in the different regions which will all increase with further warming".

"This means we must work beyond current action plans, and very swiftly because otherwise, the 1.5 degrees Celsius target by the end of the century will be beyond our reach," she added.

At least 160 participants and representatives from various environmental and climate change youth groups and organizations, and academic science clubs attended the webinar.

John Leo Algo, member of the interim secretariat and deputy executive director for programs and campaigns of Aksyon Klima Pilipinas, presented the "IPCC Sixth Assessment Report: The Physical Science Basis" which was the highlight of the webinar.

DENR representatives from various sectors presented the implications of climate change to the environment and natural resources, including biodiversity, forestry, air, water, waste, and water resources.

Civil society representatives reiterated calls for upscaling of climate actions.

The webinar was aimed at widening the perspectives of identifying relevant entry points, opportunities, and prospects on how the youth sector can actively participate and significantly contribute to the cause of addressing climate change.

It also hoped to expel and identify practical recommendations for the youth sector to help strengthen national policies and programs to ensure climate-resilient and sustainable development. (PR)

Philippines ranks 23rd among 63 states in climate index

"The Philippines is a new entrant to the Climate Change Performance Index and immediately our country ranked 23rd in climate protection performance," acting presidential spokesman Karlo Nograles said in a recent press briefing.

MANILA, Philippines — The Philippines ranked 23rd in the Climate Change Performance Index (CCPI) 2022, Malacañang has announced.

"The Philippines is a new entrant to the Climate Change Performance Index and immediately our country ranked 23rd in climate protection performance," acting presidential spokesman Karlo Nograles said in a recent press briefing.

The CCPI tracks the performance of 63 countries and the European Union on greenhouse gas emissions, renewable energy use and climate policy.

The Philippines is one of three new entrants in this year's CCPI, published by the Bonn-based non-profit Germanwatch.

In the four main CCPI categories, the Philippines rated low in climate policy, medium in renewable energy, and high in emissions and energy use.

In April, the Philippines submitted its first nationally determined contribution (NDC), which sets a 75-percent emission reduction and avoidance by 2030, as part of its commitment to the Paris Agreement on Climate Change.

The NDC represents the country's goal of modernizing and pursuing low carbon and resilient development for the agriculture, waste, industry, transport and energy sectors over the 2020-2030 period.

NDCs are pledges submitted by countries to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change as their contributions to achieve the goals of the Paris Agreement, particularly in limiting global warming to well below two degrees Celsius above pre-industrial levels or further to 1.5 degrees Celsius.

However, CCPI experts note the 75-percent emission target is ambitious, "as is the government's plan to reduce absolute GHG emissions from there forward," the report said.

"First, there is no clear plan for how to achieve the goal. The current climate policies are in fact not ambitious enough to reach the NDC target. Furthermore, the experts criticize that only 2.71 percent of the NDC target remains unconditional. The rest will be pursued in the case of international finance support," it said.

"Overall, the main problems concerning climate policy performance in the Philippines are, according to the experts, not just ambition, but apparently the delayed or non-implemented provisions. Additional to the presence of more ambitious climate policies, they demand strong and swift implementation," the CCPI said

In a speech at the virtual 13th Asia-Europe Meeting (ASEM) Summit last month, Duterte raised the disruptions brought by the COVID-19 pandemic and the changing climate particularly on vulnerable countries.

Duterte said the main burden of climate action must fall more on the world's worst polluters, who are responsible for the existential crisis – past and present.

The world's transition to clean energy cannot be at the expense of the developing world's progress, the President pointed out.

Duterte called on developed ASEM member-nations to fulfill their commitments in climate financing, technology transfer and capacity-building "without political preconditions."

"We all need to do our part. The Philippines certainly will. But those who benefitted from our planet the most must do more," he said.

Declaration to strengthen sea governance

The Philippine government, through the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR), together with 10 other Asian countries, has signed a declaration which aims to strengthen [Palatino]the governance of seas in East Asia to ensure coastal resilience to the impacts of climate change.

Philippine delegation head and Environment Secretary Roy Cimatu signed the Preah Sihanouk Ministerial Declaration during the 7th East Asian Seas Ministerial Forum held virtually last Dec. 2.

Aside from the Philippines, signing the declaration were 10 other member-countries of the Partnerships in Environmental Management for the Seas of East Asia (PEMSEA): Cambodia, China, Democratic People's Republic of Korea, Indonesia, Japan, Lao People's Democratic Republic, Republic of Korea, Singapore, Timor-Leste and Vietnam.

Through the declaration, the member-countries have endorsed the PEMSEA Roadmap to 2030 to serve as the region's strategic guide on the management of seas, anchored on the Sustainable Development Strategy for the Seas of East Asia (SDS-SEA) and commitment to "blue economy."

The DENR said the declaration is also aligned with the member-countries' green recovery plans and programs and key environmental commitments.

In a speech during the forum, Cimatu reiterated the Philippines' commitment to the partnership's roadmap and also welcomed member-countries' implementation of "blended protection" to address the threats of climate change to the ocean and marine resources.

This protection would include "30 percent coverage of both land and sea to significantly measure the equivalent effects of protection of biodiversity through strong enforcement of other conservation policies such as the total ban of illegal, unreported and unregulated fishing," he explained.

Cimatu, however, admitted that there is need for stronger collaboration between governments and other stakeholders for "effective area-based conservation measures" particularly in important marine areas. — **Elizabeth Marcelo**

Bicycle-Riding a Sustainable and Environment-Friendly Transportation

The Department of Environment and Natural Resources has expressed its commitment to promote the interests of the bicycle-riding community, as a bicycle advocacy group lauded the agency's pivotal role in the annual celebration of the National Bicycle Day.

"Such is the robust partnership we have nurtured through the years with the bicycle-riding communities particularly the National Bicycle Organization (NBO) who has come out strongly for President Rodrigo Roa Duterte's issuance of Presidential Proclamation (PP) 1052," said DENR Secretary Roy A. Cimatu.



During this year's celebration of the National Bicycle Day held on November 28, DENR Undersecretary for Solid Waste Management and Local Government Units Concerns Benny D. Anitporda received from the NBO a bicycle sculpture made of bronze in recognition of his "remarkable contribution as a bicycle advocate."

NBO Director Benedict Camara noted that it was Antiporda's efforts through the office of Senator Christopher "Bong" Go that the bicycle groups desired for a nationwide observance of Bicycle Day through the issuance of PP 1052.

On November 18, 2020, President Duterte issued PP 1052 declaring the fourth Sunday of November of every year as National Bicycle Day, to encourage Filipinos to promote bicycle as a sustainable and environment-friendly mode of transportation.

In receiving the award, Antiporda expressed his desire that the new set of leaders in 2022 would continue and build on the gains of the DENR under the Duterte administration through DENR Secretary Cimatu, particularly those that promote the interest of the bicycle-riding public.

"We need you to ask the candidates to stand up for cycling, walking, and a healthier future. Take advantage of this electoral exercise and choose the champions for greener travel and respect for bicycle riders especially in the use of bicycle lanes," Antiporda said.

This year's National Bicycle Day was celebrated by more than 300 bikers, representing 61 bikers' groups, through a 26-kilometer bike parade from the DENR grounds in Quezon City to the Centennial Park in Navotas City where the celebration rites were held.

"This activity also serves to inspire and empower other advocates from the private sector to create activities for the benefit, enjoyment, and support of cycling advocacy and the cycling community nationwide," Camara said.

He hailed PP 1052 as a "big stepping stone to having laws that will promote bicycling as a major form of transportation and to spur the potential of the bicycling sector as a contributor to the country's economic recovery."

The NBO has been advocating for bicycle and pedestrian-friendly legislation and implementation through a partnership with public and private organizations at the local, regional and national levels.

Camara also credited PP 1052 and the designation of bike lanes and bike patrol as among the reasons that fueled NBO's plan to push for the promotion of bike ecotourism in the country.

"With the help of the DENR, we can develop bike ecotourism in the country," Camara also said, noting that a dry-run has already been undertaken covering the Antipolo eco-bike tour route with the Metro Manila tour now on the drawing board.

He also thanked the DENR for their donation of bike racks to the local government of Navotas whose board council has passed a resolution calling for the designation of bike lanes within the city.

According to Ching Salinas, head of the Bike Lanes Program Office of the Metropolitan Manila Development Authority, around 313 kilometers of roads are now designated as bike lanes in major thoroughfares in Metro Manila.

SMC joins govt in protecting Manila's last old-growth mangrove forest

TOGETHER with the <u>Department of Environment and Natural Resources</u> (DENR) and the local government of Navotas, <u>SAN Miguel Corp.</u> (SMC) is tapping more volunteers from its own workforce to scale up efforts to clean and protect <u>Isla Pulo</u>, home to the remaining old-growth mangrove forest in <u>Metro Manila</u>.

So far, the company, which has been holding weekly cleanup activities since October, has mobilized some 80 volunteers, consisting of SMC employees, who are residents of Barangay Tanza 1, and personnel from the local government of Navotas; from the Philippine National Police, based in Navotas; from the 51st Engineers Brigade of the Philippine Army; and from the Department of Environment and Natural Resources.

Also so far, volunteers have collected 3,803 sacks of garbage from the mangrove area, which also serves as a natural barrier that protects nearby cities from storm surges and coastline erosion.

While the primary goal is to remove trash that litters the 3.5-kilometer shoreline and mangrove strip of the 26-hectare island, the initiative complements the company's clean-up of the Tullahan Tinajeros river system and helps in flood mitigation efforts.

"Solid waste pollution of our waterways, shorelines and major bodies of [water] such as our rivers and seas is a critical problem that we cannot emphasize enough. [It threatens] not only marine life, our environment [and] the livelihood of our fishermen, but also every Filipino, living in Metro Manila and even nearby provinces, whose lives are regularly disrupted by flooding during the rainy season," said SMC President Ramon Ang.

For the effort, SMC shoulders all costs for supplies, protective gear and meals for all volunteers. It also coordinates with and organizes all the volunteers from the community and the various agencies and offices involved.

Negros greening initiative hits mark

DUMAGUETE CITY — Negros Island has reached a new milestone as the massive re-greening initiative in the region hit its mark this year — planting 10 million trees four years ahead of schedule.

The movement — dubbed "10 Million in 10 Years for a Greener Negros" (10M in 10) — achieved its goal in just six years with a seedling survival rate of 79 percent to 85 percent and 307,552 units of carbon dioxide emissions sequestered.

The project was launched in 2015 by the geothermal power firm Energy Development Corp. (EDC) to restore the rich and lush forests of Negros Island, which started with only 90 partners, including the Department of Environment and Natural Resources, provincial and local governments, the academe, media and civil society organizations.

Now, the movement has 268 partners all over the island, which was conceived to not just plant trees but embark on sustainable reforestation programs involving stakeholders to promote environmental protection and conservation and sustainable multi-sectoral development.

Despite the coronavirus disease 2019 pandemic, the reforestation partners continued with their initiatives, planting as many trees as they could on land and water.

Makati, Grade 'A-' sa global assessment for climate change initiatives

MASAYA akong i-share sa inyo na nakatanggap ng score na "A-" ang Makati mula sa CDP-ICLEI Unified Reporting System. Ito ang reporting platform ng Global Covenant of Mayors for Climate and Energy (GCoM) at ng ICLEI o International Council for Local Environmental Initiatives-Local Governments for Sustainability.

Sa ginawang assessment ngayong taon, kinilala ang mga best-practice standards ng ating lungsod pagdating sa adaptation at mitigation ng climate initiatives. Nasabing "ambitious but realistic" ang mga proyekto ng Makati.

Para sa akin, ang komentong ito ay isang hamon na dapat pa nating pagbutihin at paigtingin ang pagpapatupad ng mga programa para sa kalikasan.

Katuwang ng pamahalaang lungsod ang Department of Environmental Services (DES) sa pagpapatupad ng mga climate change adaptation and mitigation measures. Katulong sila sa pagsasaliksik at pagpaplano kung paano mas mapaghahandaan ng mga negosyo, pamilya, at indibidwal ang mga hamon ng climate change.

Sa ginawang assessment, "A" ang naging score ng Makati sa Adaptation at inilagay tayo sa kategoryang leadership-level city. Ang ibig sabihin nito ay malinaw ang ating pagkakaintindi sa mga parating na climate risk, at mayroon tayong magandang adaptation goals na unti-unti na nating ipinatutupad. Ang score ng ibang bansa sa ating rehiyon ay B, samantalang ang global average naman ay B.

B naman ang nakuha nating score sa Mitigation at inilagay tayo sa kategoryang management-level city. Na-recognize din ang ating emission reduction targets at mga inisyatibo para malabanan ang epekto ng climate change. Ang score na ito ay mas mataas sa regional average na C at global average na D.

Dito makikita kung gaano kaseryoso at desidido ang Makati sa pag-aaral at pagpaplano para labanan ang impact ng climate change sa lahat ng aspeto ng ating araw-araw na pamumuhay. Ang climate change ay isang reyalidad na hindi na natin maaaring takasan. Ang tanging magagawa ay maghanda para sa mga epekto nito, at gumawa ng mga konkretong hakbang at plano para hindi na lumala ang problema.

Hindi po maisasakatuparan ang mga programang ito kung wala ang inyong kooperasyon at tulong. Sama-sama nating harapin ang mga hamon ng climate change at magkakasama din tayo sa pagpapanumbalik ng sigla at ganda ng Inang Kalikasan.

4 east African nations fight plastic pollution

DAR ES SALAAM: Four east African countries of Tanzania, Kenya, Uganda and Rwanda have joined hands to fight plastic pollution in the region, an official said on Saturday (Sunday in Manila).

<u>Ana Le Rocha</u>, executive director of Nipe Fagio, said the four countries have decided to start a Single-Use Plastic Free East African Community (EAC) campaign to advocate against the use of single-use plastics in the region.

Nipe Fagio is a Kiswahili slogan translated in English as 'Give me the Broom.' It is a public advocacy organization that focuses on increasing awareness by facilitating and promoting sustainable development in Tanzania.

Le Rocha told a press conference in the Tanzanian capital of <u>Dodoma</u> that the campaign has been started by a coalition of four organizations of the Center for Environment Justice and Development, <u>Global Initiative</u> for Environment and Reconciliation, Bio Vision <u>Africa</u> and Nipe Fagio.

She said the campaign pushes for a phase-out on the production of single-use plastics and ending plastic pollution in the region.

East African countries have banned the use of single-use plastics with Rwanda being a significant success case and Kenya having the highest penalty for noncompliance.

"The EAC can become a global example and the first single-use plastic free zone in the world," said Le Rocha.

Climate change aggravates conflict and terrorism–UN

UNITED NATIONS—Climate change is "an aggravating factor" for instability, conflict and terrorism, UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres said Thursday.

The UN chief said the regions that are most vulnerable to climate change "also suffer from insecurity, poverty, weak governance and the scourge of terrorism."

Guterres told a UN Security Council meeting on the link between climate change, conflict and terrorism that when climate disruptions hinder the ability of government institutions to provide public services, "it fuels grievances and mistrust towards authorities."

And when the impact of climate change leads to people losing livelihoods, "the promises of protection, income and justice—behind which terrorists sometimes hide their truce designs—become more attractive," he said.

In Africa's Lake Chad basin region, Guterres said, the extremist group Boko Haram has been able to gain new recruits, "particularly from local communities disillusioned by a lack of economic opportunities and access to essential resources."

"In central Mali, terrorist groups have exploited the growing tensions between herders and farmers to recruit new members from pastoralist communities, who often feel excluded and stigmatized," the secretary-general said.

In Iraq and Syria, Islamic State extremists have "exploited water shortages and taken control of water infrastructure to impose its will on communities" he said, while in Somalia charcoal production has been a source of income for the al-Shabab extremist group.

Guterres said that "climate impacts compound conflicts and exacerbate fragility," adding that UN peacekeeping or political missions are in eight of the 15 countries most exposed to climate risks. He did not name the countries.

The UN chief urged collective action to address the root causes of insecurity, stressing that "conflicts and terrorism do not take place in a vacuum."

He urged increased investment to help developing countries adapt to the impact of climate change, saying developed countries must keep their promise to provide at least \$100 billion a year to developing countries for climate action. He said these costs are expected to reach up to \$300 billion a year by 2030.

Niger's President Mohamed Bazoum, whose country holds the Security Council presidency this month and chaired the meeting, said in Africa's Sahel region, where his country is located, a key challenge is fighting terrorists whose "hateful acts on a daily basis are shaking the foundation of democratic states."

"Among these challenges we also have climate change which by reducing access to resources is increasing poverty and all the scourges that go with that," he said.

Bazoum expressed hope the Security Council would adopt a resolution that Niger and Ireland are co-sponsoring. It would recognize a link between ensuring international peace and security, which is the council's mandate, and the fight against terrorism and the effects of climate change.

He said the Sahel and the Lake Chad Basin illustrate the interaction between the effects of climate change and peace and security.

"The consequences of this phenomenon—and we still don't know how widespread it is—has led to the disintegration of the social fabric and the well-being of the populations forced into unbridled competition for access to resources" which are becoming rarer, Bazoum said.

The result is often inter-community conflicts and increased migration, and "even more worrying, this situation has contributed to feeding violent extremism and large-scale crime, leading some young people to join organized criminal and terrorist networks who previously enjoyed the riches and biodiversity of their regions."

Irish Ambassador Geraldine Byrne Nason said the Security Council has a responsibility "to break this vicious and self-reinforcing cycle."

She urged support for what she called the "critical resolution," saying: "This council must recognize and accept its role in the fight against climate change."

"We need to integrate climate-related security risks into our conflict resolution, prevention and mediation efforts," Byrne Nason said. "Doing so will help maintain international peace and security. Failure to do so is unconscionable."

But Russia's ambassador, Vassily Nebenzia, whose country has veto power in the council, said: "For us, the connection between terrorism and climate change is not clear."

He said the potential for work on this issue should be carried out in other UN bodies like the General Assembly, the Economic and Social Council or the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change. He said the Security Council should focus on "overcoming potential conflicts and future ones."





Odette to enter Philippines on Tuesday

According to the Philippine Atmospheric, Geophysical and Astronomical Services Administration (PAGASA), the low-pressure area it has been monitoring has already developed into a tropical depression.

MANILA, Philippines — Typhoon Odette is forecast to enter the Philippine area of responsibility tomorrow and make landfall over Eastern Visayas or in the Caraga region of Mindanao as early as Wednesday night.

According to the Philippine Atmospheric, Geophysical and Astronomical Services Administration (PAGASA), the low-pressure area it has been monitoring has already developed into a tropical depression.

Located 2,095 kilometers east of Mindanao as of yesterday morning, it was moving slowly and almost stationary. It packs a maximum sustained wind of 45 kilometers per hour near the center and gustiness of up to 55 kph.

"On the forecast track, the tropical depression is forecast to move generally west northwestward over the next three days and may enter the PAR on Tuesday," PAGASA said.

"Once inside the PAR, the domestic name 'Odette' will be assigned to this tropical cyclone. By Wednesday evening or Thursday morning, the tropical cyclone will begin to move westward and may make landfall over Eastern Visayas-Caraga area," the state weather bureau added.

PAGASA said the low-pressure area developed into a tropical depression at 8 a.m. yesterday and "is forecast to gradually intensify and may reach tropical storm category within the next 24 hours."

"Due to favorable environmental conditions, the tropical cyclone will likely continue to intensify and may reach typhoon category by Tuesday evening or Wednesday early morning," the tropical cyclone advisory read.

PAGASA, based on current track and intensity forecast, said there is a moderate to high chance that a storm signal possibly as high as Signal No. 4 will be hoisted over provinces of Visayas and Mindanao.

"Considering these developments, the public and disaster risk reduction and management offices concerned are advised to continue monitoring for updates related to this tropical cyclone," the state weather bureau announced.

PH logs 509 new Covid-19 recoveries; active cases drop to 11,255

MANILA – The Philippines' total number of active Covid-19 cases dropped to 11,255 after the Department of Health (DOH) logged 509 new recoveries on Sunday.

In its latest case bulletin, the DOH said the country's recovered cases also reached 2,775,057 or 97.8 percent of the total case count of 2,836,592 since the start of the pandemic last year.

The DOH, meanwhile, tallied 402 new infections, including 380 cases tallied from Nov. 29 to Dec. 12.

"The top regions with cases in the recent two weeks were NCR (98 or 26 percent), Region 4-B (42 or 11 percent) and Region 4-A (37 or 10 percent)," the DOH said.

Among active cases, 4,334 are mild, 876 are asymptomatic, 401 are critical, 1,961 are severe, and 3,683 are moderate.

The death toll has reached 50,280 with 184 new deaths.

"Of the 184 deaths, 6 occurred in December 2021 (3 percent), 35 in November 2021 (19 percent), 73 in October 2021 (40percent), 54 in September 2021 (29 percent), 10 in August 2021 (5 percent), 4 in July 2021 (2 percent), 1 in June 2021 (1 percent), and 1 in February 2021 (1 percent) due to late encoding of death information to COVIDKaya," the DOH said.

The COVIDKaya is a digital application used by health care workers to collect and share data about Covid-19 cases.

The DOH added that this issue is currently being coordinated with the Epidemiology and Surveillance Units to ensure information is up to date.

According to DOH data on Dec. 10, about 1.2 percent of 36,799 who were tested turned out positive for Covid-19.

"About six duplicates were removed from the total case count as they are recoveries. Also, there were 164 cases that have tested negative and 159 have been reclassified as recoveries after final validation," the DOH said.

It added 178 cases that were previously tagged as recoveries were reclassified as deaths after final validation.

Four laboratories were not operational on Dec. 10 and three laboratories were not able to submit their data to the Covid-19 Document Repository System.

The DOH noted the seven laboratories contribute, on average, 0.5 percent of samples tested, and 0.1 percent of positive individuals based on data in the last 14 days.

To date, 23 percent of 3,600 intensive care unit (ICU) beds, 23 percent of 19,700 isolation beds, 13 percent of 12,200 ward beds, and 13 percent of 3,000 ventilators are utilized by patients with Covid-19 nationwide.

Meanwhile, 26 percent of 1,200 ICU beds, 19 percent of 4,700 isolation beds, 19 percent of 3,800 ward beds, and 17 percent of 1,000 ventilators dedicated to patients with Covid-19 are in use in the National Capital Region. **(PNA)**

574 international travelers positive for Delta

MANILA, Philippines — Except for one "unclassified" variant, the Philippine Genome Center (PGC) found only Delta variant cases from the samples collected among travelers from Omicron-affected countries.

"Last week, we sequenced about 574 and all those sequenced were Delta," PGC Executive Director Cynthia Saloma said partly in Filipino during a radio interview yesterday.

The PGC also ran "emergency" tests on samples from the airport and all of these turned out to be Delta cases, except for one which was a B.1.1.203 and not a COVID-19 variant of concern, added Saloma.

"It's a B.1.1.203, but it's not classified as either a variant of concern or variant of interest for the reason that it does not have mutations which you would think carries changes in transmissibility – nothing like that," she explained.

Yesterday, the Department of Health (DOH) reported an additional 402 cases, bringing to 2,836,592 the total COVID-19 caseload nationwide.

A total of 11,255 cases are active, while 2,775,057 have recuperated from the illness, including the 509 newly recorded recoveries, the DOH report showed.


The National Capital Region (NCR or Metro Manila) topped the regions with the most active cases, followed by Calabarzon (Cavite, Laguna, Batangas, Rizal and Quezon or Region 4-A) and Central Luzon (Region 3).

In terms of new cases, the NCR also remains on top, followed by Calabarzon and Cagayan Valley.

Fatalities from the pandemic reached 50,280 with the addition of 184 newly reported deaths, of which six happened this month, the DOH said.

It reminded the public to continue observing minimum health protocol despite the decline in cases and the easing of mobility restrictions
