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Cimatu seeks more grassroots participation as DENR marks 34th founding anniversary

"Let more people know how far we have gone in our Enhanced National Greening Program and other DENR programs and projects implemented in the field that resulted in communities' lives getting better," Environment and Natural Resources Secretary Roy Cimatu urged his employees.

Environment and Natural Resources Secretary Roy Cimatu challenged agency officials and employees to "go down to the grassroots level and involve more people and communities to the agency's programs and projects."

Cimatu made the remarks during a web conference in celebrating the DENR's 34th anniversary last June 10.

This is the first time that the DENR celebrated its anniversary with all its employees—from the regions, bureaus, attached agencies, and Provincial Environment and Natural Resources Offices (PENRO) and Community Environment and Natural Resources Offices (CENRO)—attending the event online, via Zoom.

"For instance, make as many people as possible aware that we have forest guards and other employees who put their health and lives at stake defending our environment," the secretary said.





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"Let more people know how far we have gone in our Enhanced National Greening Program and other DENR programs and projects implemented in the field that resulted in communities' lives getting better," Cimatu added.

The DENR was created on June 10, 1987, by virtue of Executive Order 192 reorganizing the previous Department of Energy, Environment, and Natural Resources and transferring the energy matters to the Office of the President during that time.

With the theme "Celebrating with A Greener and Safer Environment," the 34th DENR founding anniversary also featured the Environmental Awards for Governance and Leadership Excellence or EAGLE Award 2020, which is conferred to the most outstanding regional executive director, regional director, and implementing and supervising officers of the PENRO and CENRO.

Outstanding employees

For the second time, Arleigh Adorable of DENR-Region 10 (Northern Mindanao) was hailed as the top-performing Regional Executive Director and was awarded a trophy and a cash prize of P100,000. Adorable was first conferred with the award in 2019.

Mario Ancheta of the Mines and Geosciences Bureau (MGB) in Region 2 (Cagayan Valley) and Ma. Victoria Abrera of the Environmental Management Bureau (EMB) in Cordillera Administrative Region (CAR) were also recognized as top regional directors for their respective line bureaus. Abrera also won the same award in 2019.

Delia Benitez of PENRO-Eastern Samar was recognized as the top Supervising PENRO, while Merlyn Dumalahay of PENRO-Camiguin bagged the top Implementing PENRO.

Benitez and Dumalahay each received a trophy and a cash prize of P75,000.

Like Adorable and Abrera, Dumalahay also won the top Implementing PENRO for the second time around since she was first awarded in 2019.

A supervising PENRO heads a provincial office with sub-offices headed by the CENROs, while an Implementing PENRO heads a lone DENR field office in the entire province.

The top performing CENRO for 2020 was awarded to Imelda Casiwan from CENRO Pinukpuk in the Cordillera Administrative Region. Casiwan received a trophy and a cash award amounting to P50,000.

The EAGLE Award aims to "strengthen the culture of organizational and leadership excellence in the DENR as it carries out its important role in ensuring the conservation, management, development, and proper use of the country's environment and natural resources."

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Water Iily-infested Laguna Lake to get DENR's attention next

The Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) is keen on cleaning up Laguna de Bay (Laguna Lake) next following the agency's works on Boracay Island and Manila Bay.

In particular, the DENR bared in a statement Monday, June 14 that it wants to rid Laguna de Bay of its water hyacinth or water lily problem, which has been going on for some time.

"I personally commit that in the coming weeks or so, we will be here in this lake to clean up all the water hyacinth and make sure that we will prevent incidents in the previous years where this lake is all covered with water lilies," DENR Undersecretary Benny Antiporda said.

"We have rehabilitated Boracay. We are cleaning up the Manila Bay. Laguna Lake is relatively not that big. Why not, we clean this up, too?" added Antiporda, who is the undersecretary for Solid Waste Management and Local Government Units Concerns and head of the Manila Bay Anti-Pollution Task Force.

Water hyacinths are an invasive plant species that can take over the entire surface of a body of water if left unchecked. They can be a nuisance since they allow disease-spreading vector species of mosquitoes to breed freely in the static waters. The plants' decomposition results in a foul odor, decreases the clarity of water, and depletes the level of dissolved oxygen in the water, making it unsuitable for human use.

Antiporda said that the DENR will continue its project, which started in October 2020, to tap local fishermen in addressing the spread of water lilies.

"The Department of Environment and Natural Resources has a project where we commission the labor or assistance of our local fishermen to harvest the water hyacinths in polluted waterbodies," he said.

According to him, the project provides livelihood to the fisherfolk and at the same time "gives life to the Bay".

Antiporda, who promised to supervise the project, expressed confidence in getting the job done at Laguna Lake in the light of the successful rehabilition of the world-famous Boracay Island.

The national government closed down Boracay for six months in 2018 to fix the various ecological problems that have accumulated at the popular tourist destination. So bad was the state of the island that President Duterte described it as a "cesspool".

The DENR has also been rehabilitating and beautifying Manila Bay under a P389-million effort, which began in 2020. The funds were allocated back in 2019.

MANILA, Philippines – Tiniyak ng Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) noong June 11 ang pag-alis sa water hyacinth sa Laguna Lake sa pamamagitan ng pakikipagtulungan sa local fishing communities.

Ayon kay Undersecretary for Solid Waste Management and Local Government Units Concerns at Head ng Manila Bay Anti-Pollution Task Force Benny D. Antiporda, ipagpapatuloy ng DENR ang proyekto na sinimulan noong Oktubre 2020 na kunin ang serbisyo ng mga mangingisda upang mapigilan ang pagkalat ng water hyacinth na mas kilala sa tawag na water lily.

"The Department of Environment and Natural Resources has a project where we commission the labor or assistance of our local fishermen to harvest the water hyacinths in polluted waterbodies," saad ni Antiporda sa ginanap na cleanup drive sa Binangonan, Rizal na inisyatibo ng Rotary Club of Binangonan noong Hunyo 11.

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DENR expediting Manila Bay rehab project -Antiporda

The Department of Environment and Natural Resources is expediting the rehabilitation of Manila Bay despite criticisms against its beach nourishment project.

At the Laging Handa briefing on Monday, Environment Undersecretary Benny Antiporda said the DENR aims to complete the project and open it to the public next month.

"The DENR is fast-tracking everything. Secretary Roy Cimatu personally supervises the project," said Antiporda. "Rest assured that our countrymen will notice big changes in the appearance of Manila Bay."

Earlier, environmentalists and fisherfolk said the dumping of crushed dolomite along the shoreline <u>would not help solve the root of the environmental problems</u> in Manila Bay.

Critics also pointed out that the project was ill-timed as the country is still facing a health crisis and its effects on the economy.

Interior Undersecretary Jonathan Malaya said last September that the project was <u>approved by Congress under the 2019 national budget, it underwent competitive bidding, and was awarded before the COVID-19 pandemic.</u>

Malaya also said that only P28 million of the P389-million allocation for Manila Bay's rehabilitation and cleanup was used for the crushed dolomite.

"The government cannot simply stop a project when it is already under contractual obligation to proceed. We also have a responsibility to clean up and rehabilitate Manila Bay for ourselves and future generations," he said. — DVM, GMA News





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Manila Bay's 389-M 'white sand' project eyed for completion by July

Metro Manila (CNN Philippines, June 14) — The Manila Bay's "white sand" project is expected to be completed early in the third quarter, the Department of Environment and Natural Resources said Monday.

Asked on updates on the government's massive Manila Bay rehabilitation project, DENR Usec. Benny Antiporda said the agency is "fast-tracking everything".

"Minamadali na para sa July ay ma-open or matapos na 'yan. Rest assured na ang taumbayan ay may makikitang malaking pagbabago," he said.

[Translation: We're ramping up [the rehabilitation] so we could open or complete it by July. Rest assured that our citizens will see huge changes.]

Antiporda, in a mobile message, clarified that he was referring to the DENR's beach nourishment project.

The program covers the cleanup of the Bay area as well as the controversial overlaying of artificial white sand on the beach, for a whopping 389 million.

The fund allotted for the dumping of crushed dolomite rocks has been receiving criticism not just from ordinary citizens, but also government officials.

Vice President Leni Robredo, for instance, called the DENR "insensitive" for focusing on the beautification of the area at the height of the pandemic.

Antiporda, however, previously said that the project has been studied thoroughly, with "engineering intervention."

He also stressed that the multimillion-peso funding was not solely earmarked for the dolomite rocks.

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DENR, SMC Partnered for Major Pasig River Dredging Project

The Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) and conglomerate San Miguel Corporation (SMC) on Wednesday, June 9, officially commenced the Pasig River Dredging Project, a major venture to rehabilitate one of the largest river systems connected to Manila Bay.

The signing of the memorandum of agreement (MOA), held at the Petron Sales Training Office in Manila, signifies the start of the project and the commitment of DENR and SMC to work together in the dredging and cleanup of Pasig River.

"This project does not only directly complement our ongoing rehabilitation of Manila Bay, but one can just imagine the positive impacts the cleanup and rehabilitation of Pasig River could bring to the majority of our population and to the ecosystems that connect to it," said DENR Secretary Roy A. Cimatu.





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The dredging project, which is part of SMC's commitment to the Adopt-a-River Program, aims to improve Pasig River's water flow and mitigate flooding by deepening and widening the shallow and narrow portions of the waterbody.

The ongoing Tullahan-Tinajeros River Rehabilitation Project is SMC's first Adopt-a-River partnership with the DENR.

"Indeed, this is another significant step towards our ultimate goal of restoring and enhancing the environmental integrity of Pasig River, one of the most iconic and important waterways in the country," Cimatu said.

In the agreement, DENR will provide the technical expertise for the project while SMC will provide manpower support and dredging equipment.

The implementation of the dredging project will also involve the Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH), the Metropolitan Manila Development Authority, the Department of the Interior and Local Government, and the Philippine Coast Guard, whose officials have expressed support for the project during the MOA signing.

SMC President Ramon Ang regarded the event as a "very historic gathering" as representatives from various government agencies, along with the local governments of Manila and Mandaluyong, were also in attendance.

After the MOA signing, a site and equipment inspection for the initial operations were also held in the former Pandacan Oil Terminal.

The SMC has identified the narrow and shallow portions of the river along the Pandacan-Paco area, Estrella in Makati City, and near C5 Road, Manila Bay, and EDSA, as priority dredging sites.

The SMC said that larger equipment will be used as the Pasig River is a much bigger river system compared to the Tullahan-Tinajeros River.

Ang said that SMC has invested in a cutter suction dredger—which can dredge 1,000 tons per hour, 10,000 tons per 10 hours a day, or 3 million tons a year—and hopper barge for high volume dredging and transfer of dredged materials to a designated site.

He said they are also looking into conducting percussion drilling for areas that are difficult to dredge due to heavy materials.

Under the MOA, the DENR will also help in the evaluation of soil test results to be conducted by the SMC to identify the location and find the best usage for the dredged materials.

Moreover, it will assist in the application for an environmental compliance certificate or ECC for the relocation site of dredged materials.

"On behalf of the DENR, I would like to extend our sincerest thanks to SMC for its unwavering and continuing commitment to various environmental causes," Cimatu said.

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'Burning stone' contains meteorite-like element

THE alleged burning stone that recently fell at the grounds of Negros Occidental High School (NOHS) in Bacolod City was found to have a metal component that is also present in a meteorite locally known as "bulalakaw."

A team from the Department of Environment and Natural Resources-Mines and Geosciences Bureau (DENR-MGB) in Western Visayas arrived at the school to examine the stone Monday, June 14, 2021.

Geologist Arnel Angelo Olarde, DENR-MGB focal person for Provincial Environment and Natural Resources Office-Negros Occidental, said the magnetic test is used to ascertain whether an object is a meteorite.

"A meteorite will attract the magnet as it has iron and nickel elements," he said, adding that in this case, it does not hold tight.

The team tried to chip the stone to further examine its mineral content. However, they have no tools to use.

It is hard to break the stone into pieces, so they recommended to send it to the National Museum of the Philippines in Manila for a laboratory test.





'Burning stone' contains meteorite-like element

Mario Amaca, principal of NOHS, said he has already coordinated with the National Museum for the conduct of the "confirmatory" test.

Amaca said they will send the stone to Manila as soon as travel restrictions have been eased.

"Let us wait for the result. We will keep the stone for the meantime," he added.

On Sunday evening, the school official said that as per initial assessment of the National Museum using the images and videos of the stone, there was a 70 to 80 percent probability that it was a meteorite.

It can be recalled that the "burning stone" reportedly fell near the baracks of the security guards inside the school premise around 4 p.m. of June 4.

A wife of a security guard found the three-inch rock believed to be a meteorite following a loud burst similar to an exploding electric transformer.

It destroyed a trunk of Gemelina tree and styrofoam box.

"The stone was burning," Amaca said, qouting the staff who first found the object and brought it at his office.

The black stone is smooth, light and can fit a palm.

Once confirmed that it is a meteorite, it will be used by the school for its special science classes.

"It is a blessing for us as it will enable our students to see an actual meteorite if ever," Amaca said, as he dismissed claims by some that the it was just a hearsay.

MANDAUE CITY, Cebu — The Philippine Reclamation Authority (PRA) has already given its go signal for the P20 billion Minglanilla Techno-Business Park or the Ming-Mori reclamation project to proceed.

Lawyer Janilo Rubiato, PRA general manager and CEO, entered into a Memordum of Agreement with town officials led by Mayor Elanito Peña on Friday, June 11, with Jose Soberano III, Cebu Landmasters Inc (CLI) CEO, acting as witness.

Soberano is also chairman and president of CLI affiliate, Ming-Mori Development Corp., the developer and manager of the 100-hectare technohub that is envisioned to become Central Visayas' regional growth center.

"The project will take CLI to a brand-new level and widen the range of our customer base to include light-industrial and technology-driven companies," Soberano said in a statement.

"We aim to achieve a balanced and mutually supporting relationship between urban mixed-use development, light-industrial land use and environmental stewardship. This will be our formula for sustainable growth and development," he added.

PRA coordinates and administers all reclamation projects in the country and its approval is an indication that "the government has thoroughly evaluated the undertaking," CLI said in a statement.

In 2020, the Ming-Mori project was issued an Environmental Compliance Certificate (ECC) by the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) after more than five years of rigid and comprehensive review.

CLI will develop and manage this high capital project with the support of its bank partners.

Early this year, the company was able to secure P3 billion notes at a very competitive rate to fund the early works for Ming-Mori project starting at the fourth quarter of 2021.

CLI has also strengthened its capital base by declaring 123 percent stock dividends to shareholders as of June 18, which will be paid on or before July 14. This move prepares the firm for any capital raising in the future.

"This is one of CLI's biggest projects thus far. Because of the scale of this project that will take several phases to develop, we have carefully and meticulously planned it to be sustainable and supportive of future generations," Soberano said.

The project's proximity to Cebu City "makes it a highly viable location for light manufacturing industries especially now that the province's main industrial parks are fully occupied."





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Ming-Mori will also have its own port facilities to connect its industries with the global economy.

To further attract locators, Ming-Mori's first phase will include commercial, residential and institutional zones "to create enough diversity to make it a vibrant community at the outset," Soberano said.

Jobs that will soon be offered by its light manufacturing firms is expected to "draw workers and their families into the area to create a critical mass of residents supported by residential and commercial areas, schools, churches, and other institutions."

"As more areas become available and are developed, CLI envisions a vibrant waterfront community with lifestyle, business and industry woven together."

Mayor Pena, for his part said, the "Ming-Mori Techno Business Park is the long-awaited realization of a dream of many Minglanillahanons that would later become a representation of progress that all of us will be forever grateful for."

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Ecowaste group flags improper disposal of face masks, other wastes amid dengue threat

MANILA, Philippines — The improper disposal of face masks and face shields, along with that of other waste materials, is providing the perfect breeding ground for aedes aegypti mosquitoes, which spread viruses that cause dengue and other fever diseases.

In a statement on Monday, environmental health group EcoWaste Coalition said that while acknowledging the need for face masks and face shields at this time of the pandemic, there is need for a sustainable waste management in order to prevent the outbreak of dengue and other diseases, and lessen the burden on the health sector.

"By ecologically managing our discards, we prevent the collection of water in snack packs, plastic containers, tin cans, broken appliances, used tires, and even in used face masks where dengue transmitting Aedes aegypti mosquitoes can lay their eggs," Jove Benosa, Zero Waste Campaigner from EcoWaste Coalition, said.

The group likewise urged the public to give all-out support to ecological solid waste management at the household level and in the community to lessen the <u>dengue</u> cases amid the <u>pandemic</u>.

The Department of Health has proposed a four-step strategy, called 4-S, in fighting dengue — (1) search and destroy mosquito-breeding sites, (2) secure self-protection measures, (3) seek early medical consultation, and (4) support fogging/spraying only in hotspot areas.

"Preventing and controlling dengue outbreaks is very important as the country's healthcare system is already facing tremendous pressure due to the COVID-19 pandemic. We need to avoid dengue and other rainy season diseases from further stretching the system's capacity to serve our people's health needs," Benosa said.

The zero-waste advocacy group urged the public to observe 12-point eco-tips:

- Properly manage household discards, keeping non-biodegradables dry and clean.
- Inspect and remove standing water at home, in your garden and neighborhood.
- Turn over, store in a dry place or dispose of containers that may collect water.
- Cover water drums, pails and tanks with lids or mosquito-proof mesh.
- Empty and clean water containers thoroughly once a week.
- Change water in flower vases weekly.
- Remove water from pot plates every other day.
- Clean plant pots that may harbor mosquitoes.
- Loosen soil in potted plants to prevent water from stagnating on the surface
- Clean animal drinking containers daily.
- Cut or puncture tires used as roof support to avoid collecting water.
- Clean clogged roof gutters of leaves and other debris.

The group also encouraged the public to avoid unregistered household insecticides, including mosquito repellent products, which may pose health and environmental risks.

The Department of Environment and Natural Resources recently called on local government units to pass ordinances that would direct barangays (villages) in implementing waste segregation. — Faith Yuen Wei Ragasa, Inquirer trainee

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'Declare Marinduque as mine-free zone'

A local nongovernment organization (NGO) based in Marinduque is appealing to President Duterte to deny all mining applications in the island province.

The Marinduque Council for Environmental Concerns, Inc. (MACEC) based in Boac, Marinduque is a support group for plaintiffs in a case filed against Barrick Gold, Marcopper Mining Corp., and Placer Dome Inc.

Marcopper and Placer Dome, Inc. are based in Canada. The company figured in the 1996 toxic spillage when the drainage tunnels of its open-pit mines broke causing about 2 to 3 million tons of toxic mine tailings.

To support its appeal to Duterte, the group has forwarded resolutions and statements to the Regional Office of the National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA) for MIMAROPA, including an appeal from Former Associate of the Supreme Court and now Marinduque Governor Presbitero Velasco Jr. to the president to deny all mining applications in Marinduque.

In the document submitted to the office of NEDA OIC-Director Augustin Mendoza, the group stated that 41 resolutions and statements from the provincial government of Marinduque and civil society organizations are urging the national government to deny mining applications in the province. The provincial government, academe and civil society groups also want to delist Marinduque in the mining tenement area and to declare the province a mining-free zone in response to the lifting of the mining moratorium under Executive Order (EO) 130 issued by Malacañang.

"The petition filed by the people of the Province of Marinduque contained an overwhelming evidence and reasons against allowing corporations to mine the island," Yoly Esguerra, National Coordinator Church-based NGO Partnership Mission for People's Initiatives, said in a statement.

The groups also appealed for the revocation of Duterte's EO 130.

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Villar seeks measure to protect oceans

Alarmed by experts' reports that the world's seas will turn into "virtual desserts" by 2050, Senator Cynthia Villar pushed for legislative measures to protect the sustainability and biodiversity of the country's oceans.

Villar made the call as she joined the international community in celebrating this year's World Oceans Day, which is observed to educate the public of the impact of human action on the ocean and to mobilize people for the sustainable management of the world's ocean.

This year's celebration also marks the start of the UN Decade of Ocean Science for Sustainable Development which will run from 2021 to 2030.

As chairperson of the Senate Committee on Environment, Natural Resources and Climate Change, Villar is strongly pushing for the passage of Senate Bill No. 1331, a measure institutionalizing EPR or the Extended Producer Responsibility mechanism.

EPR is part of the country's solid waste management system.

Villar said it is a strategy to reduce the proliferation of single-use plastics that end up in the oceans and pollute the environment.

This measure, she said, would ensure that the responsibility for the entire life cycle of plastic products rests on the manufacturers.

It mandates manufacturers to recover plastic wastes from their products as a mechanism towards achieving an efficient solid waste management.

"We should be all responsible enough to protect our oceans, our source of marine resources and protein," Villar said.

"Our plastic waste problem is an environmental issue we need to urgently address if we are to help in ecosystem restoration and in the conservation of our oceans," she added.

The local government of Quezon City will put up air quality monitoring sensors to determine the pollution levels.

The sensors will measure pollutants such as the most dangerous particulate matter 2.5 (PM 2.5) which comes from the emissions of cars, trucks, and industrial facilities. Long-term exposure to this pollutant affects the residents' health as the particles travel deeply into the lungs and bloodstreams and can worsen health problems such as asthma and heart disease.

"Quezon City is very grateful to C40 Cities and Clean Air Asia for their continuous assistance in capacitating city officials and technical staff in terms of developing a more comprehensive strategy to improve air quality in the city. Through these air quality monitoring sensors, we will be able to gather the city's air quality baseline data that will help us in planning and determining programs, projects, and policies to reach our goal," Mayor Joy Belmonte said.

Mayor Belmonte and Environment Protection and Waste Management Department (EPWMD) head Andrea Villaroman received eight units of air quality sensors and the "Roadmap for Quezon City's Air Quality Management Plan" from Clean Air Asia and C40 Cities Climate Leadership Group through its C40 Air Quality Technical Assistance Program.

In the next two months, the monitoring sensors will be placed in areas with high public risk for air pollution exposure.

The city identified some monitoring sites such as areas in Novaliches, Sto. Domingo, and Quezon Memorial Circle.

Historical data from ground and satellite-based measurements will be analyzed and the city will form air quality solutions which will become part of the Air Quality Management Plan of the Quezon City Government.

Series of technical training about operation and management of air quality monitoring networks were conducted for the officers from EPWMD, Information Technology Development Department (ITDD), and the Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Office (DRRMO).

Quezon City Mayor Joy Belmonte on Monday ordered the city's environmentalists to put up air quality sensors in pollution hot spots in a bid to strengthen the city's commitment to lessen air pollution.

Belmonte tasked the Environment Protection and Waste Management Department head Andrea Villaroman tocarry out the project after receiving eight units of air quality sensors and the "Roadmap for Quezon City's Air Quality Management Plan" from Clean Air Asia and C40 Cities Climate Leadership Group through its C40 Air Quality Technical Assistance Program.

The sensors will measure pollutants such as the most dangerous particulate matter 2.5 (PM 2.5) which comes from the emissions of cars, trucks, and industrial facilities.

Long-term exposure to this pollutant affects the residents' health as the particles travel deeply into lungs and blood streams and can worsen conditions such as asthma and heart disease.

"The comprehensive trainings which Clean Air Asia provided covered guidance on data analysis, visualization, and interpretation to help the government better communicate to the public what the air quality data means. The DOST-Industrial Technology and Development Institute, in partnership with the Provincial Science and Technology Center (PSTC) Laguna, held a two-day webinar on the conduct of Water Analysis and Characterization Study (WACS) with 14 LGUs from Laguna as participants last May 18-20.

"Through the expertise of DOST-ITDI, the Municipal Environment and Natural Resources Officers (MENROs) from Siniloan, Paete, Magdalena, Luisiana, Pakil, Majayjay, Kalayaan, Mabitac, Calauan, Los Baños, San Pablo, Sta Cruz, Rizal and San Pedro were equipped with necessary skills to conduct their WACS plans," the DOST said in a statement issued on Monday, June 14.

It noted that the webinar is timely, considering that Republic Act No. 9003 or the Ecological Solid Waste Management Act requires all LGUs to revisit their 10-year Solid Waste Management plans to make them responsive to the current situation in their respective localities.

"Learning outcomes from this webinar-training will be used by the local government units to comply to RA No. 9003 or the Ecological Solid Waste Management Act."

During the webinar, the LGUs were taught "to determine appropriate sample sizes, identify sources of wastes from households to industrial establishments, and prepare a worksheet to be used for the preparation of their WACS plan.





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DOST-Calabarzon's Officer in Charge-Assistant Regional Director for Technical Operations Engr. Francisco Barquilla III urged the participants to "adhere to science-based solid waste management systems that are compliant with the law."

The clean-up team, which also included officials from SM Mall of Asia (MOA) and SM By the Bay, sought to remove solid waste and debris from SM MOA's stretch of the bay, according to statement sent by a public relations agency. The activity took place on June 8, which fell on World Oceans Day.

"Being a responsible integrated property developer, SM Prime has always been aware of its role as a member of the community to help care for the environment, including our seas and oceans," SM Prime's Senior Vice-President for Special Projects Siegfred B. Mison said.

Coca-Cola aims to help solve the global plastic packaging crisis by providing inclusive circular economy solutions. These include projects to prevent recyclable packaging from ending up in

The project will involve collaboration with 27 junk shops and 20 waste collectors in the target area who will be educated on the different plastic types.

Through PBSP, the collectors will be provided with tools for collection such as tri-bikes and other resources to support their health and livelihoods such as personal protective equipment (PPEs), health insurance, and vitamins. These are on top of the premiums they receive collecting recyclable plastic materials that can help in improving and uplifting their lives.

"The problem of solid waste, particularly flexible plastic, has skyrocketed during the pandemic and threatens the environment more than ever. This project, while helping the environment, will help waste pickers in Muntinlupa earn income from the waste collected," said Elvin Ivan Y. Uy, PBSP executive director. "PBSP and Coca-Cola aim to make the project more responsive and inclusive. While our advocacy is to lessen waste in the environment, this project also ensures that upcycling activities like PLAF's will help make our waste reduction efforts sustainable."

Plastic waste gathered by partner collectors will be sold to the designated junk shops, who will then deliver the raw materials to PLAF facilities for upcycling.

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Solon seeks more investments in renewable energy

MANILA – To encourage large power consumers to invest in the electricity sector and develop the use of indigenous and renewable energy (RE) resources, Senator Win Gatchalian proposed the removal of the 100-kilowatt size limit in the installation of power generation facilities under the net metering program through Senate Bill 2219.

Removing the 100-kilowatt cap will allow large electricity consumers such as commercial establishments, industrial buildings, and government offices to avail of the net-metering program under Republic Act 9513, otherwise known as the Renewable Energy Act of 2008.

Gatchalian said it will encourage more investments in RE while at the same time provide support in terms of savings to industries that have the capacity to install power generator facilities such as solar panels on their rooftops.

"The rooftop now becomes a resource. Kung mayroong kang (If you have) rooftop, it's as good as real estate kasi puwede kang magkabit doon ng panels at mag-generate ng (because you can install panels and generate) revenue," Gatchalian, chairperson of the Senate Energy Committee, said in a news release on Monday.

In filing Senate Bill 2219, Gatchalian noted that the net-metering program is not maximized as only 53 or 37.32 percent out of the 142 distribution utilities (DUs) are qualified end-users for net-metering as of March 31, 2021.

Aside from the removal of the 100-kW cap, the proposed bill mandates the Energy Regulatory Commission (ERC) to regularly determine the cap taking into consideration the possible effects on the stability of the grid and the retail rates of captive customers and further streamline the

submissions and permitting process to include minimum requirements for local government units, all under the time frames provided in Republic Act 11234, otherwise known as the Energy Virtual One Stop-Shop Act (EVOSS).

To further promote and encourage commercial development of RE projects, RA 9513 provided the net-metering program where electricity customers are allowed to install an RE facility within their premises up to a capacity of 100kW and any excess electricity not consumed is exported to a DU and in return, the customer is compensated through credits in their monthly bill.

Those RE installations above the 100kW ceiling are not covered by the net-metering program. (PR)



Nature-based solutions (NbS) are woefully underfunded with the public sector coughing-up the majority of investment, which is still inadequate, according to an inaugural <u>State of Finance for Nature</u> report by the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP).

Global annual spending to avoid the breakdown of natural ecosystem "services" such as clean water, food and flood protection needs to triple this decade to about US\$350 billion by 2030 and rise to US\$536 billion by 2050, the UN report said.

The report, published on 27 May, looked at how to tackle the planet's climate, biodiversity and land degradation crises, estimating that about US\$8 trillion in investment is needed by mid-century to safeguard natural systems.

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PH Covid-19 recoveries now 1,240,112

MANILA – The Department of Health (DOH) on Monday reported 7,145 new recoveries, pushing its overall count to 1,240,112.

This is equivalent to 93.8 percent of the country's total case count which has reached 1,322,053 since the start of the pandemic in March last year.

In its latest case bulletin, the agency also logged 6,426 new confirmed cases and 57 new deaths.

These figures bring the overall tally of active cases to 59,096 and the death toll to 22,845.

The latest figures showed 91.8 percent of the active cases are mild, 3.9 percent are asymptomatic, 1.8 percent are severe, 1.28 percent are moderate, and 1.3 percent are in critical condition.

"There were 12 duplicates removed from the total case count as four of these are recoveries. Moreover, 10 cases previously tagged as recovered were reclassified as deaths after final validation," it said.

DOH data on June 12, likewise, showed that 13.7 percent of 41,244 who were tested turned out positive for Covid-19.

All laboratories were operational on June 12 while 10 laboratories were not able to submit their data to the Covid-19 Document Repository System (CDRS).

"Based on data in the last 14 days, the 10 non-reporting laboratories contribute, on average, 1.9 percent of samples tested and 21 percent of positive individuals," the DOH said.

To date, 58 percent of 3,500 intensive care unit beds, 47 percent of 19,200 isolation beds, 48 percent of 12,500 ward beds, and 36 percent of 2,700 ventilators dedicated to patients with Covid-19 are in use nationwide.

Meanwhile, 47 percent of 1,200 intensive care unit beds, 37 percent of 4,800 isolation beds, 33 percent of 3,600 ward beds, and 34 percent of 1,000 ventilators dedicated to patients with Covid-19 are being used in the National Capital Region.

The public is reminded again to stay at home and to observe minimum health standards when going out.

The DOH urged those experiencing Covid-19 symptoms to immediately isolate and contact the Barangay Health Emergency Response Teams. (PNA)

MANILA — President Rodrigo Duterte on Monday said Metro Manila and surrounding Bulacan, Cavite, Laguna, and Rizal provinces—which government calls NCR Plus—would stay under general community quarantine (GCQ) with varying degrees of restrictions, until the end of June.

At the same time, the President said 21 areas would be under modified enhanced community quarantine from June 16 to 30, the second toughest lockdown level.

Duterte said the capital region and Bulacan will be under GCQ "with some restrictions" from June 16 to 30.

Meanwhile, Rizal, Laguna and Cavite will also be under GCQ, but "with heightened restrictions," during the same period, he said in a forced briefing.

Home to about 24 million people, NCR Plus was previously under GCQ "with restrictions".

Looser quarantine levels allow businesses to operate at higher capacity.

The congested capital region, an urban sprawl of 16 cities and a municipality, account for about two-thirds of the country's gross domestic product.

Extended coronavirus curbs will continue to hurt the Philippines' economy, which posted a record 9.6 percent slump last year.

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

COVAX welcomes G7 commitment to share 870M vaccine doses

GENEVA – Partners for the COVAX initiative on Sunday welcomed a commitment by G7 countries to share at least 870 million doses, but the head of the World Health Organization (WHO) said more doses are needed with faster delivery.

"COVAX welcomes dose sharing commitments for 870 million additional doses to support equitable access to vaccines in 2021 and 2022, with the aim to deliver at least half by the end of 2021," the WHO said in a statement.

However, WHO Director-General Tedros Ghebreyesus said "We welcome the generous announcements about donations of vaccines and thank leaders. But we need more, and we need them faster."

"Many other countries are now facing a surge in cases — and they are facing it without vaccines. We are in the race of our lives, but it's not a fair race, and most countries have barely left the starting line."

COVAX is the vaccines pillar for equitable access to vaccines co-convened by the Coalition for Epidemic Preparedness Innovations (CEPI), the Vaccine Alliance (Gavi) and the WHO, working with the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF).

At its meeting in Cornwall, UK which ended Sunday, the G7 announced pledges of 870 million vaccine doses, with a goal of delivering at least half of them by the end of this year.
