# **Cebu Customs seizes used printing machines**

The Bureau of Customs of the Port of Cebu confiscated on Tuesday used printing machinery from Japan without pre-shipment importation clearance from the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR).

Acting Cebu Customs district collector Atty. Charlito Martin Mendoza revealed that after stringent profiling, the Environmental Protection and Compliance Division-Enforcement and Security Service requested the issuance of Alert Order after verification with DENR-Environmental Management Bureau (EMB) showed that the importer is not registered with the agency and that no Pre-Shipment Importation Clearance was issued for the shipment.

Mendoza immediately issued a Warrant of Seizure and Detention order against the shipment after finding probable cause for violation of Section 1113(f) and (I-5) in relation to Section 117 of the Customs Modernization and Tariff Act and DENR-EMB Department Administration Order No. 2013-22.

Under the department order, importers of used printing machinery must be registered with the agency and the shipment must be covered with Pre-Shipment Importation Clearance to be applied for at least 30 working days prior to actual importation.

"The Port of Cebu, with the guidance of commissioner Rey Leonardo Guerrero, remains fully committed in securing the country's borders from the entry of prohibited and unlicensed goods," Mendoza said.

Ayon kay Executive Director David, "Para sa DICT, nais kong pasalamatan at pagpahalagahan naming nakasama ang sektor ng tubig. Sa tingin ko, magandang diskusyon ito at nasa tamang tiyempo. Hindi na namin kinakailangang maghintay kung kailan papasukan ng mga scammer at pag-usapan kung papaano protektahan ang ating imprastraktura ng tubig at lahat ng sektor ng tubig sa pangkalahatan."

Nagbigay ng babala ang DICT Cybersecurity Bureau sa NWRB at sa publiko na manatiling mapagmatyag at obserbahan ang mga sumusunod:

- Makatatanggap ka ng isang notification sa Facebook na may nag-tag sa iyo sa isang post.
- Lumilitaw na ito ay isang link para sa nasa hustong gulang / for adult " ang video, at may isang dosenang kasama rin sa-tag din na gumagamit ng Facebook.
- Sa pag-click ninyo sa link, may lilitaw na isang window na nagsasabing kinakailangan mong mag-download at i-update ang inyong Flash Player bago mo mapanood ang video.

Kung sakali sinunod ninyo ang pag-download ng file, saka lang ninyo malalaman na hindi talaga isang pag-update. Ito ay isang malware.

## P351,000 worth of illegal logs seized in Bulacan

Authorities seized some P351,000 worth of illegal logs and arrested four suspects during an anti-illegal logging operation at Sito Sumacbao, Barangay Kalawakan, in Dona Remedios Trinidad, Bulacan on Wednesday, Oct. 13.

The operation was conducted by members of Doña Remedios Trinidad Police and the City Environment and Natural Resources Office at about 5 p.m..

Col. Manuel M. Lukban Jr., acting Bulacan police director, identified the arrested suspects as Christian Lungalong, July Tamayo, Aldrin Jay Berin, and Rodel Dayson, all residents of Pias, Gen Tinio, Nueva Ecija.

The operatives seized from the suspects illegally cut Lauan and Tangile lumbers.

The recovered pieces of evidence are now in the custody of CENRO Baliuag.

Appropriate criminal charges will be filed against the suspects, police said.

Lukban said that while in the midst of COVID-19 crisis, Bulacan police will remain unrelenting in implementing its intensified campaign against all forms of criminality.

# 80% of youth suffer from climate anxiety – study

A new study on climate anxiety showed that eight of 10 young people around the world are extremely worried about climate change.

"Forty-five percent globally reported that their feelings toward the prevailing climate crisis are having negative impacts on daily functioning, which include eating, concentrating on work and school, sleeping, spending time in nature, playing, having fun and dealing with relationships," the Climate Reality Project Philippines said.

"In the Philippines, this number went up to a worrying 75 percent, with the report recognizing that young people in the global south are experiencing more severe climate anxiety, which is defined by the American Psychiatric Association as a chronic fear of environmental doom," the group added.

These figures were shared by Caroline Hickman, a psychotherapist and teaching fellow at the University of Bath in the United Kingdom, during the 18th episode of The Climate Reality Project Philippines' Klimatotohanan webcast series.

Hickman is a co-author of the study titled "Young People's Voices on Climate Anxiety, Government Betrayal and Moral Injury: A Global Phenomenon."

She is also a board member of the Climate Psychological Alliance, a non-profit organization that aims to address the psychological dimensions of the climate and ecological crisis.

The study has been released on a pre-publication basis by the scientific journal Lancet Planetary Health while it is undergoing peer review.

It was the first large-scale investigation of climate anxiety in children and young people globally and its relationship to government response.

The group surveyed 10,000 children and young people, aged 16 to 25 years from Australia, Brazil, Finland, France, India, Nigeria, Philippines, Portugal, UK and USA.

The group noted that the results of the survey among the Filipino youth are sobering.

"Seventy-one percent of the respondents think that they won't have access to the same opportunities that their parents had. Seventy-seven percent think that their family's economic, social, and physical security will be threatened. Forty-seven percent are hesitant to have children because of climate change," Hickman said.

She said that climate anxiety is not a mental illness.

"But if we put together the realities of climate change with climate anxiety and global inadequate action, what we are looking at are chronic, inescapable stressors that will inevitably impact the mental health of children and young people."

### Millions of trees make a difference

Severe Tropical Storm Maring, the latest weather disturbance that hit the country, destroyed about P692 million worth of agricultural products, according to the Department of Agriculture. Over 32,000 farmers from the Cordillera Administrative Region, Ilocos Region, Cagayan Valley, Central Luzon, Bicol Region, and Western Visayas reported production losses, which reached 43,984 metric tons from 36,537 hectares of agricultural farms. Destroyed commodities include rice, corn, high value crops, livestock and fish.

Maring was not classified as a typhoon, but it brought unusually heavy rains, causing flash floods and landslides in northern Luzon and Palawan, leaving at least 13 people dead and 22 missing. Social-media posts described how residents of Cagayan, La Union, Ilocos Norte, Benguet, and nearby provinces spent a sleepless night on Monday as Severe Tropical Storm Maring battered Northern Luzon.

The adverse effects of climate change were observed in Baguio City when Maring dumped 625.5 millimeters of rain, more than a month's worth, in a 24-hour period ending on Tuesday morning, according to the Philippine Atmospheric, Geophysical and Astronomical Services Administration. It was more than the average rainfall of 454.3 mm that Baguio's rainfall monitoring station gets for the whole month of October, based on Pagasa's climate records over a 30-year period.

From <u>npr.org</u>: "Global warming is driving dangerous and disruptive flooding in underground rail systems around the world. Flooded tunnels and stations have disrupted service and stranded passengers in Boston, London, San Francisco, Taipei, Bangkok, Washington, D.C., and a host of other cities in recent years. But the problem has taken on added urgency this summer, with multiple, high-profile subway floods driven by summer rainstorms. Overnight, the remnants of Hurricane Ida flooded much of the New York City subway. Mayor Bill de Blasio issued a travel ban and <u>warned residents</u> to "stay off subways" as up to 10 inches of rain fell in some parts of the region in a matter of hours."

Germany-based FloodList, a private group that monitors flood events from around the world, recorded 124 flood events across 385 locations in more than 20 countries in July. In an article the group published in August—*Flood Risk Will Rise as Climate Heat Intensifies*—FloodList said: "In a world of climate change, the flood risk will be more intense and more frequent, presenting higher danger to ever more people in a greater number of countries. In this century alone, the global population has increased by 18 percent. But the number of people exposed to damage and death by rising waters has increased by more than 34 percent."

Developing countries, including the Philippines, were promised \$100 billion a year in climate finance by rich countries more than a decade ago. However, data from the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development showed that climate finance reached only \$80 billion in 2019. The COP 26 UN Climate Change Conference, hosted by the UK in partnership with Italy, which will take place from October 31 to November 12, 2021 in Glasgow, UK is the ideal forum where developing countries could remind the rich nations to fulfill their longstanding pledge to help poor countries cope with the effects of climate change.

Given our limited capacity to cope with climate extremes like severe flooding, we need the climate funding to help us address the adverse effects of climate change. As we wait for help to come, however, we should continue planting more trees that catch rainfall and help take water from the soil. But we need millions of them to make a real difference.



## What is climate change? A really simple guide

World temperatures are rising because of human activity, and climate change now threatens every aspect of human life.

Left unchecked, humans and nature will experience catastrophic warming, with worsening droughts, greater sea level rise and mass extinction of species.

We face a huge challenge, but there are potential solutions.

#### What is climate change?

Climate is the average weather in a place over many years. Climate change is a shift in those average conditions.


The rapid climate change we are now seeing is caused by humans using oil, gas and coal for their homes, factories and transport.

When these fossil fuels burn, they releases greenhouse gases - mostly carbon dioxide (CO2). These gases trap the Sun's heat and cause the planet's temperature to rise.

The world is now about 1.2C warmer than it was in the 19th Century - and **the amount of CO2** in the atmosphere has risen by 50%.

Temperature rises must slow down if we want to avoid the worst consequences of climate change, scientists say. They say global warming needs to be **kept to 1.5C by 2100**.

However, unless further action is taken, <u>the planet could still warm by more than 2C</u> by the end of this century.

If nothing is done, <u>scientists think global warming could exceed 4C</u>, leading to devastating heatwaves, millions losing their homes to rising sea levels and irreversible loss of plant and animal species.

#### What is the impact of climate change?


Extreme weather events are already more intense, threatening lives and livelihoods.

With further warming, some regions could become uninhabitable, as <u>farmland turns into</u> <u>desert</u>. In other regions, the opposite is happening, with extreme rainfall causing historic flooding - as seen recently in China, Germany, Belgium and the Netherlands.

People in poorer countries will suffer the most as they do not have the money to adapt to climate change. Many farms in developing countries already have to endure climates that are too hot and this will only get worse.

#### How the world could get warmer

Projected annual average temperature change relative to 1850-1900, at different levels of global warming



Our oceans and its habitats are also under threat. The Great Barrier Reef in Australia, for example, has already <u>lost half of its corals since 1995</u> due to warmer seas driven by climate change.

<u>Wildfires are becoming more frequent</u> as climate change increases the risk of hot, dry weather.

And as frozen ground melts in places like Siberia, greenhouse gases trapped for centuries will be released into the atmosphere, worsening climate change.

In a warmer world, animals will find it harder to find the food and water they need to live. For example, polar bears could die out as the ice they rely on melts away, and elephants will struggle to find the 150-300 litres of water a day they need.

Scientists believe at least 550 species could be lost this century if action is not taken.

#### How will different parts of the world be affected?

Climate change has different effects in different areas of the world. Some places will warm more than others, some will receive more rainfall and others will face more droughts.

If temperature rise cannot be kept within 1.5C:

- The **UK** and **Europe** will be vulnerable to flooding caused by extreme rainfall
- Countries in the Middle East will experience extreme heatwaves and farmland could turn to desert
- Island nations in the **Pacific region** could disappear under rising seas
- Many African nations are likely to suffer droughts and food shortages
- Drought conditions are likely in the western US, while other areas will see more intense storms

Australia is likely to suffer extremes of heat and drought

#### What are governments doing?

Countries agree climate change can only be tackled by working together, and in a landmark agreement in Paris in 2015, they pledged to try to keep global warming to 1.5C.

The UK is hosting a summit for world leaders, <u>called COP26</u>, in November, where countries will set out their carbon reduction plans for 2030.

Many countries have pledged to get to net zero by 2050. This means reducing greenhouse gas emissions as much as possible and balancing out remaining emissions by absorbing an equivalent amount from the atmosphere.

Experts agree that **this is achievable**, but it will require governments, businesses and individuals to make big changes.

#### What can individuals do?

Major changes need to come from governments and businesses, but scientists say some small changes in our lives **can limit our impact on the climate**:

- Take fewer flights
- Live car-free or use an electric car
- Buy energy efficient products, such as washing machines, when they need replacing
- Switch from a gas heating system to an <u>electric heat pump</u>
- Insulate your home.

# Prince William tells space tourists: Fix Earth instead

LONDON, United Kingdom (AFP)—Britain's Prince William has launched an attack on space tourism, urging more attention on problems closer to home ahead of the COP26 climate summit.

The comments by Queen Elizabeth II's grandson were airing in a *BBC* interview later Thursday, a day after "Star Trek" star William Shatner became a real space traveller on Blue Origin's second crewed mission.

The mission replayed the company's maiden human flight in July, which

included its founder Jeff Bezos of Amazon and was seen as a breakthrough for the emerging space tourism sector.

But Prince William said: "We need some of the world's greatest brains and minds fixed on trying to repair this planet, not trying to find the next place to go and live."

William was speaking ahead of the inaugural Earthshot Prize awards ceremony on Sunday, his initiative to honor those working on environmental solutions.

# World must triple clean energy investment by 2030 to curb climate change

LONDON- Investment in renewable energy needs to triple by the end of the decade if the world hopes to effectively fight climate change and keep volatile energy markets under control, the International Energy Agency (IEA) said on Wednesday.

"The world is not investing enough to meet its future energy needs ... transition-related spending is gradually picking up, but remains far short of what is required to meet rising demand for energy services in a sustainable way," the IEA said.

"Clear signals and direction from policy makers are essential. If the road ahead is paved only with good intentions, then it will be a bumpy ride indeed," it added.

The Paris-based watchdog released its annual World Energy Outlook early this year to guide the United Nations COP26 climate change conference, now less than a month away.

It called the Glasgow, Scotland meeting the "first test of the readiness of countries to submit new and more ambitious commitments under the 2015 Paris Agreement" and "an opportunity to provide an 'unmistakeable signal' that accelerates the transition to clean energy worldwide."

In recent weeks, power prices surged to record levels as oil and natural gas prices hit multiyear highs and widespread energy shortages engulfed Asia, Europe and the United States. Fossil fuel demand is also recovering as governments ease curbs to contain the spread of COVID-19.

The IEA warned that renewables like solar, wind and hydropower along with bioenergy need to form a far bigger share in the rebound in energy investment after the pandemic.

Renewables will account for more than two-thirds of investment in new power capacity this year, the IEA noted, yet a sizeable gain in coal and oil use have caused the second largest annual increase in climate change-causing CO2 emissions.

The IEA said a faster energy transition will better shield consumers in the future, because a commodity price shock would drive up costs for households 30 percent less in its most ambitious Net Zero Emissions by 2050 (NZE) scenario versus in its more conservative Stated Policies Scenario (STEPS).

Still, the leap necessary to make good on pledges in the 2015 Paris Agreement to cap the rise in temperatures to as close as possible to 1.5 degrees Celsius above pre-industrial times remains vast.

Fossil fuels coal, natural gas and oil made up nearly 80 percent of world energy supply in 2020 and renewables just 12 percent.

To keep that rise near 1.5 degrees, the IEA's NZE prediction envisions those fossil fuels shrinking to just under a quarter of the mid-century supply mix and renewables skyrocketing to just over two-thirds. – **Reuters**

# Taiwan pushes drastic carbon footprint reduction

As a responsible member of the international community, Taiwan strives to integrate with global efforts to mitigate climate change

As the Covid-19 pandemic ravages the world, carbon dioxide concentrations in the atmosphere keep setting record highs. The Working Group I contribution to the Sixth Assessment Report published by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change in August 2021 confirmed that human activity has worsened the warming of the atmosphere, oceans, and land.

The atmosphere, oceans, cryosphere, and biosphere have all undergone broad and rapid changes. The weather in 2021 has also been unstable, as can be seen by the winter storm in the US state of Texas that severely damaged the energy system and the record-setting temperatures of nearly 50 degrees Celsius on the North American west coast.

By the same token, Western Europe and China have suffered from heavy rains. In addition, Taiwan experienced its worst drought in more than 50 years, which was followed by abnormally heavy rainfall. One can clearly see how climate change has profoundly affected the whole world.

With extreme weather events challenging the entire globe today, the United Nations calls on all countries to implement the Paris Agreement and take more proactive steps.

As a responsible member of the international community, Taiwan strives to integrate with global efforts to mitigate climate change. President Tsai Ing-wen declared on

this year's Earth Day (22 April) that realizing net-zero emissions by 2050 is the goal of the world, including Taiwan.

She also unveiled clear greenhouse gas emission targets for Taiwan. At the 33rd meeting of the National Council for Sustainable Development, Premier Su Tseng-chang announced the inclusion of the 2050 net-zero emission target in the amendment bill for the Greenhouse Gas Reduction and Management Act, demonstrating Taiwan's determination to actively reduce carbon emissions.

More and stronger management mechanisms and incentive systems will be introduced with other vital amendments so as to enhance governance efficiency, introduce carbon pricing mechanisms, and adapt strategies for climate change. Such measures aim to encourage private investment in research and development, as well as public participation in the sustainable development of Taiwan.

Taiwan has established long-term reduction targets and is planning a practical path to attain 2050 net-zero emissions. The Executive Yuan has coordinated relevant ministries and agencies, convened a working group

on paths to net-zero emissions, and sought professional consultation from Academia Sinica and the Industrial Technology Research Institute.

Four working groups have been formed to focus on the areas of decarbonized energy, industry and energy efficiency, green transportation and vehicle electrification, and carbon-negative technology so as to carry out interministerial technical assessments.

With respect to energy and industrial policies, short-, medium-, and long-term markers for 2030, 2040, and 2050 will be set on the path toward net-zero emissions. In addition, the Environmental Protection Administration (EPA) and other relevant ministries and agencies have launched a public consultation on visions for 2050 to facilitate social dialogue on critical issues such as agricultural and forestry carbon sinks, net-zero buildings, green transportation, low-carbon industries, economic instruments, and just transformation.

With diverse participation from all sectors and research and development investment in innovative technology, Taiwan will seek the most suitable climate governance path for its sustainable development.

The Covid-19 pandemic has shown that Taiwan's industries

are an extremely reliable and significant partner in the global supply chain. Countries worldwide have successively proposed new goals on net-zero emissions to bring about a net-zero economy.

The Taiwan government aims to formulate a clear and comprehensive carbon reduction path and green growth strategy. Cooperation with private enterprises plays a critical role in these efforts.

The Covid-19 pandemic has shown that Taiwan's industries are an extremely reliable and significant partners in the global supply chain.

The Taiwan Climate Alliance, formed by eight ICT companies, has set the goal of using renewable energy in 100 percent of their manufacturing processes by 2050 and will lead other manufacturers in the supply chain to jointly reach this target.

In addition, the Taiwan Alliance for Net Zero Emission, formed by traditional manufacturing, technology, finance, and service industries, seeks to attain net-zero carbon emissions at office sites by 2030 and production sites by 2050.

To support the climate actions of enterprises and other actors in the private sector, the Taiwan government has implemented financial mechanisms such as green financing and green bonds, thus creating a virtuous circle in the investment and industrial pursuit of sustainable development.

Taiwan, situated in a region highly vulnerable to the effects of climate change, has long been actively engaged in policy formulation, the establishment of related legal systems, energy transformation, technological research and development, industrial innovation, social transformation, and environmental sustainability in response to climate change.

It hopes to actively construct a sustainable green homeland from the facets of supply, manufacturing, demand, and environmental protection. Furthermore, Taiwan will continue to share its experiences and capabilities with the international community to overcome this crisis.

The spirit of cooperating and working together remains key to accelerating and extending global efforts. Although Taiwan is not a member of the United Nations, it will always seek to be a model citizen for the international community. We will continue to work with all other countries to foster a global net-zero emissions future and a more resilient living environment for coming generations and to realize intergenerational justice.

# Google Cloud unveils carbon footprint tracker, open satellite imagery suite

APLHABET, Inc.'s Google will tell its cloud customers the carbon emissions of their cloud usage and open satellite imagery to them for the first time for environmental analysis, as part of a push to help companies track and cut carbon budgets.

The new features were among announcements Google Cloud made on Tuesday to kick off its annual customer conference, which is being held virtually this year due to the pandemic.

The leading Western cloud vendors Google, Microsoft Corp. and Amazon.com, Inc. have been competing on sustainability offerings for years. They aim to serve companies that are under pressure from stakeholders to rethink operations in light of climate change.

Google's new carbon footprint reporting tool, similar to one Microsoft already provides, shows the emissions associated with the electricity that was used to store and process a customer's data. In addition, Google will now warn customers when they are wasting energy on inactive cloud services.

The new mapping offering, Google Earth Engine, had been used by tens of thousands of researchers, governments and advocacy groups since 2009. But Google now is letting businesses in on the service, which includes many huge geospatial datasets such as Landsat and the software needed to analyze them. Amazon has a similar initiative.

"This is something we have now realized is applicable to a lot of these commercial opportunities," said Jen Bennett, a technical director at Google Cloud.

Earth Engine could help ensure supply chains are sustainable and predict operation challenges from extreme weather, according to Google. Unilever Plc, which tested the technology for the past 12 months, scrutinized its palm oil sources in Indonesia, though it could not be learned whether that led to any shifts in practices. — **Reuters**

MANILA, Philippines — The Philippines on Thursday reported 7,835 new coronavirus cases, pushing its total count of infections to 2,698,232

Today's numbers active cases up by 2,439 from the 82,411 on October 13. DOH said four laboratories did not submit screening results.

- Active cases: 84,850 or 3.1% of the total
- Recoveries: 5,317 bringing the number to 2,573,161
- Deaths: 154, or now 40,221 overall

#### **Easing of curbs**

- The waiving of facility quarantine requirement for fully vaccinated travelers from "green countries" takes effect today. But Health Secretary Francisco Duque III said he would raise his concern before the IATF on this, adding he was not consulted.
- An interior department official said seats would be placed in between moviegoers when cinemas reopen in Metro Manila this weekend as it shifts to Alert Level 3.
- All Metro Manila cities are now under moderate risk, OCTA Research said, citing a continued decrease in new cases in the last seven days.
- The Chinese Ambassador to the Philippines said Beijing will donate another one million doses of Sinovac's COVID-19 vaccine to Manila.
- Preliminary results of a study in the United States showed people who received Johnson & Johnson's COVID-19 vaccine may benefit from getting a booster shot of Pfizer or Moderna.

# Metro Manila to be placed under Alert Level 3 starting October 16

MANILA, Philippines — Quarantine restrictions in Metro Manila will be relaxed this week as the COVID-19 situation in the capital region continues to improve.

The government's pandemic task force has approved the recommendation to place Metro Manila under Alert Level 3 from October 16 to 31, presidential spokesman Harry Roque announced on Wednesday.

The capital region, the Philippines' economic center, is under Alert Level 4, the second most stringent classification in the government's new quarantine system.

The downgrade in the alert level will increase the permitted operational capacity of businesses, allowing business establishments to serve more clients.

Under the alert status, food businesses may operate in full capacity for take out and delivery while dine-in services will be permitted at 30% capacity. Personal care service establishments can also fill in up to 30% of their venue capacity. The same operational capacities will be implemented in closed and crowded venues and close contact activities. However, the allowed capacities for businesses with safety seals may increase by 10%.

The venue capacities will not apply to areas under granular lockdowns.

Under Alert Level 4, the allowed operational capacity for dine-in and personal care services and in-person religious activities is just 20%.

Roque previously said Metro Manila has a "high" chance of being downgraded to Alert Level 3 because of a high vaccination rate, and the lower COVID-19 infections and intensive care unit utilization rate.

As of October 10, more than 77% of Metro Manila's eligible population have been fully vaccinated for COVID-19 while the utilization rate of its intensive care unit beds is at 69% or moderate risk.

The alert level system with granular lockdowns is being enforced only in Metro Manila, but the government is considering proposals to expand it in other areas.

The rest of the country will be placed under the most lenient modified general community quarantine.

The latest quarantine classifications will take effect on October 16 and will be enforced until the end of the month.

#### Revised green lane rules

The IATF has also revised the rules for the green lanes for arriving international passengers. The new rules will take effect starting October 14.

For fully vaccinated foreign nationals, a negative RT-PCR test shall be required to be taken within 72 hours prior to the departure from the country of origin. Upon arrival, no facility-based quarantine will be required but the passenger should self-monitor for any symptoms until the fourteenth day.

Fully vaccinated Filipinos can choose to undergo facility-based quarantine until the release of a negative RT-PCR test taken in the quarantine facility upon arrival.

However, they will not be required to undergo a facility-based quarantine after getting a negative RT-PCR test within 72 hours prior to departure from the country of origin. The passenger, however, should self-monitor for any COVID-19 symptoms until the fourteenth day.

Unvaccinated, partially vaccinated, or individuals whose vaccination status cannot be independently verified, and those vaccinated but failed to comply with the test-before-travel requirements shall undergo a facility-based quarantine until the release of a negative RT-PCR test taken on the fifth day. However, foreign nationals will be required to secure hotel reservations for at least six days.

Unvaccinated or partially vaccinated minors traveling with their fully vaccinated parents or guardians will be required to observe the quarantine protocols that apply to their vaccination status. A parent or guardian shall accompany the child in the quarantine facility for the entire duration of the isolation period.



To validate their vaccinate status, overseas Filipino workers (OFWs) and their spouse, parents, or children traveling in the Philippines or abroad, non-OFWs vaccinated in the country and abroad, and foreigners vaccinated in the Philippines can present either their VaxCertPH digital certificate, international certificate of vaccination or prophylaxis (ICV) issued by the Bureau of Quarantine and World Health Organization (WHO), or the national digital certificate of the foreign government where they were vaccinated.

"In the case of foreigners vaccinated abroad, they can present WHO-issued ICV, or the national digital certificate of the foreign government which has accepted VaxCertPH under a reciprocal agreement," Roque said.

The IATF has also approved and adopted the revisions of the guidelines on the implementation of alert levels system for COVID-19 response in the pilot areas.
