

14.6K hectares of bamboo plantations established in C. Luzon

CITY OF SAN FERNANDO, Pampanga – More than 14,600 hectares of bamboo plantations have been established in Central Luzon since 2012 to rehabilitate degraded forest areas and stabilize river banks in the region.

DENR Region 3 (Central Luzon) Executive Director Paquito Moreno Jr., in a social media post on Monday, said the propagation of bamboo in the region is in support of Environment Secretary Roy Cimatu's order to plant and use bamboo as priority species to rehabilitate river banks and the Manila Bay.

Cimatu considers bamboo as an effective resource to rehabilitate degraded forestlands and promote the development of sustainable bamboo plantations for the wood industry.

"Help us plant more bamboo species to make our communities resilient against disasters and calamities," Moreno said, addressing villagers.

Known as the "poor man's lumber," bamboo has become a "green gold" resource because of its increasing value in the global economy and its sustainability, being among the fastest-growing and versatile forest products in the country.

According to studies, there are 62 bamboo species in the Philippines, and 21 of these are considered endemic to the country.

Four bamboo species are planted in Enhanced National Greening Program (E-NGP) sites in the region: the Bayog (Bambusa blumeana variety Luzonensis); Kawayan Tinik (Bambusa blumeana); Kawayan Kiling (Bambusa vulgaris); and Giant Bamboo (Dendrocalamus giganteus).

Aside from its extensive use in the construction and handicraft industries, bamboo plays a vital role in developing disaster-resilient communities by rebuilding eroded soil and stabilizing critical areas against landslides.

DENR-Davao Region seizes illegal timbers

A TOTAL of 125 pieces of squared timbers with a volume of 13,390 board feet were seized by the Department of Environment and Natural Resources-Davao Region (DENR-Davao) on July 13, 2021, in Davao Oriental.

In a press release, DENR-Davao said the timbers were apprehended through its Community Environment and Natural Resources Office (Cenro)-Baganga in Barangay Malibago, Cateel.

The agency said the confiscated items of naturally-grown dipterocarp are worth P400,000.

DENR said the items were seized after they received an intelligence report that a number of timbers were sighted in Cateel river.

As of writing, the confiscated items are already at Cenro-Baganga compound and 67th Infantry Battalion detachment for proper handling while awaiting appropriate action.

DENR-Davao Executive Director Bagani Fidel Evasco said the operation is part of the Anti-illegal Logging Task Force's efforts to curb any illegal activities in the region.

"As we continue to intensify our enforcement of forestry laws, rules and regulations, the more we have strengthened our partnership with these agencies through this Anti-Illegal Logging Task Force," Evasco said.



DENR-Davao Region seizes illegal timbers

Early this year, DENR-Davao strengthened its collaboration with Northern Mindanao, Soccsksargen and Caraga regions through a Joint Inter-Regional Task Force that aims to guard up against timber poaching and to intensify its anti-illegal logging transboundary efforts in these regions.

This is also in line with the agency's aim not only to safeguard the environment but also to ensure and strengthen the protection of forests by keeping the trees standing.

5 minutes for mental health? Questions as Manila dolomite beach briefly opens to public

The "Dolomite Beach" in **Manila Baywalk** opened to the public on Sunday with individuals allowed a maximum of a five-minute stay in the regulated area.

Reports said that its opening was a surprise.

The **Department of Environment and Natural Resources** (DENR) said that Filipinos can <u>visit</u> the artificial white sand along Manila Bay until July 20, Tuesday, from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. to 5 p.m.

They must strictly adhere to the minimum health protocols such as the wearing of face masks and face shields and observance of physical distancing.

Only up to 120 people can be accommodated every five minutes in the area, which is near the United States Embassy in Manila. This means visitors are only allowed to stay for five minutes.

Seniors and minors with adult companions can enter in the vicinity but pets are not allowed.

Eating, drinking, littering and picking up dolomite sand is prohibited.

Visitors are similarly not allowed to swim on the bay since its waters have not yet reached the standard acceptable levels of fecal coliform.

After the three-day opening, the DENR would conduct an assessment to see if they will open the artificial white beach area again.

The agency targets to finish the second phase of the project by October.





Last month, <u>coconut palms</u> were planted along the baywalk "as part of its "beautification and restoration."

The overall initiative is part of the **Manila Bay Rehabilitation Program** which aims to clean, rehabilitate and preserve the historic bay.

Meanwhile, the five-minute duration given for Filipinos to enjoy the scenery of the artificial white sand prompted questions from some social media users who recalled the Palace's remarks on the matter.

"Pero may effect nga ba?" a <u>Twitter user</u> said, pertaining to the "mental health" comments of President Rodrigo Duterte's spokesperson before.

"May sense ba talaga 'to? Anong silbi ng paglalakad ng 5 minutes sa pekeng buhangin?" another <u>online user</u> wondered.

"Mamamasyal 5 minutes, mas mahal pa pinamasahe nila papunta diyan hahaha!" a different Filipino <u>exclaimed</u>.

"Is that dosage enough?" another <u>Twitter user</u> wrote in response to the five-minute duration.

The Palace last year defended the dolomite beach project by claiming that walking along the artificial white sands could benefit one's mental health, especially amid a pandemic.

"Kasi alam mo, sa gitna ng pandemya, kinakailangan din na pangalagaan ang mental health," presidential spokesperson Harry Roque previously said to <u>reporters</u>.

"I think 'yung pagpapasyal sa mga lugar gaya ng Manila Bay na may white beach, hindi mo makaquantify ang epekto niyan pagdating po sa mental health ng ating mga kabababayan, 'yung kapayapaan ng pag-iisip at 'yung break from 'yung dangers ng pandemic," he added.

"Right now, Manila Bay is known for its sunset, probably the best sunset in the world. With the white beach there, it will be one of the most picturesque sceneries in the whole world," Roque further claimed.

Indie musician **Chall** protested against the project by <u>uploading a video</u> of him on loop staring at a picture of the artificial white sands for his supposed mental health.

Responding to the criticisms, <u>the DENR said</u> that the rehabilitation project amid the COVID-19 pandemic "is not untimely."

It said that it was approved by Congress under the 2019 General Appropriations Act and that it underwent competitive bidding under Republic Act 9184.

The agency added that the contract was awarded prior to the COVID-19 pandemic and that "the government cannot simply stop a project when it is already under a contractual obligation to proceed."

"Beach nourishment mainly aims to rehabilitate and protect the coastal resources in the area to prevent coastal flooding and erosion," it further said.

Cop, 2 minors nabbed for hunting 'flying foxes' in GenSan

GENERAL SANTOS CITY – Police and environment personnel arrested a policeman and two other minors after being caught in possession of illegally hunted bats in a village here over the weekend.

Capt. Abdulsalam Mamalinta Jr., acting chief of city police Station 4, identified the suspects as S/Sgt. Ibañez Faldas, 33, a member of Polomolok municipal police station in South Cotabato, and aliases Kyle, 17, and Carlo, 15.

He said the three were found with 59 heads of large flying fox (*Pteropus vampyrus*) in an enforcement operation led by personnel from the Community Environment and Natural Resources Office (CENRO) around 2 p.m. Sunday in Purok Guadalupe, Barangay Conel.

Mamalinta said the illegal activity was discovered by CENRO personnel based on a tip from concerned residents.

He said the agency, through its head Elvira Lumayag, immediately coordinated the matter with their station and confirmed the presence of the suspects.

Aside from the large flying foxes, which is considered as among the critical fruit bat species, he said they confiscated from the suspects a 12-gauge shotgun without serial number and six assorted motorcycle units.

"The investigation is ongoing regarding the extent of the illegal hunting activity in the area and the possible involvement of other persons," Mamalinta said in a report.

The police official said Faldas and the two minors, all residents of Barangay Silway 8 in Polomolok, will be charged through inquest with violation of Republic Act 9147 or the Wildlife Resources Conservation and Protection Act.

The policeman is currently detained at Station 4 in Barangay San Isidro while the minors were brought to the local government-run Bahay Pag-Asa in Barangay Sinawal for temporary custody. (*PNA*)

Planned Pasig River expressway may just make traffic, pollution worse — groups

MANILA, Philippines — Transport, environmental and heritage institutions said the proposed Pasig River Expressway (PAREX) project of conglomerate San Miguel Corp. will not only make congestion in Metro Manila worse but will also pose threats to health and the environment because of increased pollution.

SMC presented its plans to build a P95-billion thoroughfare that will connect the eastern and western portions of Metro Manila through a 19-kilometer elevated expressway over the Pasig River during an online public consultation on July 14.

The planned expressway will have six lanes and will be divided into three segments.

PAREX is seen by its proponent as a solution to solve traffic and clean up the heavily-polluted Pasig River that cuts across the capital region.

But transport advocacy group Move As One Coalition stressed PAREX will only worsen traffic due to induced demand, or the increase in people using that road because it is there. Eventually, they said, the volume of traffic will be too much for the new expressway, leading to congestion.

"If you have an expressway that is primarily for the use of private motor vehicles, we are in effect encouraging the use of private motor vehicles within a dense urban area like Metro Manila," Robert Siy Jr., coalition convenor, said.

"Investment in an expressway like this, which is for the main use of private motor vehicles, delivers the message to everyone that you need to have a private motor vehicle in order to move around our city efficiently," he added.

Engineer Egay Doña, representative of the SMC, said that induced demand is possible but stressed the project is better than doing nothing.

"If we don't do anything, we will still be challenged by bumper to bumper traffic along EDSA... Actually this project is supposed to alleviate that traffic but I do understand the concern," he said.

"In fact, this is the phenomenon we have observed: if you build a good road, if you build a facility, it entices generation of more traffic but if we don't do anything, the same traffic will be plying the congested roads."

Environmental concerns

In a <u>statement released in April</u>, Move As One Coalition said PAREX will increase greenhouse gas emissions in the Philippines. It is feared to impede the country's effort to meet its commitment to slash these emissions by 75% by 2030.

<u>In a separate statement released in June</u>, they said the elevated expressway could make the lives of "millions who have a constitutional right to a balanced and healthful ecology" worse.

The coalition also said the proposed expressway will make the rehabilitation of the 27-kilometer Pasig River impossible. They said the river "can be revived and transformed into a green public space where people can enjoy the best views, stroll, cycle, and have fun."

The construction of elevated expressway is also seen to destroy the sightlines of heritage structures along the historic Pasig River.

"It's not actually a solution but a problem that will not solve the intended traffic concerns, that will not solve air pollution, that will not solve the health of our riverine ecosystem that could be cleaned up even without the expressway," policy researcher Ken Abante said.

Health impacts

Organizations also pointed out the expressway will worsen air pollution in Metro Manila, increasing people's vulnerability to air pollution-related deaths.

"We must anticipate the pollution, the emissions of all these slow-moving vehicles," Siy said.

Architect and environmental planner Leandro Poco called for an assessment of the project's impacts on human health.

"Health impacts I think are primary not just to the users but to the people on ground level who are the most affected by pollution and by the prospect of this expressway cutting through their neighborhoods," he said.

No detailed design yet

Doña said the SMC has yet to develop the project's detailed engineering design.

"Once approved, we can start with the rigors of doing the detailed engineering design. We will finish that in one year. While we're working on the detailed engineering design, we'll start the construction of the longer segment. In the end, we hope to complete all the segments at the end of the fourth year," he said in a mix of English and Filipino.

The public scoping held last week was part of the requirements for the project's environmental permit, which will be issued by the Department of Environment and Natural Resources.

SMC is expected to conduct a baseline study after the technical scoping. Then a review and a public hearing will be conducted. A final review will be conducted before the department decides if it will grant or reject the conglomerate's application for Environmental Compliance Certificate.





SMC Global Power to complete reforestation, carbon capture project

MANILA, Philippines — SMC Global Power Holdings Corp. (SMCGP), the power unit of diversified conglomerate San Miguel Corp. (SMC), targets to complete its reforestation and carbon capture project by September.

By then, SMCGP would have planted three million trees, aligning with its renewable energy push.

As of July 9, the company has planted 780,214 seedlings out of the 1.1 million targeted for this year over 268 hectares of land in Zambales, Davao Occidental, Bataan, Negros Occidental, Pangasinan, Albay and Quezon province.

Planting of the remaining 320,000 trees is expected to be completed by September in the seven provinces and Bulacan.

From 2019 to 2020, the company, together with farmer and fisherfolk organizations at or near planting sites, had planted nearly two million seedlings and propagules.

Tree varieties in the upland plantation are Narra, Molave, White Lauan, Palosapis, Agoho, Batino, Igang, and Malabayabas, while mangrove varieties include Bakawan Babae, Bakawan Lalaki, Bungalon, and Api-Api. The survival rates of upland trees and mangrove propagules planted are at 89 and 91 percent, respectively.

"As with our other initiatives, this massive tree-planting project represents our commitment to environmental stewardship. With each of our business units pursuing sustainability programs and engaging their respective communities to help out, I am confident we can collectively achieve a lot in the next couple of years in terms of meeting our climate goals," SMC president Ramon Ang said.

Started in 2019, SMCGP's reforestation and carbon capture program dubbed Project 747 aims to plant seven million trees or a million trees every year over 4,000 hectares in at least seven provinces to help mitigate climate change.

"Through massive reforestation, we can help mitigate the impacts of climate change. Over the past couple of years, we have also been utilizing the best and most modern technologies to minimize our impact on the environment, even as we try to provide for our country's growing need for reliable and affordable power," Ang said.

Incentives are provided to partner organizations for activities like nursery establishment and maintenance plantation establishment and maintenance. Aside from the Biochar program, appropriate livelihood programs are also identified depending on the area.

Project 747 complements SMC's goal of adding cleaner and renewable power facilities into its power portfolio after dropping plans to put up three clean-coal power plants with a capacity of 1,500 megawatts (MW) as part of SMC's larger sustainability goals.

Group sees China 'intrusion' in implementation of Dumaguete City land-reclamation project

The Pambansang Lakas ng Kilusang Mamamalakaya ng Pilipinas (Pamalakaya) on Monday warned that the implementation of a controversial land reclamation project proposal in Dumaguete City may open the gates to Chinese "encroachment" in surrounding waters.

"All the more reason to oppose this reclamation project that would involve a Chinese construction firm as this may be a prelude to another takeover of our waters and plunder of marine resources," the group said in a news statement.

Expressing its strong opposition against the proposed 174-hectare reclamation in Dumaguete City, the group said the involvement of China-based construction firm Poly Changda Overseas Engineering Co. is fueling their suspicions.

Pamalakaya warned against what it called "sellout of pristine marine waters to China," which the group said is plundering the Philippines's exclusive economic zone in the West Philippine Sea.

"The environmental catastrophe that the reclamation project would bring to the marine ecosystem is one thing, but having a Chinese firm as its subcontractor is quite another. We all know how China rampantly occupies our exclusive economic zone and exploits our marine resources at the expense of the livelihood of our fisherfolks and the national patrimony," Fernando Hicap, a former Anakpawis party-list representative and current national chairperson of the group said.

Pamalakaya earlier added its voice to the growing opposition against the Dumaguete reclamation project due to devastating impacts to the marine environment, coastal communities, and local fish supply.

"Having China in the picture makes the Dumaguete reclamation project not only an environmental and socioeconomic concerns, but also a matter of national patrimony. This is not development, this is profit-driven project and foreign takeover in disguise," Hicap said.

The group said it would unite the local fishing communities with the environmental and science sectors in opposing the "destructive" reclamation project, and the "creeping Chinese encroachment" of different parts of the Philippine seas.

"Akin with how we resist Chinese incursion in the West Philippine Sea, we will expose and oppose this apparently new wave of Chinese plunder and encroachment in the Philippine waters," Hicap said.

DUMAGUETE CITY – The People's Development Council (PDC) here on Monday submitted its position paper/letter to the Sangguniang Panlungsod opposing the planned 174-hectare coastal reclamation project here, citing at least two immediate concerns.

The PDC was established through a city ordinance to act as "partners" of the local government on policy formulation, among other concerns and endeavors.

The PDC is the latest sector/group to issue a statement against the PHP23-billion unsolicited proposal of EM Cuerpo, Inc. to the city government for a massive offshore reclamation that would pave the way for a "Smart City", complete with 5G technology, high-rise buildings, malls, waste water treatment facilities and other businesses aimed at generating jobs and pump-priming the local economy.

"Niining mga nanglabay nga mga adlaw, dako ang kabalaka o kakugang sa mga miyembro sa PDC sa proyekto nga 174 hectares reclamation project nga gipagawas sa social media (These past days, PDC members were shocked and worried over the 174-hectare reclamation project that was reported on social media)," the letter read.

The group said that after having gleaned additional information based on Mayor Felipe Antonio Remollo's presentation on the said project and other sources, it is raising two major proposals -- the holding of a public consultation and seeking transparency regarding the planned venture.

The PDC also emphasized the need to consult scientists and other experts to determine the project's impact on the environment and the people.

On transparency, they said the people must be informed about everything regarding the reclamation project, such as the processes, the people, private sectors, and others involved in it, the group said.

The PDC is asking the mayor and members of the city council to rescind the resolution granting authority to the local chief executive to enter into a memorandum of understanding (MOU) between the city and the proponent; conduct massive public consultation; and present all documents from the proponent, the MOU, subcontractors, and others.

The letter noted that the PDC is a body created by virtue of a city ordinance for the establishment of a partnership between the city and non-government organizations, people's organizations, and the private sector.

PDC representatives sit on 11 standing committees of the Sangguniang Panlungsod as mandated by the ordinance to help in policy formulation, but the group said in its letter "apan ang among gibati nga kami gibaliwala (we feel that we are being ignored)." (*PNA*)





Probe on improper disposal of medical wastes underway

CEBU, Philippines — The Cebu City Health Department is conducting an investigation into the alleged improper disposal of medical wastes traced to one of the city's vaccination centers.

Dr. Jeffrey Ibones, officer-in-charge of Cebu City Health Department and head of Cebu City Vaccine Operations Center, said an investigation is underway to determine why used COVID-19 vaccine syringes from Don Bosco vaccination site were disposed of without observing the protocols.

"Amo panang gitan-aw unsay nahitabo ana niya kay isolated case rana siya, murag dili man gyud ang tanan gyud no, tingali'g naa lay nasagol [o] unsay nahitabo ana, kay naa man gud na siyay sudlanan," Ibobes said.

Ramil Ayuman, officer-in-charge of Cebu City Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Office, posted on Facebook images of medical wastes mixed in ordinary biodegradable and non-biodegradable wastes.

Ibones explained that vaccination centers have protocols to observe in the disposal of wastes, especially those considered as biohazards.

"Naa may tigkuha ana ang DPS (Department of Public Services), unya sa PASSI (Pollution Abatement Systems Specialists Incorporated), mao nay atong protocol kay naa man gyud tay mga assignment ana kinsay mga na assign," Ibones said.

Meanwhile, environment and cause oriented groups back Vice Mayor Michael Rama's call for a comprehensive review of the city's solid waste management program.

The group led by EcoWaste Coalition and Sanlakas Sugbo along with 15 other individuals trooped to City Hall yesterday to deliver a letter to Mayor Edgardo Labella and Rama.

The groups call for just solution to the plight of sectors affected by the current system. The LGU is also urged to provide livelihood to waste pickers and other poor sectors affected by the strict adherence to Republic Act 9003 or the Solid Waste Management Act.

The group also emphasized the non-burn technologies consistent with the ban on incineration to treat municipal solid, hazardous and infectious wastes as mandated by the Philippine Clean Air Act and RA 9003.

The groups expressed that they couldn't continue this failed approach as it brings bigger financial cost to the city and heavy impact on the environment and public health. — **Dianah Rule D. Salinguhay and Sly Anthonette E.Baseo, CNU Interns . FPL (FREEMAN)**






Reported dumping of human waste in West Philippine Sea gets featured by 9GAG

The Philippines earned buzz on international communities again. This time, it's about the reported dumping of human waste in the West Philippine Sea.

Hong Kong-based online platform **9GAG**, home to memes, stories and edited videos around the world, wrote about the controversial report on its website and <u>titled it</u> "Human Waste Dumped From Chinese Ships In South China Sea Visible From Space."

The article, which was also shared on social media on July 14, <u>cited the findings</u> of US-based tech firm **Simularity** in its report titled "Sewage from Anchored Ships is Damaging Spratlys Reefs."

Citing photos captured via satellite imagery, the report showed that hundreds of anchored ships in the Spratlys Islands in the **West Philippine Sea** had been dumping raw sewage onto the reefs for the last five years.

"This is why aliens don't visit us," 9GAG captioned its social media post with the article retelling the report.

In the comments section, social media users, criticized the reported dumping incident.

"Perhaps they're trying to mark that area as their territory or build another man-made island," a Facebook user <u>said.</u>

The same criticisms were also expressed under the comments section of 9GAG article.

"Mostly greed and no concern about ecology or sustainability...destroy everything in its path. Almost the same everywhere but China is doing it at huge scale, and once an area is dead they move to another one, and so on, and one day it will be your backyard," an online user<u>said</u>.

"China is just a country pushing through 100 years of technology and humanity development in a really short time and weird way," another user <u>wrote.</u>

In the Simularity report, it was stated that the amount of human waste created excess nutrients and thus, chlorophyll-a concentration that damaged the coral reef ecosystems within Philippine waters.

Liz Derr, co-founder and chief executive officer of Simularity, admitted that she could not verify immediately if the ships were from China.

However, she pointed out the photos of ships the Philippine Coast Guard took before, citing "they are clearly Chinese."

The Chinese Embassy in Manila dismissed the findings in the report as "fake news."

"It all started with a foreign agency issuing a report full of lies. Some media immediately spread fake news based on the fabricated report. Finally, some anti-China forces used fake news to accuse and demonize #China," it said.

It further accused the report of creating "sinophobia" in the Philippines.

"It's a typical 'whole industry chain' aiming at creating hatred and Sinophobia in the Philippines. Will people with common sense see through the trick?" it said.

The **Department of National Defense** last week said that it launched a probe into the reported dumping of sewage onto the WPS.

"We have taken note of the news circulating online about the alleged dumping of waste in the South China Sea. Be that as it may, I have directed the Western Command who has jurisdiction over the WPS to verify and investigate," <u>said</u> Defense Secretary **Delfin Lorenzana**.

Lorenzana, however, criticized Simularity's use of an old photo in its study.

"However, the photo of a ship seen dumping waste accompanying the report was found to have been taken in the Australian Great Barrier Reef in 2014. Therefore, this intent to mislead has cast great doubt on the accurateness of the Simularity report. We also question the conclusion reached by Simularity from just looking at satellite photos," he said.

Simularity late last week stood by its research, saying, "the imagery and algorithm we used to identify Chlorophyll-a from satellite imagery in our latest report is well researched and validated."

"The image in question was not used in our research. We never claimed it was from the Spratlys. It was included to provide context for what we are able to see from space, with an image credit: 'Image source: unknown ship from Marine Executive," it <u>said</u>.

Climate change sees Swiss Alps add over 1,000 lakes - study

Geneva, Switzerland — Climate change has dramatically altered the Swiss Alp landscape - at a quicker pace than expected - as melting glaciers have created more than 1,000 new lakes across the mountains, a study published Monday showed.

The inventory of Swiss Glacial lakes showed that almost 1,200 new lakes have formed in formerly glaciated regions of the Swiss Alps since the end of the Little Ice Age around 1850.

Around 1,000 of them still exist today, according to the study published by the Swiss Federal Institute of Aquatic Science and Technology (Eawag).

That is far more than the few hundreds the researchers had expected to find at the beginning of the project.

"We were surprised by the sheer numbers," Daniel Odermatt, head of the Eawag Remote Sensing Group that carried out the study, said in a statement.

He said the "marked acceleration in formation" was also surprising, pointing out that "180 have been added in the last decade alone".

Glaciers in the Swiss Alps are in steady decline, losing a full two percent of their volume last year alone, according to an annual study published by the Swiss Academies of Science.

And even if the world were to fully implement the 2015 Paris Agreement – which calls for capping global warming at least two degrees Celsius - two-thirds of the Alpine glaciers will likely be lost, according to a 2019 study by the ETH technical university in Zurich.

Climate change sees Swiss Alps add over 1,000 lakes – study

The Eawag assessment showed that there was an initial peak in glacial lake formation in the Swiss Alps between 1946 and 1973 when nearly eight new lakes appeared on average each year.

After a brief decline, the lake formation rate surged between 2006 and 2016, with 18 new lakes appearing each year on average, while the water surface swelled by over 400 square meters (4,300 square feet) annually.

This, Eawag said, is "visible evidence of climate change in the Alps".

The comprehensive inventory was made possible by large troves of data gathered from the Switzerland's glaciers since the mid-19th century.

In total, the researchers were able to draw on data from seven periods between 1850 and 2016.

For each of the 1,200 lakes formed since 1850, the scientists recorded the location, elevation, shape, and area of the lake at different times, as well as the type of material of the dam and surface drainage.

Based on such basic information, researchers can estimate hazards, including the risk of sudden emptying in the event of a dam failure.

Eawag warned that the growing number of glacial lakes increases the risk of such outbursts and thus the danger of flood waves for the settlements below.

Great Barrier Reef outlook poor despite coral 'recovery'scientists

BRISBANE — The Great Barrier Reef's outlook remains "very poor" despite coral recovery over the past year, Australian government scientists said Monday, just days before a Unesco ruling on the site's world heritage status.

The United Nations cultural agency recommended last month that the world's largest reef system be placed on its <u>endangered list</u> because of damage to the corals largely caused by climate change.

The Australian Institute of Marine Science (AIMS) said the corals were currently in a "recovery window" after a reprieve that followed a decade of harmful heat stress and cyclones.

But such opportunities were becoming rarer due to the impact of climate change, the government agency, which has monitored the reef for 35 years, said in its annual report released Monday.

"The increasing prominence of climate-related extreme weather events and crown-of-thorns starfish outbreaks is causing more severe and frequent pressures, giving the reef fewer opportunities like this to recover," CEO Paul Hardisty said.

The scientists surveyed 127 reef sites in 2021 and found hard coral cover had increased at 69 of the 81 locations surveyed in the past two years, largely driven by fast-growing table and branching Acropora corals.

Separate scientific research released last October found the 2,300-kilometer (1,400 miles) system had lost half its corals since 1995, with a series of ocean heatwaves causing mass coral bleaching.

Britta Schaffelke, research program director at AIMS, said the latest findings provided a "glimmer of hope... that the reef still has resilience".

But she added that its "outlook into the future is still very poor because of the dangers of climate change and other factors that are impacting on the organisms that make up the reef."

Australia has launched a last-minute lobbying effort to avoid a World Heritage downgrade, sending the country's environment minister to Paris to meet with Unesco officials and even taking <u>key ambassadors on a reef snorkeling trip</u> last week.

UNESCO has urged Australia to take urgent climate action but Canberra has long resisted calls to commit to net zero emissions by 2050.

The conservative government has said it hopes to meet the target "as soon as possible" without harming its commodity-dependent economy, insisting tackling climate change requires a global effort.

The reef was worth an estimated US\$4.8 billion a year in tourism revenue for the Australian economy before the coronavirus pandemic and there are fears an "in danger" listing could weaken its tourist appeal.


A decision is expected around July 23.

Placed on the World Heritage list in 1981, the Great Barrier Reef is one of seven sites globally threatened with a downgrade due to ecological damage, overdevelopment, overtourism or security concerns.



Fabian intensifies; flood alert raised

The Philippine Atmospheric, Geophysical and Astronomical Services Administration said moderate to heavy rains will be experienced in the next 24 hours over the Ilocos region, Zambales, Bataan, Occidental Mindoro and Palawan.

MANILA, Philippines — The state weather bureau warned residents of western Luzon yesterday of possible floods and landslides due to monsoon rains triggered by severe Tropical Storm Fabian and another storm outside the Philippine area of responsibility.

The Philippine Atmospheric, Geophysical and Astronomical Services Administration (PAGASA) said moderate to heavy rains will be experienced in the next 24 hours over the Ilocos region, Zambales, Bataan, Occidental Mindoro and Palawan.

As of 4 p.m. yesterday, the center of Fabian was located 1,075 kilometers east northeast of extreme Northern Luzon, packing winds of 95 kilometers per hour near the center and gustiness of up to 115 kph.

Fabian (international name In-fa) was "almost stationary" over the sea, the agency said in its 5 p.m. bulletin.

Meanwhile, Tropical Storm Cempaka was estimated at 945 kms. west northwest of extreme Northern Luzon as of 4 p.m., with maximum sustained winds of 75 kph near the center and gustiness of up to 90 kph.

It was moving northwest slowly.

PAGASA said the southwest monsoon will also bring moderate to rough seas (1.5 to 3.1-meter waves) over the western seaboard of Palawan, including the Kalayaan Islands.

The agency advised residents and disaster managers in Batanes and Babuyan Islands to continuously monitor the tropical cyclone bulletins as any further southward shift in the track of Fabian may result in the hoisting of tropical cyclone wind signal No. 1 over these areas.

Fabian, the country's sixth tropical cyclone, was forecast to exit the Philippine area of responsibility by Thursday afternoon or evening.

PAGASA said Metro Manila, Cordillera Administrative Region, Calabarzon, Western Visayas, Batanes, Cagayan, Pampanga, Tarlac and Bulacan will experience cloudy skies with scattered rainshowers and thunderstorms due to the southwest monsoon.

Partly cloudy to cloudy skies with rainshowers or thunderstorms will prevail over the rest of the country, also due to the southwest monsoon.

5.3K new Covid-19 recoveries Monday: DOH

MANILA – The Department of Health (DOH) on Monday reported 5,332 new recoveries from the coronavirus disease 2019 (Covid-19), with the country's total now at 1,439,049 or 95.1 percent of all reported infections since last year.

In its daily Covid-19 bulletin, the DOH reported 5,651 new infections, bringing the country's active cases to 47,561 or 3.1 percent of the total cases.

Of the active cases, most at 91.9 percent have mild symptoms, followed by those with severe symptoms at 2.7 percent, asymptomatic at 1.9 percent, moderate symptoms at 1.88 percent, and those in critical condition at 1.6 percent.

The agency likewise reported 72 new deaths caused by Covid-19, with the country's total casualties at 26,786 or 1.77 percent of all infections.

Based on the latest testing data, 50,385 Covid-19 tests were administered on Saturday with 11 percent returning positive for the disease.

Meanwhile, health care facilities in Metro Manila remained at moderately low utilization, with 1,100 beds in intensive care units (ICU) at 43 percent occupancy, 4,600 isolation beds at 38 percent, 3,400 ward beds at 34 percent, and 32 percent of 1,000 ventilators in use.

For the whole country, 3,500 ICU beds are at 54 percent utilization, 19,400 isolation beds at 46 percent occupancy, 12,100 ward beds at 44 percent, and 36 percent of 2,800 ventilators in use. (*PNA*)
