

AFP backs island development in West Philippine Sea

MANILA, Philippines — The military has vowed to give its full support to ongoing plans and efforts to develop and protect Pagasa Island and the entire Kalayaan Island Group (KIG) in the West Philippine Sea.

Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) chief Gen. Cirilito Sobejana, in a virtual meeting on Monday with Palawan Gov. Jose Alvarez, chair of the Palawan Council for Sustainable Development (PCSD), acknowledged the need to turn Pagasa Island into a "logistics hub" to protect KIG's biodiversity and the livelihood of its fishing communities.

"We are glad that we are on the same page on the future of the province of Palawan, that we view it as a strategic and critical national security frontier, particularly in the interests of ecological balance and sustainable development," he said.

The AFP chief also lauded the initiatives of the Palawan provincial government to protect the nation's interest through its proposal to declare the KIG as a protected area under the Expanded National Integrated Protected Areas System (Republic Act 7586).

"We are at a point when we have to stick together as one nation and we are glad that the provincial government of Palawan is already on board," Sobejana said.

Part of the discussion during the virtual meeting was the further development of Pagasa Island as haven for Filipino fishermen as well as a possible tourist destination.

Sobejana said such move will require expansion and construction of facilities that are aimed at sustaining an increase in economic activity in the island.

Present at the meeting were Teodoro Jose Matta, PCSD executive director; Maj. Gen. Rene Diaz, AFP deputy chief of staff for logistics, and Brig. Gen. Rene Raoul Rommel Honasan, assistant deputy for logistics.

Pagasa Island, one of the biggest islands of the KIG, hosts an entire village or barangay where soldiers maintain presence amid the country's territorial issues with China.




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DepEd lauds 10 schools for their efforts to preserve heritage trees

Riña emphasized the different priority programs in the country aimed at protecting the environment which include the National Greening Program, National Forest Protection Program, and Reducing Emissions from Deforestation and Forest Degradation (REDD+) strategy.

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<u>Just go green; developed nations urged to scrap coal completely</u>

The Group of Seven (G7) nations have pledged to scale up technologies and policies that accelerate the transition away from unabated coal use, including ending new government support for coal power by the end of this year, but many countries still finance and plan to build new coal plants.

Alok Sharma, UK President for the upcoming 26th UN Climate Change Conference of Parties (COP26), told rich nations to "consign coal power to history."

Britain will host 26th UN climate conference, called COP26, in November in Glasgow, Scotland.

The meeting aims to spur more ambitious commitments by countries following their pledge under the Paris Agreement in 2015 to keep the global average temperature rise "well below" 2 degrees Celsius this century. The measures are aimed at preventing devastating and extreme weather events such as heatwaves, colder winters, floods and droughts.

"I've been very clear that I want COP26 to be the COP where we consign coal power to history," Alok Sharma, UK president for COP26, told journalists in an interview with Reuters and other partners of the global media consortium Covering Climate Now.

Most pollutive

Coal is the most polluting energy source if emissions are not captured and stored underground.

While that technology lags, most coal units around the world produce not only carbon dioxide emissions, responsible for global warming, but other pollutants harmful to human health.

The Group of Seven (G7) nations have pledged to scale up technologies and policies that accelerate the transition away from unabated coal capacity, including ending new government support for coal power by the end of this year, but many countries still finance and plan to build new coal plants.

After catastrophic floods swept across northwest Europe last week and as wildfires continue to rage across southern Oregon in the United States, energy and climate ministers of the Group of 20 rich and emerging nations (G20) will meet this week in Italy to try to increase emissions cuts and climate finance pledges.





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"I think the G7 has shown the way forward," Sharma said, adding that island nations he has visited this year such as in the Caribbean, want the biggest emitters of the G20 to follow suit.

A tracker run by groups including the Overseas Development Institute shows the G20 has committed at least \$296 billion for fossil fuel energy support since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic last year, and \$227 billion for clean energy.

"Many of these countries are already very ambitious in terms of abating climate change. But for it to make a difference in terms of the weather patterns that are hitting (countries), they need the biggest emitters to step forward and that is the message that I'm going to be delivering at the G20," he added.

More ambitious cuts

One of the biggest challenges facing the UK COP26 Presidency will be to persuade countries to commit to more ambitious emissions-cut targets and to increase financing for countries most vulnerable to climate change.

Long-held disagreements over the rules which will govern how carbon markets should operate will also need to be overcome. The rules, under Article 6 of the Paris Agreement, are regarded by many countries as a way of delivering climate finance.

"I've said to ministers that we need to move beyond people restating their long-held positions. I think we have to find a landing zone," Sharma said.





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Climate change began, and ends with us

Each day, as I browse through Google, Yahoo and the web pages of broadsheets here and abroad, I could see the screaming headlines of wildfires (massive and uncontrollable forest fires), heavy floods (even in the wealthiest nations of Europe), severe droughts and heatwaves. hunger and poverty, food riots, civil unrest and earthquakes and collapsing buildings and high-rise towers.

I can't help but ask myself, why are these calamities, catastrophes and disasters coming in close successions or even simultaneously. Are we now in Armageddon?

I feel so bad that people have to suffer needlessly, properties are lost and the resultant hunger and deprivation would stalk nations at a time when the world is scrounging for resources to address a major health disaster like COVID-19 and its variants and new strains. There is a general sense of helplessness because even the wealthy nations that used to be big donors or benefactors are themselves now victims. And no doubt, there is also such a thing as donor fatigue.

What makes it worse is that a few filthy rich people can even afford to buy yachts or private jets worth hundreds of millions of dollars just to avoid being in the scene of the rampaging virus that has killed over 4 million globally.

Then you see of billionaires who spend hundreds of millions of dollars to build their own rocket ships to cruise the space for their own sense of "high" in being able to launch their personal vessels in the galaxy. Instead of using these funds to help the millions of people who are hungry, sick and to supply vaccines that would save the inhabitants of the planet, they are only after satisfying their selfish curiosity and need for terrestrial accomplishment.

Hospitals around the world—esp. in Myanmar, Indonesia, Afghanistan, the Africas and South America—are hard pressed with vital medical supplies like oxygen, PPEs, beds, quarantine facilities and ICU.

Every economy that was forced to lock down to stem the spread of infections suffered near zero or negative growths, which meant that their governments could hardly feed their people and provide subsistence allowance.

UN Climate Science Report

Last June 23, the Agence France Presse prematurely obtained a UN Climate report that showed how climate change had decreased major crop production globally and is predicted to impact yields throughout the 21st century, putting greater pressure on countries with exploding populations.





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"Rising CO2 levels will also degrade the quality of crops, reducing vital minerals and nutrients in key foodstuffs. Production of marine fisheries will fall by 40 to 70 percent for tropical regions of Africa if emissions continue unabated," the study said.

Despite greater levels of socioeconomic development, nearly 10 million more children will go undernourished and stunted by 2050 exposing them to a lifetime of associated health risks. Halving red meat consumption and doubling intake of nuts, fruits and vegetables could reduce food-related emissions as much as 70 percent by mid-century and save 11 million lives by 2030."

Extreme weather

Rising temperatures will reduce people's physical ability to work, with much of South Asia, sub-Saharan Africa and parts of Central and South America losing up to 250 working days a year by 2100.

An additional 1.7 billion people will be exposed to severe heat and an additional 420 million people subjected to extreme heatwaves if the planet warms by two degrees Celsius compared to 1.5 degrees -- the range laid out in the Paris Agreement.

By 2080, hundreds of millions of city dwellers in sub-Saharan Africa and South and Southeast Asia could face more than 30 days of deadly heat each year

Flooding on average will likely displace 2.7 million people annually in Africa. Without emissions cuts, more than 85 million people could be forced to leave their homes in sub-Saharan Africa due to climate induced impacts by 2050.

Some 170 million people are expected to be hit by extreme drought this century if warming reaches three degrees Celsius. The number of people in Europe at high risk of mortality will triple with three degrees Celsius warming compared to 1.5 degrees of warming.

Diseases and other impacts

As rising temperatures expand the habitat of mosquitoes, by 2050 half the world's population is predicted to be at risk of vector-borne diseases such as dengue fever, yellow fever and Zika virus.

Without significant reductions in carbon pollution, an additional 2.25 billion people could be put at risk of dengue fever across Asia, Europe and Africa. The number of people forced from their homes in Asia is projected to increase six-fold between 2020 and 2050.

By mid-century, between 31 and 143 million could be internally displaced due to water shortages, agricultural stresses, and sea level rise in sub-Saharan Africa, South Asia and Latin America

Much of what the study said is already happening now, and we could expect the worst, the UN climate study stressed.

Wars. Chaos

Much of the political, social and economic unrest and chaos in the world are caused by inequitable distribution of natural resources and their manipulation by only a few greedy owners who want control over these resources and their intended beneficiaries for political power and market dominance.

Such insatiable desire for power and global dominance is what has caused nations to unite against China—blaming this communist country of manufacturing in its laboratories the coronavirus that has gripped the world and caused economies to slow down.





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The military junta in Myanmar, which was triggered by the expulsion of some generals in the list of officials under the economically- fragile democratic government, has now caused untold sufferings, displacements, and hunger of young and old alike and the persecution of those who oppose the junta.

War-torn Afghanistan badly needs \$850 million to cope with the impact of the Taliban offensive, a protracted malnutrition affecting a third of the country, a severe drought and the repatriation of 627,000 Afghans this year, most of the deported from neighboring Iran.

UN Humanitarian chief Ramiz Alakbarov told reporters at a virtual briefing from Kabul that at least 80 million Afghans need assistance and the UN plan is to provide help for at least 15.7 million of them.

NASA Sea Level Change Science Team

Meanwhile, the NASA Sea Level Change Science Team spoke of "a dramatic increase in flood numbers" in the 2030s that should be expected because of a "wobble" in the moon's orbit and rising sea levels, which expectedly would lead to more high tides in every coast of the United States.

A story of USA Today cited the conclusion of a study published in the Nature Climate Change journal by NASA Sea Level Change Science Team from the University of Hawaii,on the moon's orbit, which takes 18.6 years to complete, according to NASA.

For half of that time, Earth's regular daily tides are suppressed with high tides at a low average and low tides happening at a higher rate. In the other half of the cycle, the opposite occurs.

"High tides get higher, and low tides get lower. Global sea-level rise pushes high tides in only one direction – higher. So half of the 18.6-year lunar cycle counteracts the effect of sea-level rise on high tides, and the other half increases the effect," NASA explains.

"If it floods 10 or 15 times a month, a business can't keep operating with its parking lot underwater. People lose their jobs because they cannot get to work. Seeping cesspools become a public health issue," said Phil Thompson, an assistant professor at the University of Hawaii and lead author of the study.

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Do plastic recycling methods work? New report offers different solution

Limiting the production of plastic and not mechanical or chemical recycling is the true solution to the swelling problem of plastic waste pollution in the environment, including the

world's oceans.

This could be gleaned as the main takeaway from the new report titled "Plastic Waste Management Hazards: Waste-to-Energy, Chemical Recycling and Plastic Fuels," which local environmental group EcoWaste Coalition highlighted on Wednesday, July 21.

The report "provides a detailed account of how current investments in recycling schemes, both mechanical and chemical, will have very little impact on a growing, worldwide plastic pollution problem and will increase exposure to toxic chemicals in the communities where they are located," the group said.

As such, the coalition together with the Interfacing Development Interventions for Sustainability (IDIS) and Mother Earth Foundation (MEF) have echoed the urgency of limiting the manufacture of plastic to essential uses and eliminating toxic chemicals in plastic production.

Carried out by Japan-based International Pellet Watch (IPW) and Sweden-based International Pollutants Elimination Network (IPEN), the report concluded that plastic waste management via chemical recycling, plastic-to-fuel, and incineration methods is generating high volumes of highly hazardous waste and toxic emissions.

Lee Bell, report co-author and IPEN Policy Advisor on Persistent Organic Pollutants (POPs), said: "No current management method for plastic waste is capable of alleviating the world's expanding plastic pollution crisis. All methods generate significant toxic hazards because of the toxic additives that are a component of most plastic products. Industry's championing of various recycling schemes is a marketing ploy designed to fend off plastic regulation and efforts to curb an escalating plastic pollution problem."

"The only solution to the plastic waste piling up in our communities and oceans is to limit plastic production to essential uses and eliminate the use of toxic chemicals in plastics," he emphasized.

EcoWaste Coalition, IDIS, and MEF are members of IPEN.





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The same report says plastic production is expected to grow exponentially (from 335 million tons produced in 2016 to 1,800 million tons by 2050) as the petrochemical industry adapts to a carbon-constrained environment by shifting from fuels to the production of chemicals and plastics.

It added that approximately three-quarters of the 8,300 million tons of plastic produced since the 1950s has become waste, and that unless current practices change, 108 million tons of plastic waste will be landfilled, dumped, or openly burned in 2050, mainly in low-income countries.

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Climate envoy says US, China must end world's 'suicide pact'

Temperatures in London hit 86 degrees Fahrenheit (30 Celsius) on Tuesday.

LONDON—US climate envoy John Kerry called on China to join America in urgently cutting greenhouse gas emissions and described the international alliances that rebuilt Europe after World War II as a model for fighting against climate change.

Kerry challenged global leaders to accelerate the actions needed to curb rising temperatures and pull the world back from the edge of the abyss. "Allies, partners, competitors and even adversaries" must work together, he said during a speech at London's Kew Gardens, a UNESCO World Heritage site where scientists are working to protect plants from global warming.

"The climate crisis is the test of our own times, and while it may be unfolding in slow motion, to some, this test is as acute and as existential as any previous one," Kerry said. "Time is running out."

Kerry described the next decade as decisive, saying countries around the world must speed up efforts to reduce greenhouse gas emissions if they are to meet their commitment to limit temperature increases to no more than 1.5 degrees Celsius over pre-industrial levels.

While many countries have pledged to eliminate net carbon emissions by 2050, the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change says emissions must be cut by at least 40 percent by the end of the decade to keep temperatures in check.

Organizers of the next United Nations climate summit are calling the November event in Glasgow, Scotland "the world's last best chance to get runaway climate change under control." The primary goal of the meeting, known as COP26, is for countries to set "ambitious" targets for reducing greenhouse gas emissions by 2030.

To meet these targets, countries need to phase out the use of coal, reduce deforestation, accelerate the shift to electric vehicles and encourage investment in renewable energy, according to the conference organizers.

China, the United States and India are the world's biggest emitters of greenhouse gases, meaning efforts to control climate change are likely to fail unless all three lead the way in slashing emissions.

Kerry referred to the often tense relationship between the US and China but said the future depended on their cooperation. Both countries also need to raise their ambitions, he said.





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"It is not a mystery that China and the US have many differences. But on climate, cooperation is the only way to break free from the world's current mutual suicide pact," he said. "President Biden and President Xi have both stated unequivocally that each will cooperate on climate despite other consequential differences. America needs China to succeed in slashing emissions. China needs America to do the same."

China's output of climate-wrecking pollution surged in the last decade as its economy boomed, especially as it kept operating, building and financing new, dirty-burning coal-fired power plants.

The Rhodium Group analysis firm reported in May that China as of 2019 was pumping out more than 27 percent of all climate-damaging emissions globally. That's more than the United States, which stood at 11 percent, and more than the rest of the developed world combined, Rhodium said.

The Trump administration and others in the United States pointed to China's lead role in climate damage in justifying the rolling back of many emissions-cutting efforts in the US. China and other developing economies, meanwhile, say Western nations most responsible for the global-warming that occurred in the past are asking them to rein in their own development with little or no compensation.

Antony Froggatt, an energy policy consultant at the Chatham House think tank in London, applauded Kerry's speech for highlighting the urgent need for action—for all.

"There is an acceptance from...one of the highest climate change officials in the world that climate change is here, it's real, it's having an impact, and its future impact will be equivalent to sort of a global war...and therefore we need to do things now," Froggatt said. "That isn't just America, that isn't just the EU. It is India. It is China. It is these major emitters that actually need to take action on the real short term and demonstrate that they are changing emissions levels." **AP**

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Wildfires' pollution hits NY

ALBANY: New York and parts of the eastern United States and Canada were shrouded in a gray smoky haze on Tuesday (Wednesday in Manila) from fires burning in the western United States and Canada.

New York state's environmental protection services issued an air quality advisory, automatically triggered when fine particle matter is expected to rise above 35 micrograms per cubic meter of air.

An expert from the agency said it is not uncommon for smoke from fires in the west of the country to reach the New York area, but they usually remain high enough to not affect air quality. This time, the smoke was lower than usual, the expert said.

The phenomenon was set to dissipate on Wednesday with the arrival of a cold front in the New York region, said a spokesman for the US National Weather Service.

Several large fires have ravaged the western United States in recent days - notably in California, Nevada and Oregon, where the dangerous Bootleg Fire is still raging, even though the fire season has only just begun.

In Canada, more than 2,000 people have been evacuated in recent days in the province of Ontario, the most populous in the country, and more than 200 fires were active in the province and neighboring Manitoba, according to official figures on Tuesday.

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Canada declares fire emergency

OTTAWA: Canada's western province of British Columbia declared a state of emergency on Tuesday (Wednesday in Manila), with wildfires expected to grow even larger in the coming days due to high heat and winds.

"We have reached a critical point," said provincial Public Safety Minister Mike Farnworth. "Based on the advice of emergency management and wildfire officials, and my briefing last night on the worsening weather, I am declaring a provincial state of emergency."

The decision empowers officials to organize mass-scale evacuations and to provide emergency accommodation for evacuees, he added.

Some 5,700 people were under evacuation orders in the province on Tuesday - more than double the previous day's tally as the threatened region grew in size. Around 32,000 more residents have been placed on alert.

"Please have an evacuation plan ready for your family," said Cliff Chapman, director of operations for British Columbia's wildfire service. "From working in this branch for 20 years, I would be taking my family out if I was on an evacuation order today."

Fires have been ravaging western Canada and the US West Coast for several weeks following a scorching heat wave in late June that experts have tied to climate change.

Chapman said around 1,200 square miles has already gone up in smoke in British Columbia - more than three times higher than the average area typically burnt by this point in the year.

The province has nearly 300 active wildfires, spurred by hot, dry weather that is expected to continue in the coming days in addition to rising winds that may spread the flames.

The interior and southwest of British Columbia, including part of its border with the United States, are particularly affected. More than 3,000 firefighters are currently battling blazes across the province.

In the United States, more than 80 large fires are burning, the biggest of which is in the Pacific Northwest state of Oregon. The Bootleg Fire has scorched almost 390,000 acres - an area bigger than Los Angeles.

"Fighting this fire is a marathon, not a sprint," Rob Allen, the incident commander for firefighters in the zone, said in a statement on Tuesday. "We're in this for as long as it takes to safely confine this monster."

Smoke has reached as far afield as the eastern United States and Canada, parts of which were shrouded in a gray smoky haze on Tuesday.

New York state's environmental protection services issued an air quality advisory.

Wildfires have been plaguing several US states for almost two weeks now due to thick forests in many US counties that have been untouched for decades. The fires are so brutal, forcing firefighters to rely on rain to help them put out the fire.





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PH Covid-19 recoveries reach 1,449,579

MANILA – The nation's total number of recovered coronavirus disease 2019 (Covid-19) cases has reached 1,449,579 after 5,326 more recoveries were reported on Wednesday.

In its latest case bulletin, the Department of Health (DOH) noted that recoveries account for 95.1 percent of the total case Covid-19 count which has reached 1,524,449 since the start of the pandemic last year.

The agency also reported 6,560 new cases, bringing the total number of active cases to 47,996. About 92.1 percent of these active cases are mild, 1.8 percent are asymptomatic, 1.6 percent are critical, 2.6 percent are severe, and 1.84 percent are moderate.

Some 32 new deaths were also reported, pushing the country's total number of Covid-19 fatalities to 26,874.

According to DOH data on July 19, about 12 percent of 36,168 who were tested turned out positive for Covid-19.

"Some 14 duplicates were removed from the total case count, and of these, eight were recovered cases and two are deaths. Moreover, 30 cases that were previously tagged as recovered were reclassified as deaths after final validation," the DOH said.

All laboratories were operational on July 19 while four laboratories were not able to submit their data to the Covid-19 Document Repository System (CDRS).

The DOH noted the four non-reporting laboratories contribute, on average, 1.1 percent of samples tested, and 1.5 percent of positive individuals based on data in the last 14 days.

To date, 55 percent of 3,600 intensive care unit beds, 47 percent of 19,600 isolation beds, 43 percent of 12,000 ward beds, and 36 percent of 2,000 ventilators are utilized by patients with Covid-19 nationwide.

Meanwhile, 42 percent of 1,100 intensive care unit beds, 40 percent of 4,700 isolation beds, 33 percent of 3,400 ward beds, and 34 percent of 1,000 ventilators dedicated to patients with Covid-19 are in use in the National Capital Region. (*PNA*)

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More than 4.1 million dead from COVID-19, 191 million infected worldwide

The novel coronavirus has killed at least 4,119,920 people since the outbreak emerged in China in December 2019, according to a tally from official sources compiled by AFP at 1000 GMT (6 p.m. Philippine time) on Wednesday.

At least 191,365,730 cases of coronavirus have been registered. The vast majority have recovered, though some have continued to experience symptoms weeks or even months later.

The figures are based on daily reports provided by health authorities in each country.

They exclude revisions made by other statistical organizations, which show that the number of deaths is much higher.

The World Health Organization estimates that the pandemic's overall toll could be two to three times higher than official records, due to the excess mortality that is directly and indirectly linked to Covid-19.

A large number of the less severe or asymptomatic cases also remain undetected, despite intensified testing in many countries.

On Tuesday, 17,230 new deaths and 565,708 new cases were recorded worldwide.

Based on latest reports, the countries with the most new deaths were Ecuador with 8,786 new deaths, followed by India with 3,998 and Brazil with 1,424.

The United States is the worst-affected country with 609,529 deaths from 34,174,774 cases.

After the US, the hardest-hit countries are Brazil with 544,180 deaths from 19,419,437 cases, India with 418,480 deaths from 31,216,337 cases, Mexico with 236,810 deaths from 2,678,297 cases, and Peru with 195,332 deaths from 2,096,013 cases.

The country with the highest number of deaths compared to its population is Peru with 592 fatalities per 100,000 inhabitants, followed by Hungary with 311, Bosnia-Herzegovina with 295, Czech Republic with 283, and Republic of North Macedonia with 263.





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Latin America and the Caribbean overall has 1,344,677 deaths from 39,666,383 cases, Europe 1,189,969 deaths from 56,825,174 infections, and the United States and Canada 636,037 deaths from 35,598,994 cases.

Asia has reported 632,424 deaths from 42,911,720 cases, Africa 159,668 deaths from 6,299,406 cases, Middle East 155,888 deaths from 9,992,563 cases, and Oceania 1,257 deaths from 71,495 cases.

As a result of corrections by national authorities or late publication of data, the figures updated over the past 24 hours may not correspond exactly to the previous day's tallies.

Granular lockdowns, integrated contact tracing app eyed for Metro Manila

MANILA, Philippines — Contact tracing app integration and granular lockdowns are the measures being eyed in Metro Manila to curb the spread of the more infectious COVID-19 Delta variant, according to Mayor Francis Zamora.

Zamora said months had passed for the national and local governments to integrate contact tracing apps for a streamlined reporting and detection of COVID-19 cases.

The measure should be implemented amid the threat of the Delta variant, Zamora said.

"There should be a uniform contact tracing app," Zamora told "The Chiefs" on OneNews/TV 5 on Wednesday night.

The governments of Pasig, Mandaluyong, Valenzuela and Antipolo have merged their contact tracing systems.

"Contact tracing is very important to detect COVID cases, especially the Delta variant," Zamora said.

Meanwhile, San Juan started inoculating its residents using Johnson & Johnson's single-dose vaccine at the FilOil Flying V Center yesterday.

The local government received 2,800 doses of J&J vaccine out of the 1.6 million doses donated by the US government through the COVAX Facility.

Seniors get J&J vaccines

Meanwhile, local governments in northern Metro Manila have allocated J&J vaccines for senior citizens.

Navotas Mayor Toby Tiangco said 1,600 doses of the single-shot vaccine would go to the city's elderly.

At least 300 seniors have registered for vaccination using J&J vaccines.





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Valenzuela received 4,000 doses of the Janssen vaccines.

The vaccination of senior citizens using the J&J doses will start today, according to city information officer Zyan Caiña.

"This is a single-shot dosage so our seniors will have to leave their homes only once," Mayor Rex Gatchalian said.

Caloocan administered 7,500 doses of J&J vaccine for senior citizens yesterday. The city received 10,300 doses.

Malabon also got 2,600 doses of the singe-shot vaccine.

COVID-19 Delta variant to dominate within months — WHO

GENEVA, Switzerland — The highly contagious Delta variant of COVID-19 is expected to become the dominant strain of the virus over the coming months, the World Health Organization said Wednesday.

Delta, which was first detected in India, has now been recorded in 124 territories — 13 more than last week — and already accounts for more than three-quarters of sequenced specimens in many major countries, the WHO said.

"It is expected that it will rapidly out-compete other variants and become the dominant circulating lineage over the coming months," the UN health agency said in its weekly epidemiological update.

Of the three other coronavirus variants of concern (VOCs), Alpha, first detected in Britain, has been reported in 180 territories (up six from last week), Beta, first detected in South Africa, in 130 (up seven) and Gamma, first detected in Brazil, in 78 (up three).

According to SARS-CoV-2 sequences submitted to the GISAID global science initiative over the four weeks to July 20, the prevalence of Delta exceeded 75 percent in several countries.

Those included Australia, Bangladesh, Botswana, Britain, China, Denmark, India, Indonesia, Israel, Portugal, Russia, Singapore and South Africa.

"Growing evidence supports the increased transmissibility of the Delta variant as compared to non-VOCs. However, the exact mechanism for the increase in transmissibility remains unclear," said the WHO.

Cases up 12%

The Geneva-based organisation said overall, 3.4 million new COVID-19 cases were reported in the week to July 18 — up 12 percent on the week before.

"At this rate, it is expected that the cumulative number of cases reported globally could exceed 200 million in the next three weeks," said the WHO.





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The organisation said the global increases in transmission appeared to be driven by four factors: more transmissible variants; the relaxation of public health measures; increased social mixing and large numbers of unvaccinated people.

Cases were up 30 percent in the WHO's Western Pacific region and up 21 percent in its European region.

The highest numbers of new cases were reported from Indonesia (350,273 new cases; up 44 percent), Britain (296,447 new cases; up 41 percent), and Brazil (287,610 new cases; down 14 percent).

The number of weekly deaths, however, remained steady at 57,000, similar to the previous week and following a steady decline for more than two months.

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Calls for smoke-free environment to aid in Covid-19 fight intensify

Health experts and advocates have stressed that everyone deserves to live in an environment conducive for their health and well-being.

Amid the Covid-19 pandemic, they have also underscored the need for a smoke-free environment fearing that those exposed to smoke have an increased possibility of contracting the virus while smokers increase their chances of developing severe cases of Covid-19.

Dr. Beverly Ho, Health Promotion Bureau Director of the Department of Health (DOH), also emphasized during the online conference last week titled "Building and Celebrating Tobacco Control Champions: Promoting, Defending, and Institutionalizing Smoke-Free Environment Policies," that smoking "weakens the lungs."

"Smoking increases an individual's risk of developing Covid-19. Tobacco use damages the lungs, making the smoker and those exposed more vulnerable to Covid-19," Ho said.

Ho lauded the efforts of lawmakers and different groups in pushing the measures for a smoke-free environment.

New risks

Lawyer Jacky T. Sarita, Managing Director of HealthJustice, also reiterated the warning of the World Health Organization (WHO) that Covid-19 brings new risks for tobacco users.

"As early as April last year, WHO said that smokers are more likely to develop severe cases of Covid-19, compared to non-smokers," Atty. Sarita noted.

A WHO scientific brief highlighted the link between smoking and more severe Covid-19 and death. It stated that smokers and vapers may be "vulnerable" to contracting Covid-19 "as the act of smoking involves contact of fingers with the lips, which increases the possibility of transmission of viruses from hand to mouth."

The same warning was given by the DOH based on a review of studies by health experts convened by WHO which indicated that smokers are vulnerable to complications brought by the virus.

Pending bills

There are three smoke-free environment bills pending in Congress. In the Senate, Senator Ronald dela Rosa sponsored Senate Bill 1976, while Representative John Marvin "Yul Servo" Nieto of the 3rd District of Manila backed House Bill (HB) 8754. Representatives Nina Taduran, Eric Yap, and Jocelyn Pua-Teo, all of the ACT-CIS partylist, sponsored HB 8763.





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These bills sought to expand the coverage of the smoking ban in Republic Act 9211 or the Tobacco Regulations Act of 2003 to include all public places, prohibition in the establishment of indoor smoking areas, and strengthen the power of local government units to enact stricter smoke-free ordinances.

If enacted into law it is expected to help reduce the transmission of Covid-19; lessen the number of people who will die due to tobacco smoke; protect the Filipino people from the harmful effects of secondhand smoke; provide an environment for smokers to quit, and prevent smoking initiation among the youth.

As the country battles the Covid-19 pandemic, Taduran said that now is the best time to make the bill into law.

"In this crucial time, when the deadly Covid-19 is plaguing countries all around the world, smoking amplifies the risk brought about by the virus," Taduran said.

More support needed

Although she was happy with the increasing number of health champions across all government branches supporting the bill, Rep. Helen Tan, House Committee of Health Chairperson and one of the co-sponsors of HB 8763, is still hoping that more people will join them to "achieve a healthy environment and protect Filipinos from the dangers of second-hand smoke and third-hand smoke."

"It is the right of health among Filipinos to live in a community and environment that are free from diseases caused by tobacco smoke," Tan said.

"Apart from this, smoking areas are one of the transmission hotspots of the Covid-19 virus," she added.

Meanwhile, Rep. Amihilda Sangcopan, co-sponsor of HB 8763 stressed that smoking is also a financial burden for smokers.

"Hindi lamang ang bulsa natin ang unti-unting sinusunog ng bisyo ng paninigarilyo, bagkus, binabayaran din natin ito [Smoking doesn't only burn a hole in your pocket but also] at the expense of our own health and the health of others," the Anak-Mindanao partylist lawmaker said.

DepEd joins the call

Education Secretary Leonor Magtolis Briones has also joined calls for the immediate passage of the Smoke-free Environment Bill.

Briones expressed her strong support for the bill stressing that she is personally an advocate of a smoke-free environment.

The DepEd chief shared that her father died at an early age of 54 due to a stroke caused by extreme tobacco use.

"My two bothers also followed the same path of early deaths," she said.

"My faith has taught me not to destroy the body because it is God's temple especially not to destroy it through vices," the DepEd chief stressed," as she recalled that when she was with Social Watch, she was actively campaigning for tobacco-control policies.

"In this conference, we have talked about legislative measures that will effectively curb the tobacco use in this country. But beyond the legalese, the language, and legislative jargon, what we are really talking about are the dreams of our young people that can only be achieved if they grow up healthy and free from the harm of tobacco use," she said and assured that schools in the country "have always been smoke free."





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She stressed that they do this mainly not only to protect the learners but "to protect them from situations that normalize the tobacco use and make it appealing to them."

Smoke-free Philippines

Ernesto Ofracio, President of the Aktibong Kilusan Tungo sa Iisang Bayan(AKTIB), an alliance of community and sectoral organizations pushing for the right of Filipinos to health, expressed during the online conference his delight for the support lawmakers have shown to have a 100 percent smoke-free Philippines.

He pleaded to the President Duterte to certify as urgent the proposed measure. "Kami po ay nakiusap sa ating mahal na Pangulo na icertify ang [We are appealing to our beloved President to certify] HB 8763," Ofracio said.

For her part, Ritz dela Rosa, a student leader from Ramon Magsaysay High School, expressed her alarm over the high number of Filipino youth who are put in danger due to their exposure to second hand smoke.

Data from the 2015 Global Adult Tobacco Survey indicated that 24.0 million adults were exposed to tobacco smoke at home; 20.2 million were exposed to tobacco smoke in public transportation; 8.1 million were exposed to tobacco smoke in restaurants; and 3.6 million adults were exposed to tobacco smoke in enclosed areas at their workplace.

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
PASASALAMAT SA MALASAKIT CENTER


