EO 130 seen leading to lifting of open-pit mining ban

When President Duterte, through an executive order (EO), instructed the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) to review all the country's existing mineral agreements, did he also give the agency the green light to finally lift the ban on open-pit mines?

"It's a separate interpretation to be provided by the DENR chief," said Wilfredo Moncano, director of the Mines and Geoscience Bureau. "While the EO covered all [mining] operations... the secretary must still issue an administrative order to address [the ban on open pit mining]."

As it stands, the weeks ahead are especially crucial for miners. Environment Secretary Roy Cimatu is set to gather his team to interpret the President's directive through the issuance of the EO 130's implementing rules and regulations (IRR).

Thereafter, the environment chief may or may not issue an administrative order that would lift the ban on open-pit mines based on meetings among members of the technical working group. The ban on open-pit mining has been in place for four years now.

Environmental concerns

Open-pit or surface mining has been a contentious issue among miners and environmental advocates. The Chamber of Mines of the Philippines (COMP) said it is a globally accepted mining method. Alyansa Tigil Mina and Kalikasan People's Network for the Environment insist this mining technique has caused extensive environmental damage.

Currently, there are mining companies employing the open-pit method.

The Chamber said the government must put in place stable policies if it wanted the industry to move forward and decide where it stands on the issue of open-pit mining as well as the suspension orders issued during the term of the late former DENR chief, Regina Paz Lopez.

Both industry players and the environmentalists are also looking at how the government would define "responsible mining," which should be made clear in the IRR of EO 130.

Leon Dulce, national coordinator for Kalikasan, believes the People's Mining Bill "provides us with an earnest attempt" to do mineral extraction sustainably. The bill includes raising the industry's taxation regime to 10 percent from the current average of 4 percent (9 percent for those that pay royalties), and further raising the royalties imposed to 10 percent from 5 percent.

Stringent mining laws

According to COMP officials Gerard Brimo and Rocky Dimaculangan, the Philippines already has one of the most stringent mining laws in the world.

"We are one of the few mining countries that require setting aside funds for social development programs ... We are also one of the few mining countries that require every large-scale metallic operator to secure ISO certifications on environmental management," they said.

"When the Asean (Association of Southeast Asian Nations) Mineral Awards was launched in 2017, the best metallic mine and processing plant was adjudged to be in the Philippines, as voted no less than by the various Asean mining minsters, surely an evidence, if it was ever needed, that responsible mining does exist in our country," they added.

One thing is clear: both sides of the spectrum recognize that consumers depend on metals and minerals for just about everything—from building houses and vehicles to gadgets and appliances.

"Mining can provide a meaningful opportunity for economic expansion by encouraging both foreign and domestic firms to expand. We do have to highlight that any expansion must still be governed by standards designed to protect our environment and ensure responsible and sustainable mining practices," said Nicholas Mapa, senior economist at ING Bank Manila.

"Given that the government has cited this EO as a move to bolster increasingly empty coffers, authorities should look to increase royalties on windfall or super-profits to maximize the impact on the fiscal position ... [they] may also relax some tariffs on imported machinery given the high capital requirements for the industry while still ensuring that local labor is employed with proper safety and guidelines enforced," he added. Philippine government lifts moratorium on mineral agreements

In a bid to strengthen the country's financial position to fund various government projects, President Rodrigo Duterte issued Executive Order ("EO") No. 130 – Series of 2021 which amended Section 4 of EO No. 17 – Series of 2012.

Section 4 of EO No. 17 prohibited the execution of new mineral agreements pending legislation rationalizing existing revenue sharing schemes and mechanisms. EO No. 130, however, lifted this prohibition and now permits the Philippine Government, through the Secretary of the Department of Energy and Natural Resources ("DENR"),¹ to enter into new mineral agreements, subject to compliance with Republic Act No. 7942, otherwise known as the "Philippine Mining Act of 1995" ("Mining Act") and other applicable laws, rules and regulations.

Terms and Conditions of the New Mineral Agreements

In contradistinction with EO No. 17 which passively waits upon Congress to pass new legislation amending the current fiscal structure of mineral agreements, EO No. 130 instructed the DENR to prescribe the terms and conditions of the new mineral agreements that would "maximize government revenues and share in the production" and to possibly declare mineral reservations to collect appropriate royalties pursuant to Chapter II, Section 5 of the Mining Act. EO No. 130 also mandated the DENR and the Department of Finance ("DOF") to undertake appropriate measures to rationalize existing revenue sharing schemes and mechanics.

The DENR's formulation of the required terms and conditions as well as the fiscal structure governing agreements under the purview of the Mining Act is not novel. For instance, Chapter VII, Section 56 of DENR Administrative Order No. 21-10 or the Implementing Rules and Regulations ("Mining Act IRR") of the Mining Act prescribes additional terms and conditions mandated to be incorporated in the financial or technical assistance agreement ("FTAA"), on top of the stipulations enumerated under Chapter VI, Section 35 of the Mining Act. Furthermore, supplementary to Chapter XIV, Section 80 of the Mining Act, DENR Administrative Order ("DAO") No. 99 – 56 dated 27 December 1999 or the "Guidelines Establishing the Fiscal Regime of Financial or Technical Assistance Agreements" mandates the collection of "additional government share" for FTAAs, in addition to the basic government share which includes the contractor's (a) corporate income tax, (b) excise tax, (c) special allowance, (d) withholding tax due from the contractor's foreign stockholders arising from dividend or interest payments they received; and (d) other taxes, duties and fees. The Supreme Court in La Bugal-B'laan Tribal Association, Inc. v. Ramos (G.R. No. 127882, 1 December 2004) confirmed the constitutionality of DAO No. 99-56, explaining that the phrase "among other things" signified the government's entitlement to "additional government share."

Chapter II, Section 5 of the Mining Act provides that when national interest requires, the President, upon recommendation of the Secretary of the DENR, may establish mineral reservations. In this connection, Chapter 1, Section 13 of the Mining Act IRR provides the payment of royalty amounting to at least "five percent (5%) of the market value of the gross output of the minerals/mineral products extracted or produced from the Mineral Reservations exclusive of all other taxes."

For mineral agreements, the mandatory terms and conditions thereof are set out under Chapter VI, Section 39 of DENR Administrative Order No. 21-10. In relation to the prescribed profit-sharing mechanism in mineral production sharing agreements, Chapter XIV, Section 80 of the Mining Act limits the total government share on the excise tax on mineral products under Section 151(a) of the National Internal Revenue Code of 1997, as amended. Notably, unlike FTAA, the DENR has not issued any administrative order adopting a similar financial regime for mineral production sharing agreements. The absence of DENR issuance on mineral production sharing agreements may be due to the wording of Chapter XIV, Section 80 of the Mining Act which lacks the phrase "among other things" found in FTAAs, effectively limiting the government share on mineral production sharing agreements to excise tax on mineral products. Thus, without proper legislation, it appears that the DENR and DOF may be constrained from finding ways to meet its mandate under EO No. 130.

Environmental Protection

EO No. 130 also recognized that the DENR has already issued rules and regulations to avoid environmental degradation brought about by mining activities. As part of the environmental protection program of the DENR, the Mining Act IRR requires the submission of an Environmental Compliance Certificate ("ECC") and Environmental Protection and Enhancement Program ("EPEP") for applications of mineral agreements.² An ECC is a document issued by the DENR, certifying that "the proposed project or undertaking will not cause a significant negative environmental impact; that the proponent has complied with all the requirements of the Environmental Impact Assessment System; and that the proponent is committed to implement its approved Environmental Management Plan in the Environmental Impact Statement or mitigation measures in the Initial Environmental Examination." Meanwhile, an EPEP "shall provide a description of the expected and considered acceptable impacts and shall set out the life-of-mine environmental protection and enhancement strategies based on best practice in environmental management in mining," among others.⁴

Further, a Certificate of Environmental Management and Community Relations Record is required as a condition for the approval of any mineral agreements.⁵ Finally, applicants for mineral agreements involving exploration activities are required to submit an Environmental Work Program ("EWP") which "shall provide a description of the expected and considered acceptable impacts and shall set out the environmental protection and enhancement strategies based on best practice in environmental management in mineral explanation," among others.⁶ The contents of EWP are notably similar with the contents of EPEP but an EWP is only required for mineral agreements which undertake exploration activities. Operation of mining projects without an

approved or revised EPEP exposes contractors/permit holders to criminal penalties prescribed under the Mining Act.⁷

Review of Existing Mining Contracts

It should be noted that EO No. 17 requires the DENR to undertake a review of existing mining contracts and agreements for possible renegotiation of the terms and conditions, which in all cases shall be mutually acceptable to the government and the mining contractor.

There is no doubt that lifting of the moratorium could potentially boost government collection to fund its projects, especially in light of the COVID-19 pandemic. This also effectively utilizes the State's natural resources to aid the country's failing economy. Notwithstanding, a legislative amendment of the Mining Act to widen government shares is an equally pressing matter to cure the measly government share (i.e. 4% excise tax) from mining production sharing agreements.

Faith-based groups to Duterte: Reconsider the lifting on the ban on new mining permits

Faith-based organizations composed of Catholic, Protestant and Evangelical churches have expressed grave alarm over the lifting of the ban on issuing licenses for new mining operations by the Office of the President.

In a joint statement, the groups said "this may lead to the entry of many mining companies, if and when the 291 filed mining applications are approved."

"We would like to remind the president, that large-scale mining, which may contribute to the economy due to an increase in excise taxes, will only be for a short-term. Because mining operations are almost always in mountains and forested areas – the focal ecosystems – our other ecosystems will also be affected as well," read the statement posted by FBO PH on their Facebook page Friday, April 23.

They said the short term benefit is not commensurate to the long term destruction and loss on our ecosystem and in the future of our country.

"Mining companies are notorious for violating safety standards for their workers, affected communities and the environment. Our people have been victims of the destructive effects of large-scale mining on our forests, rivers, lakes, seas, air and on our biodiversity," read the statement.

They added that human rights violations – especially against indigenous peoples, peasants, fisher folks, women and children, and environmental defenders – are rampant where these companies operate, most often perpetrated and backed by security forces.

Mining activities, they said, have also brought serious health hazards to communities and exploited the health and labor of mine workers.

"Scientists have pointed out that environmental destruction and climate change are major causes why diseases like COVID-19 are now in our midst. Thus, further opening up our country to further mining activities will only exacerbate our vulnerability to COVID-19 and other diseases," the statement read.

"It is in this regard that we call on President Rodrigo R. Duterte to reconsider the lifting on the ban on new mining permits," it further read.

SA: DENR-NCR is giving away free fruits, vegetables seedlings in 'Community Pan-TREE'

In celebration of Earth Day this year, a new community pantry distributing seedlings instead of food has been established in Quezon City.

Called "Community Pan-Tree," this is an initiative of the Department of Environment and Natural Resources-National Capital Region.

The pan-tree is located at DENR-NCR's headquarters in Quezon City and is open to the public from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

In a Facebook post, the agency said it hopes that this program will encourage residents of Metro Manila to start urban gardening and help them cope with pandemic stress.

"In celebration of Earth Day 2021 and to help Metro Manilans cope with the stress caused by the pandemic through urban gardening and planting, DENR National Capital Region will be establishing a Community Pan-TREE," it said.

"Inspired by the various community pantries that started sprouting in various areas of the country, DENR National Capital Region's Community Pan-TREE will be giving away seedlings of fruit-bearing trees and vegetables to those in need. Private individuals and groups who share a passion for urban greening may also donate plants in support of the project," it added.

DENR-NCR also hoped that this initiative will address the issue of food security in the region, amid the pandemic and the changing climate.

To those who will drop by, the agency advised them to bring their own pots and other recyclable containers. They also reminded residents to observe the mandated minimum health protocols.

In a separate post, DENR-NCR shared photos of people lining up to get seedlings. Seedlings that were distributed include fruit-bearing trees atis, bayabas, bignay, guyabano, and lipote, as well as seedlings of eggplant, tomato, and other vegetables.

In an interview with ABS-CBN, DENR Regional Executive Director Jacqueline Caancan said that their goal is to distribute seedlings several people as possible.

Citing the slogan of the Maginhawa community pantry, Caancan also quipped that their version is: "Magtanim ayon sa kakayahan. Umani ayon sa pangangailangan."

The official also assured that the agency has plans to establish more community pan-trees in other parts of the region.

"Just as we worry about our health during these times, we also need to worry about the health of Mother Earth. And to restore her health, we must contribute by doing our part as responsible stewards, to plant more trees and reduce our ecological footprints," she <u>said</u>.

Community pantries spread across Metro Manila and some provinces after organizer Ana Patricia Non <u>started it</u> in Maginhawa Street in Quezon City.

Other similar bayanihan initiatives were also launched after. These include a free <u>online library for literature lovers</u>, <u>a go-to hub for hygiene kits</u>, <u>free breakfast taho and coffee</u>, and <u>a pantry dedicated for delivery riders</u>.

Obscene waste

Can you eat sand? Can the view of a magnificent sunset from an artificial beach feed you and your family, or cure COVID-19?

Everyone knows the answers to these questions. No, no, and certainly not.

And yet, in the midst of what is undoubtedly the most serious health, economic, and policy crisis the country has faced since World War II, the government continues to spend precious funds—to the tune of P389 million—to create an artificial beach on a short stretch of seaside on Manila Bay.

Environmentalists have sounded the alarm on the disastrous effects of the "dolomite beach," from environmental damage to the surrounding waters, to flooding and sewerage build-up, and even to the loss of livelihood of fisherfolk.

But to these concerns must be added the context against which the beach project takes place. The COVID-19 pandemic has wreaked havoc on whole families, neighborhoods, livelihoods, and the economy as a whole. Apart from the cloud of grief that hovers over so many as the number of deaths and infirmities keeps rising steadily—the total number of confirmed cases is set to reach a million in the next few days—there is the economic black hole into which the crisis has plunged the people.

Widespread and lengthy lockdowns have led to the closure of establishments and the consequent massive loss of jobs. This has led to unprecedented hunger for a great many families, the impact of which is felt not just in the short term, but also in long-term consequences especially among children on whom stunting and poor nutrition have already inflicted lifelong damage.

Recognizing the reality of hunger and the growing desperation of impoverished folk, a young woman entrepreneur set up a "community pantry" from which folks could avail themselves of free foodstuff donated by concerned individuals. The community pantry on Maginhawa Street in Quezon City has, in just a few days, influenced more than 350 other individuals, groups, and institutions to set up their own versions of the free larder. But, bizarrely, this has earned the ire of state-sponsored anti-communist groups and troll brigades. What are they so irate about? The long lines at all hours of the day at these community pantries are proof that the problem of hunger is real and urgent, and that wrong priorities on the part of the government lie at the root of this crisis.

The heaviest toll of COVID-19 is being felt in the health sector, as dramatic stories of patients rushed to hospitals only to die in their cars, in hallways outside emergency rooms, or unattended in quarantine tents fill the media. Health care personnel tell of their frustration and fear as the continuing lack of personal protective equipment and regular testing put them at continued risk of infections, while they can only writhe in frustration as scarce hospital beds, monitors, ventilators, and other basic necessities in the COVID-19 fight hamper their best efforts to keep patients alive.

Obscene waste

In light of these fatal shortages, one wonders how much good P389 million could do if reallocated for those in urgent need of treatment, medication, and food. Certainly, much more good than an ersatz beach—adorned with artificial, ugly "rock formations," fronting a stretch of polluted water, and requiring costly upkeep—could contribute to the public welfare.

To defend themselves from charges of pursuing skewed priorities when other far more urgent matters call for attention and a responsive budget, the Department of Environment and Natural Resources has said the budget for the project had already been approved as part of long-term efforts to rehabilitate the Bay. (An insane excuse at this point: If a household that had a budget for, say, landscaping or beautification refused to use that money to save a family member from a life-threatening illness or emergency, wouldn't that family be judged universally in harsh terms?) That fait accompli argument was likewise invoked by Cebu Gov. Gwendolyn Garcia when she approved a fresh shipment of dolomite sand from her province for the Manila Bay project. Ironically, the DENR is charged with protecting the environment and promoting ecologically sound practices and policies. It had no business in the first place proposing and defending such a hare-brained idea as a "dolomite beach."

That it continues to do so, and that the administration has not seen fit to stop this obscene waste while abject hunger and death stalk the land, is a testament to the lack of empathy, conscience, and clear thinking among the country's so-called leaders. As former vice president Jejomar Binay lamented in a tweet: "Some people in government have lost not only their compassion and sense of priorities but their common sense." Let them eat dolomite!

Mayors want DENR, HLURB to probe illegal sale of Guimaras lands

Local chief executives in Guimaras urged concerned authorities to investigate the alleged illegal selling and buying of lands in the island province.

This has become rampant, Nueva Valencia Mayor Emmanuel Galila said.

Buenavista Mayor Eugenio Reyes, Jordan Mayor Ruben Corpuz Sibunag Mayor Annabelle Samaniego, and San Lorenzo Mayor Niña Gajo also came out with a resolution directing the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) and the Housing and Land Use Regulatory Board (HLURB) to conduct an investigation. (https://bit.ly/3enzc96)

Owners, developers, operators or sellers of subdivision projects have not secured the necessary clearances and permits from local government units prior to commencing their land development projects, the mayors said.

"The lands being developed are not even classified as residential but agricultural. Thus these activities violate the provisions of Presidential Decree (PD) No. 957 (Subdivision and Condominium Buyers' Protective Decree) as amended by PD 1216," explained Galila.

The developers and sellers, he added, were subdividing lands into 200 square meters and would sell these at only P500 per square meter.

As the lands are not yet converted into residential ones, the mayors warned everyone not to be easily enticed by these offers.

Captured PH Eagle 'Tagoyaman' released back into wilds

Australian Ambassador to the Philippines Steven J. Robinson A.O. has joined Senator Juan Miguel Zubiri and other national and local officials in releasing a rescued and rehabilitated Philippine Eagle back to its forest home in Bukidnon province.

Tagoyaman Fernando is among the seven Philippine Eagles that were rescued last year – the highest rescue rate recorded in the history of Philippine Eagle conservation – and the first Philippine Eagle to be released back to the wild this year.

"The Australian Embassy is proud to continue our support to the Philippine Eagle Foundation for the protection and preservation of the Philippine Eagle. I traveled to Bukidnon to witness Tagoyaman's release because it is an important milestone in the Philippines' efforts in conserving local wildlife biodiversity," Ambassador Robinson said in a statement, adding that Australia stands with our friends in the Philippines as they protect their natural resources, in their lands or seas.

Tagoyaman's release coincided with the observance of Earth Day 2021 and was made possible through the support of the Australian Government, Whitley Fund for Nature, Jurong Bird Park, the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) Region X, and the local government of San Fernando and Bukidnon.

Philippine Eagle Foundation Executive Director Dennis Salvador said cited the challenges they faced in rescuing, rehabilitating and releasing Philippine Eagles in the middle of a pandemic.

"It's difficult to mobilize field operations when travel restrictions are imposed and sources of funds are shut down. Still, we are able to persevere, thanks to the support of the Australian Government and other conservation partners," said Salvador said during the short program in honor of Tagoyaman's release.

In October 2020, Tagoyaman was retrieved in San Fernando, Bukidnon after getting accidentally caught in a native trap intended for other animals. The bird was brought to the Philippine Eagle Center for check-up and rehabilitation.

Salvador said Tagoyaman's release on Earth Day is also a resounding call for long-term solutions to the problematic relationship with nature and wildlife.

"We believe that by conserving the Philippine Eagle and the biodiversity it represents, we can avoid another disease outbreak," he said.

The PEF conducted an education campaign targeting communities surrounding the release site and Indigenous forest guards were trained to perform voluntary forest patrols and monitor the bird's movements using the GPS transmitter attached to its back, for the next six months.

"We hope to see Tagoyaman successfully breed and contribute to his species' wild population in the future," said Dennis Salvador, Executive Director of the Philippine Eagle Foundation (PEF).

"His release on Earth Day is also our resounding call for long-term solutions to our problematic relationship with nature and wildlife. We believe that by conserving the Philippine Eagle and the biodiversity it represents, we can avoid another disease outbreak," Salvador added.

The PEF, in its statement, said Tagoyaman is the first Philippine Eagle to be released back into the wild this year and he was among the seven Philippine Eagles rescued last year.

Tagoyaman was rescued in October last year by Datu Tagoyaman Sinangkap in San Fernando, Bukidnon. The Philippine Eagle was found caught in a native trap made for deer and wild pigs. He was brought to the Philippine Eagle Center here for treatment and rehabilitation.

The PEF added that they recorded "the highest rescue rate recorded in the history of Philippine Eagle conservation."

THE Ministry of Environment, Natural Resources, and Energy (Menre) in the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (Barmm), together with the police, rescued a Philippine slow loris, locally known as "kokam," in the province of Tawi-Tawi.

Saido Espiliro, Community Environment, Natural Resources, and Energy officer of the first district of Tawi-Tawi, said the slow loris, in a malnourished condition, was rescued last week in Mandulan village, Bongao, the province's capital.

Espiliro said the slow loris was held captive for a few months by a resident of Mandulan village before it was rescued.

"The slow loris is now being monitored to determine if it has any diseases or if it is already capable of acclimatizing to its natural diet and habitat," Espiliro said.

He said the rescue also served as an opportunity for Menre personnel to conduct community awareness campaign about the ecological importance of native and endemic wildlife species in Tawi-Tawi, as well as the dangers of mishandling venomous species such as the Philippine slow loris.

Wildlife spotted in Sao Paulo river after removal of tons of trash

Recent sightings of fish, ducks and herons in a stretch of the infamously polluted Pinheiros river in São Paulo have raised hopes that wildlife in the city's main waterway may finally be returning.

Brazil's most populous city has an ambitious project to clean up Pinheiros by the end of 2022.

São Paulo Governor João Doria told Reuters that the clean-up of the Pinheiros river was the largest environmental project in the country in terms of investment, costing some 4 billion reais (\$735 million).

Doria said 30,000 tons of surface garbage had already been removed from the river.

Improved water oxygenation and a reduction in Pinheiros' foul odor remain long-term goals for now.

But Jose Bueno, an urban planner with the river conservation group Rios e Ruas, said new bike paths and cafes should help locals to feel closer to the river and embrace the agenda of keeping it clean.

"When I see fish in Pinheiros river, I see life. So we are not defending something invisible, something abstract. We are protecting what is alive," he said.

Fossils of giant cloud rats unearthed in N. Luzon caves

MANILA, Philippines — The fossils of three unique species of a giant cloud rodent were unearthed in the caves in Northern Luzon, a breakthrough study from the University of the Philippines (UP) showed.

According to an article posted in UP's website, the discovery was made by a team from UP, the Philippine National Museum, and the Field Museum of National History from the United States, after they studied fossil remains obtained from different caves in Northern Luzon.

All three species were believed to have lived simultaneously with the oldest human species known in the country, the Homo luzonensis. Two of the rodent species went extinct only around 2,000 years ago.

"These are three previously unknown species from an unusual group of rodents, locally known as buot or bugkun, and known in English as giant cloud rats, that live only in the Philippines," Dr. Janine Ochoa, the lead author of the journal which was published in the Journal of Mammalogy, said.

Ochoa is also an Assistant Professor of Anthropology at UP Diliman

Co-author Dr. Lawrence Heaney, who is from the Negaunee Curator of Mammals at the Field Museum of Natural History in Chicago says that the giant rodents weighed from one to two kilograms.

National Museum's zooarcheologist and co-author Marian Reyes said that the species are relatives of an ancient branch that arrived in the Philippines from mainland Asia around 14 million years ago.

"These giant rats and their relatives are members of an ancient branch on the tree of life that arrived from the Asian mainland about 14 million years ago and live only in the Philippines," Reyes said.

"The two that became extinct [more recently] were giants among rodents, both weighing about a kilogram. They were big enough that it might have been worthwhile to hunt and eat them," Heaney added.

Local terms were used in naming the three new species.

UP said that the largest of the fossil cloud rats was called Carpomys dakal, "named so because it is much larger compared to the known living species in the same genus, Carpomys melanurus and Carpomys phaeurus".

One of the fossil species was called Crateromys ballik — ballik, or small in the Dupaningan Agta dialect, because it is smaller.

The third species is named after Cagayan where most of the sites are located, hence, Batomys cagayanensis.

The fossils were discovered in Callao Cave in Cagayan and other nearby caves. Famously, Callao Cave was the site where Homo Iuzonensis was found, which shook claims on the origin of civilization in the country as this human species was believed to have existed 67,000 years ago.

The discovery contradicts the belief that the first settlers in the country were cavemen from Palawan, whose remains were dated to be around 30,000 to 40,000 years ago.

MANILA—Scientists from University of the Philippines (UP), the National Museum, and Field Museum of Natural History in the United States have discovered 3 species of giant cloud rats, locally known as buot or bugkun, that lived only in the Philippines until they went extinct some 2,000 years ago, according to their study published Friday.

"These are three previously unknown species from an unusual group of rodents, locally known as buot or bugkun, and known in English as giant cloud rats, that live only in the Philippines," said Dr. Janine Ochoa, anthropology assistant professor at UP Diliman and lead author of the <u>journal paper</u> published by the <u>Journal of Mammalogy</u>.

The researchers found fossil species of the rats in Callao Cave and several adjacent smaller caves in Peñablanca town, Cagayan, with some specimens located in the same deep layer where the Homo luzonensis was discovered in 2019.

Callao Cave has been the subject of excavations of the National Museum as early as 1979.

Co-author Marian Reyes, zooarchaeologist at the National Museum of the Philippines, said the giant rats were "members of an ancient branch on the tree of life that arrived from the Asian mainland about 14 million years ago and live only in the Philippines."

Buots dwelled in trees and ate leaves, buds, and seeds, according to Reyes. They also have "furry or fluffy tails and striking fur colors."

EXTINCTION

The study said that of the 3 rat species discovered, 2 went extinct only 2,000 years ago.

"Our records demonstrate that these giant rodents were able to survive the profound climatic changes from the Ice Age to current humid tropics that have impacted the earth over tens of millennia. The question is, what might have caused their final extinction?" said Philip Piper, a coauthor based at the Australian National University.

Co-author Dr. Armand Mijares of the UP Diliman Archaeological Studies Program, who headed the excavations of Callao, offered a clue.

"A clue might be in that the last recorded occurrence of two of the species is around 2,000 years ago or shortly after. This is after the first arrival of agricultural societies and the introduction of animals like domestic dogs, pigs, and macaque monkeys in Luzon... While we can't say for certain based on our current information, this implies that humans likely played some role in their extinction," Mijares said.

Added Dr. Lawrence Heaney, Negaunee Curator of Mammals at the Field Museum of Natural History in Chicago and another co-author of the study: "The two that became extinct [more recently] were giants among rodents, both weighing about a kilogram. They were big enough that it might have been worthwhile to hunt and eat them."

Heaney said the study showed how "Philippines has the greatest concentration of unique species of mammals of any country."

The clean-up was held in cooperation with the employees of the Cavite Gateway Terminal.


The PCG said most of the collected garbage were plastic, glass bottles, and tattered clothes.



Davao City generating 600-650 tons of waste per day

SINCE the start of the coronavirus disease (Covid-19) pandemic, Davao City generated around 600 tons of garbage per day, according to the Davao City Environment and Natural Resources Office (Cenro).

Cenro head Marivic Reyes said the city's average volume of collected garbage is around 600 to 650 tons per day since the Covid-19 pandemic hit the city in March 2020 until present.

For March 2021, the city recorded an average of 620 tons.

However, this does not include those collected by Ancillary Service Unit during its cleanup drive in canals.

The figure is slightly lower compared to the average 900 tons of garbage per day in 2019, during pre-pandemic.

Reyes said that despite the closure of large establishments, including hotels, the volume of waste collected remains high due to waste generated within households.

"Ma-question gani sa amo ang uban, ngano daghan man gihapon ang volume collected considering na ang ubang establishments, mga hotel, kay sarado. Ngano daghan gihapon ang madeclare nga collection? (We were questioned why we still collected a high volume of garbage despite the closure of most establishments, and hotels)," she said.

She added, "Considering nga daghan tao na sa balay-balay. Ang pamaagi karon kay dili na sila mukaon sa gawas, magpa-deliver nalang sila sa balay. (Considering that most of the people are at home, people would rather order food online)."

The official said household waste is a major contributor to the waste generated per day.

The gradual resumption of business establishment and offices had also contributed to the continuous increase of collected waste, she said.

Despite continuous information drive, Reyes admitted that the majority of Dabawenyos do not practice waste segregation, which is mandated under Republic Act 9003 or the Ecological Solid Waste Management Act of 2000.

"To be honest, malisudan ko, considering... Kinahanglan namo ang kooperasyon sa barangay (we are struggling in the implementation. That is why we need the cooperation of the barangays)," the Cenro head said, emphasizing the responsibility of the barangay officials to enforce the Solid Waste law.

Out of the 182 city barangays, only around 30 percent practice solid waste management and that have material recovery facilities (MRF).

The main function of the MRF is to maximize the quantity of recyclables processed, while producing materials that will generate the highest possible revenues in the market. MRFs can also process wastes into a feedstock for biological conversion through composting and anaerobic digestion.

As of Friday, April 23, only five barangays in the city have MRF. These are Barangays Hizon, Gumalang, Mahayag, Tacunan, and Catalunan Grande.

Reyes said it is important to practice solid waste management, including the non-throwing of biodegradables, as Cenro will only collect residuals.

Currently, the sanitary landfill in New Carmen, Tugbok has accumulated around 900,000 tons of garbage since 2016, exceeding its maximum capacity level of 700,000 to 800,000 tons.

Reyes said the city's landfill operation is still manageable despite exceeding its capacity. But she said there is already a need to expand the current landfill.

She said the City Government is working on expanding the New Carmen landfill.

With the passage of the "No to Single-Use Plastics Ordinance of 2021" in the 19th City Council early March this year, which regulates the sale, distribution, and use of single-use plastics in the city, Reyes said they will be intensifying the information campaign down to the barangays.

Reyes told SunStar Davao in a previous interview that the regulation on single-use plastic could help decongest the city's landfill.

OCTA warns vs. easing of curbs

The OCTA Research Group warned Friday against further easing COVID-19 restrictions in the National Capital Region even after coronavirus transmission showed signs of slowing down.

The warning was raised two days before the Metro Manila Council is set to meet Sunday to discuss its recommendation to the government's COVID-19 task force on the possible quarantine classification of the capital region for May, its chairman Parañaque City Mayor Edwin Olivarez told Teleradyo.

Metro Manila and the provinces of Bulacan, Cavite, Laguna and Rizal are under modified enhanced community guarantine – the second toughest lockdown level – until April 30.

Olivarez said they would meet with health experts to assess the COVID-19 situation in every local government unit.

Fr. Nicanor Austriaco, an OCTA Research fellow, said the reproduction number should be less than 1 for several weeks, adding a reproduction number of 1 or higher indicated sustained transmission of the virus.

Metro Manila's reproduction number is currently at 0.99.

"We urge the national government, as one possible benchmark for changing quarantine levels, is not to exit MECQ (modified enhanced community quarantine) until at least the R is less than 0.9 in a sustained manner," Austriaco said in a webinar organized by the Cardinal Santos Medical Center.

"As (OCTA fellow) Prof. Guido (David) pointed out, we're currently somewhat unstable and the reason why it's unstable is because not all the LGUs (local government units) are decreasing and so you always have the possibility that as some of the LGUs recover there will be an outbreak in one LGU that will spill over to the adjacent LGUs," he said.

The average daily cases in the NCR in the past seven days is 4,200 compared to 5,200 cases two weeks ago, said David.

"How fast we decongest our hospitals depends upon the sustained reproduction number that we are able to maintain in the next few weeks," Austriaco said.

Cost to economy

The month-long lockdown is expected to cost the economy about P300 billion in economic losses despite the partial lifting of restrictions to businesses and establishments in the last half of April 2021, the Department of Trade and Industry said.

Trade Secretary Ramon Lopez said the shifting of the restriction level to MECQ from ECQ might have tempered losses, but not enough to really get the economy up and about.

"The rough estimate of GDP loss during MECQ can be around P120 billion," he said, noting that during the strictest lockdown in the first half of April 2021, losses to the economy was estimated at 1 percent of the country's gross domestic product or about P180 billion.

Adding to the stressed economy was an equally stressed labor sector which was estimated to have lost as much as P83 billion in terms of lost wage values.

COVID updates

The Philippines logged on Friday 8,719 new cases of COVID-19, bringing the total to 979,740, the Department of Health reported.

Active cases stood at 102,799, which is 10.5 percent of the total. Of the total, 96.4 percent were mild; 1.3 percent were asymptomatic; 0.7 percent were critical; 0.9 percent were severe; and 0.58 percent were moderate.

The DOH also reported that 13,812 persons recently recovered, bringing the total recoveries to 860,412, which is 87.8 percent of the total.

The department recorded 159 new fatalities, bringing the death toll to 16,529, which is 1.69 percent of the total.

Deaths probed

The Food and Drug Administration said Friday 19 of the 24 deaths after getting inoculated were not related to the COVID-19 vaccines.

Five other cases are still pending investigation, the FDA added.

Ten of the fatalities got CoronaVac (Sinovac) while 14 received the AstraZeneca vaccine.

"Although it is sad that there are reported deaths, our evaluation shows that they are not related to vaccination," FDA Director General Eric Domingo said.

Over 1.3 million individuals have been vaccinated in the Philippines as of April 20.

Out of the 24 who died following their vaccination, 11 were found to have been infected with COVID-19, eight had cardiovascular or cerebrovascular illness and three reportedly suffered another infectious disease.



The reality of climate change can no longer be flatly denied when its adverse impacts continue to be staggeringly felt across all nations and societies. In the Philippines, one need not look far than the perennial super typhoons we have been experiencing in the past decade alone, which are clear manifestations of the consequences of global warming. However, a gap is emerging between the sustainability goals companies identify as relevant to their operations and their actual business goals. Just as the SDGs present themselves as a convenient checklist of aspects of sustainability, there is an ever-present danger of being confined to just that—compliance with the usual sustainability measures without genuine impact in reality.

More than just doing no harm to the environment, the bigger task is to ensure that future generations thrive with more abundant resources. Environmental conservation may not be enough as it is believed that we are consuming resources equivalent to 1.75 Earths every year. This is where regenerative development comes in to address the challenge of going beyond sustainability.

As the term implies, regenerative development seeks to ensure that resources are continuously made available and even made more abundant as much as possible for future generations. It may mean discovering new supply sources or innovating on processes and technologies. It may demand certain shifts in the way we have been used to doing things. Regenerative thinking asks how we can create more value in a unified and inclusive manner, ensuring that we elevate all stakeholders and improve all aspects of human living.

In marketing communications and public relations, regenerative development also helps achieve more genuine and impactful reputation management. It serves as a better tool in achieving brand authenticity and avoiding the ever-present danger of "greenwashing." Sustainability should precisely be incorporated in the way a company operates and not just in what it offers, and a regenerative model helps ensure that an organization's vision is aligned with its mission—its day-to-day tasks and basic operations.

Regenerative development also inspires a more proactive stance in terms of producing more positive outcomes. More than just reporting numbers as factor of avoidance or prudent use, it challenges companies to redefine value in terms of creation and innovation. It demands a more optimistic mindset of ensuring abundance rather than a pessimistic stance of scarcity and competition.

Last not but least, as an inclusive mindset, regenerative development naturally leads to collaborations and partnerships. As companies are forced to take a hard look at the individuals, communities and sectors that it affects, these stakeholders are no longer nameless faces but active participants in creating shared value. This is one way how a regenerative mindset can be ingrained in business operations so that we do not fall prey to lip service or "greenwashing." ###

The Asian Development Bank (ADB) and The Nature Conservancy (TNC) have inked a partnership for nature-positive investments, environmental sustainability, and action on climate change throughout Asia and the Pacific.

The partnership will focus on biodiversity and ecosystem protection and restoration; nature-based solutions and sustainable infrastructure; and coastal resilience.

ADB and TNC will also cooperate on finance for oceans, freshwater, and biodiversity; sustainable urban planning and development; and gender integration and poverty reduction in nature conservation.

"The coronavirus disease pandemic [Covid-19] has been a wake-up call on the importance of protecting ecosystems and biodiversity to protect humanity. It's vital that we make the recovery from Covid-19 a green and inclusive recovery," ADB Vice-President for Knowledge Management and Sustainable Development Bambang Susantono said.

"We must take actions that address the root causes of the pandemic and avoid future infectious zoonotic disease outbreaks, promote good health, create jobs that are fit for the future, and support women's empowerment and economic well-being through nature-positive investments," he added.

ADB and TNC have agreed to undertake a two-year work plan where they will pilot initiatives aimed at sustainable management of coastal ecosystems and catalyzing investment in development planning tools and digital technologies, which seek improve ecosystem management.

This work plan will contribute to ADB's Action Plan for Healthy Oceans and Sustainable Blue Economies.

Further, ADB and TNC will cooperate on technical assistance for coral reef restoration through an innovative financing and insurance initiative.

The partnership will also yield knowledge products and activities that will integrate gender equity in promoting nature preservation and climate action.

"The challenges of the Covid-19 pandemic have also revealed the power and importance of collaboration to address complex issues with the urgency they require," said TNC Chief Executive Officer Jennifer Morris.

WASHINGTON: The leaders of Russia and China put aside their raw-worded disputes with U.S. President Joe Biden on Thursday long enough to pledge international cooperation on cutting climate-wrecking coal and petroleum emissions in a livestreamed summit showcasing America's return to the fight against global warming.


Neither Vladimir Putin nor Xi Jinping immediately followed the United States and some of its developed allies in making specific new pledges to reduce damaging fossil fuel pollution during the first day of the two-day U.S.-hosted summit. But climate advocates hoped the high-profile — if glitch-ridden — virtual gathering would kickstart new action by major polluters, paving the way for a November U.N. meeting in Glasgow critical to drastically slowing climate change over the coming decade.

The entire world faces "a moment of peril" but also "a moment of opportunity," Biden declared, speaking from a TV-style chrome-blue set for the virtual summit of 40 world leaders. Participants appeared one after the other onscreen for what appeared to be a mix of live and recorded addresses.





"The signs are unmistakable," Biden said. "The science is undeniable. The cost of inaction keeps mounting."

Biden's new U.S. commitment, timed to the summit, would cut America's fossil fuel emissions as much as 52% by 2030. It comes after four years of international withdrawal from the issue under President Donald Trump, who mocked the science of climate change and pulled the U.S. out of the landmark 2015 Paris climate accord.

Biden's administration this week is sketching out a vision of a prosperous, clean-energy United States where factories churn out cutting-edge batteries and electric cars for export, line workers re-lay an efficient national electrical grid and crews cap abandoned oil and gas rigs and coal mines.

But Senate Republican leader Mitch McConnell dismissed the administration's plans as costly and ineffective.

UN chief wants US climate pledges, engagement in negotiations

"This is quite the one-two punch," McConnell said in a Senate speech Thursday. "Toothless requests of our foreign adversaries ... and maximum pain for American citizens."

At the summit, Japan announced its own new 46% emissions reduction target and South Korea said it would stop public financing of new coal-fired power plants, potentially an important step toward persuading China and other coal-reliant nations to curb building and funding of new ones as well.

Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, one of the leaders shown watching summit proceedings in the coronavirus pandemic's familiar Brady Bunch-style multibox conference screen, said his nation would up its fossil fuel pollution cuts from 30% to at least 40%.

Travel precautions under the pandemic compelled the summit to play out on livestream, limiting opportunities for spontaneous interaction and negotiation. Its opening hours were sometimes marked by electronic echoes, random beeps and off-screen voices.

But the summit also marshaled an impressive display of the world's most powerful leaders speaking on the single issue of climate change.

China's Xi, whose country is the world's biggest emissions culprit, followed by the United States, spoke first among the other global figures. He made no reference to disputes over territorial claims, trade and other matters that had made it uncertain until Wednesday that he would even take part in the U.S. summit. And he said China would work with America in cutting emissions.

"To protect the environment is to protect productivity, and to boost the environment is to boost productivity. It's as simple as that," Xi said.





Putin and his government have been irate over Biden's characterization of him as a "killer" for Russia's aggressive moves against its opponents, and he is under pressure this week over the declining health of jailed opposition figure Alexei Navalny. But he made no mention of those disputes in his own climate remarks.

"Russia is genuinely interested in galvanizing international cooperation so as to look further for effective solutions to climate change as well as to all other vital challenges," Putin said. Russia by some measures is the world's fourth-biggest emitter of climate-damaging fossil fuel fumes.

Climate efforts in recent years have proved a forum where even rival world leaders want to be seen as putting aside disputes to serve as international statesmen and women, even though the cumulative output of fossil fuel emissions is still hurtling the Earth toward disastrous temperature rises.

The pandemic made gathering world leaders for the climate summit too risky. So Biden's staff built a small set in the East Room that looked like it was taken from a daytime talk show.

Biden and Vice President Kamala Harris joined Secretary of State Antony Blinken and White House climate envoy John Kerry at a horseshoe-shaped table set up around a giant potted plant to watch fellow leaders' speeches.

The format meant a cavalcade of short speeches by world leaders, some scripted, some not. "This is not bunny-hugging," British Prime Minister Boris Johnson said of the climate efforts. "This is about growth and jobs."

The Biden administration's pledge would require by far the most ambitious U.S. climate effort ever, nearly doubling the reductions that the Obama administration had committed to in the Paris climate accord.

German Chancellor Angela Merkel was one of many allies welcoming the U.S. return after Trump...

"I'm delighted to see that the United States is back, is back to work together with us in climate politics," Merkel declared in her virtual appearance. "Because there can be no doubt about the world needing your contribution if we really want to fulfill our ambitious goals."

Pope Francis contributed a video from the Vatican, saying, "I wish you success in this beautiful decision to meet, walk together going forward and I am with you all the way."

The new urgency comes as scientists say that climate change caused by coal plants, car engines and other fossil fuel use is worsening droughts, floods, hurricanes, wildfires and other disasters and that humans are running out of time to stave off catastrophic extremes of global warming.





Leaders of smaller states and island nations buffeted by rising seas and worsening hurricanes appealed for aid and fast emissions cuts from world powers.

"We are the least contributors to greenhouse gas emissions, but the most affected by climate change," said Gaston Alfonso Browne, prime minister of Antigua and Barbuda. He called for debt relief and more international assistance to recover from storms and the pandemic to prevent a flow of climate refugees. His people he said, are "teetering on the edge of despair."

Longtime climate policy experts, no strangers to climate summits with solemn pledges, watched some speeches with skepticism. After Brazil's President Jair Bolsonaro promised an end to clearcutting in the Amazon, Dan Wilkinson of Human Rights Watch's environmental programs noted, "It is going to be hard for anyone to take it seriously until they actually start taking steps."

EU officials urge cooperation vs. climate change

ANKARA – European Union (EU) officials have called for joint commitment and action across the world to reduce emissions by 2030 in the fight against climate change.

"Today we must strengthen global unity around ambitious new targets," European Commission chief Ursula von der Leyen told the virtual Leaders Summit on Climate on Thursday hosted by US President Joe Biden, adding that five years had passed since the Paris agreement was signed.

Warning that the world was getting "dangerously" close to 1.5 C of global warming, von der Leyen said the time is ripe for fresh climate action because of this.

She underlined that in the coming COP26 meeting in Glasgow, the world must show that it understands that the preceding Paris Agreement "is humanities' life insurance."

"Science tells us it is not too late yet but we must hurry up," she added.

Touching on efforts to tackle the negative effects of climate change, von der Leyen cited the European Green New Deal and the continent's first Climate Law that passed just recently, as well as the block's goals on dealing a significant dent in emissions.





EU officials urge cooperation vs. climate change

Von der Leyen said EU countries had agreed by 2030 to reduce their greenhouse gas emissions to 55 percent below their 1990 level.

"Climate action is also a massive opportunity for economies, it creates new markets and mobilizes new investments, transforming industries and it unleashes innovation for a healthier and more prosperous future," she added.

'We are ready to take responsibility'

Charles Michel, the president of the EU Council, said the world is currently facing a great challenge in the face of climate change and since fossil fuel use is not sustainable, humanity must adapt itself to a new situation.

"In December 2019, leaders committed to climate neutrality by 2050 and we were the first major economy to take such a bold decision," Michel said.

He said they had decided to allocate at least €100 billion (USD 120 billion) annually for "climate finance", adding they expected developed countries to increase their contributions.

As the EU wants to introduce a carbon regulation mechanism at its borders, Michel said this was needed for competition on equal terms and must comply with the rules of the World Trade Organization.

He added that with the intention of being a strong and loyal partner, the bloc is prepared to join forces with all global partners and take responsibility for the well-being of humanity and the planet. (Anadolu)

Climate justice: Toward a sustainable future

After the historic Paris Agreement on climate change entered into force in November 2016 when 55 parties accounting for at least 55 percent of global greenhouse gases (GHG) had ratified it, notable progress has been made.

According to the World Resources Institute, 189 countries have ratified or joined the Agreement, representing 81 percent of GHG. This figure quickly shot up to 93 percent when President Joe Biden formally signified the United States' participation when he assumed office.

Despite these written commitments, 2019 was the <u>second warmest year on record</u> and the end of the warmest decade (2010- 2019) ever recorded. Carbon dioxide (CO2) levels and other <u>greenhouse gases in the atmosphere</u> rose to new records in 2019.

According to a recent United Nations report: "Although greenhouse gas emissions are projected to drop about six percent in 2020 due to travel bans and economic slowdowns resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic, this improvement is only temporary. Climate change is not on pause. Once the global economy begins to recover from the pandemic, emissions are expected to return to higher levels."

As the world marked Earth Day 2021, attention was focused on the top 10 GHG emitters, considering that the top three – China, the United States, and the European Union countries combined, contribute 41.5 percent of total global emissions, while the bottom 100 countries – including the Philippines – for a measly 3.6 percent. The other countries in the top ten are India, Russia, Japan, Brazil, Indonesia, and Iran and Canada.

Climate justice: Toward a sustainable future

The first round of preliminary GHG reduction commitments that were unveiled in 2015 would have cumulatively resulted in a global temperature that was at least 3 degrees Celsius hotter, a stark contrast to the avowed goal of the Paris Agreement signatories to cap global warming below 2 degrees Celsius.

President Xi Jin Ping declared last year at the UN General Assembly that China intends to achieve net zero emissions by 2060; Beijing has not officially announced is renewed national defined contribution (NDC).

All eyes are on the virtual World Climate Summit convened by President Biden where the new US commitment is expected to be known. Special ambassador on climate change John Kerry visited China recently to conduct negotiations on climate cooperation.

Climate justice is the core issue, considering that the burden of global warming is borne disproportionately by poorer countries that are more vulnerable to natural disasters. UN Secretary General Antonio Guterres points out: "As is always the case, the poor and vulnerable are the first to suffer and the worst hit."

Another key dimension is youth involvement. Even schoolchildren are now participating in marches, strikes and protests – by hundreds of thousands – to call out the "intergenerational injustice of climate change."

AmBisyon 2040, the Philippines' long-term national development plan mirrors the country's commitment to climate-related Sustainable Development Goals: Livable cities and disaster-resilient communities.

Climate justice is the key to assuring a sustainable environment for future generations.
