

<u>Cimatu appeals for strict enforcement of Water Code, Iocal ordinances within Manila Bay region</u>

The DENR chief remains hopeful that the Manila Bay rehabilitation will be finished in six or seven years but the cleanup in the portion of Metro Manila can be accomplished by the end of 2021, or in the remaining six months of 2022.

Environment and Natural Resources Secretary Roy Cimatu called on local government officials within the Manila Bay region to ensure the proper implementation of the Philippine Water Code and local policies and ordinances.

Cimatu made the statement after he came upon fish cages and makeshift houses built on the municipal waters of Cavite, which is part of the Manila Bay, during a visit to the province on July 16.

"The municipal waters are being managed by the mayor. If there are fish cages, these should have permits. Without a permit from the mayor, these are unauthorized," Cimatu said.

"If these fish cages are regulated, it will avoid bamboo poles from being swept to the baywalk in Manila especially during the habagat or southwest monsoon, and during the typhoon season," he added.

DENR said bamboo poles are among the trash that were washed up along Manila Bay's shoreline in the past few days, after Metro Manila was hit by thunderstorms.

Cimatu said the high coliform level in the municipal waters can also be traced to the makeshift houses built next to the fish cages.

"The caretakers of the fish pens live there, thus it is possible that because of inadequate or non-availability of sanitation facilities, coliform level has exceeded the standard value," Cimatu said.

"While we would like to encourage their livelihood, it should not be at the expense of destroying the environment," he added.

Cimatu also emphasized that the local chief executives should abide by Republic Act 9275 or the Philippine Clean Water Act of 2004 and RA 9003 or the Ecological Solid Waste Management Act of 2000, or face suspension.

"At least now, many LGUs are complying. Still, the government can file cases if needed," he said.

The DENR chief remains hopeful that the Manila Bay rehabilitation will be finished in six or seven years but the cleanup in the portion of Metro Manila can be accomplished by the end of 2021 or in the remaining six months of the Duterte administration in 2022.

"We also have to deal with the informal settlers. They have to be resettled otherwise we cannot completely clean Manila Bay," he added.

The Manila Bay region consists of four coastal provinces, namely Bataan, Bulacan, Cavite, and Pampanga.

"What we cannot finish will be there in the plan. That is what the next administration, regardless of affiliation, must continue because it is in the continuing mandamus ordered by the Supreme Court," Cimatu said.

Dolomite beach intact despite monsoon rains, says Cimatu

Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) Secretary Roy Cimatu gave this assurance to the public Monday, July 26 following days worth of heavy rains that allegedly caused the white-colored dolomite sand to be flushed into the bay.

- "The [DENR] assures the public that after the assessment of the beach nourishment project in Manila Bay this morning (Monday), the dolomite area as well as the geotubes and geotextiles installed as geo interventions for the project are all intact," Cimatu said in a statement.
- "The dolomite sand has not been washed out and the dolomite pebbles were only pushed to the perimeter of the beach area," he added.

Metro Manila was battered by rains resulting from the southwest monsoon over the weekend. Then, pictures and videos of the garbage-littered shoreline of Manila Bay began to pop up in social media.

This caused worries as to the state of the <u>controversial dolomite beach</u>, which is a key facet of the P389-million Manila Bay Rehabilitation Progam.

"While the normal high tide level is 1.3 meters, it rose to 1.5 to 1.6 meters because of the southwest monsoon that started last week and into the weekend," noted Cimatu.

"As a result, a huge amount of trash was swept by the waves which accumulated in the area. These were traced to have come from the Pasig River and Cavite and from all the tributaries that flow to the bay," he said.

He did that plastic cups, wrappers, and styropor were among the trash collected from the shoreline. A huge number of bamboo poles from fish pens, fish cages, and baklads/sapras were also washed ashore.

"In view of this, I have ordered Region 4A Executive Director Nilo Tamoria to conduct an inventory of all the fish pens, fish cages, baklads/sapras in Cavite, and to identify those with permits to operate. Legitimate operators will be required to repair their damaged fish pens and cages. On the other hand, those with no permits will be immediately demolished," Cimatu said.

"Even prior to the start of the habagat or southwest monsoon, I have already directed the Regional Executive Directors of the National Capital Region, and Regions 3 and 4A to strictly implement proper solid waste management especially in their areas of jurisdiction," he added.

The Metropolitan Manila Development Authority (MMDA) carried out a <u>cleanup</u> operation at the bay on Monday morning.

Manila Bay dolomite beach intact despite heavy rains

MANILA – Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) Secretary Roy Cimatu on Monday assured the dolomite-laced beach along Manila Bay's Baywalk area remains intact despite high tide and piles of trash at the height of the southwest monsoon or "habagat".

"The dolomite sand has not been washed out and the dolomite pebbles were only pushed to the perimeter of the beach area," Cimatu said in a statement, citing results of DENR's latest assessment.

Geotubes and geotextiles installed in the area are not damaged, he added.

Cimatu ordered DENR Region 4-A Regional Executive Dir. Nilo Tamoria to inventory all fish pens, fish cages and *baklad/sapra* installations in Cavite province and identify which of these have permits to operate, noting many bamboo poles washed ashore during "*habagat*" and accumulated in the dolomite beach.

He said legitimate operators must repair respective damaged fish pens and cages.

"On the other hand, those with no permits will be immediately demolished," he said.

Bamboo poles are commonly used in making fish pens and cages.

DENR has been drawing criticism for the dolomite beach as some people said money for this project could have been used instead in efforts to address the coronavirus disease 2019 (Covid-19) pandemic.

It said the project is among activities for Manila Bay's rehabilitation which aims to make this water body fit again for contact recreation as Supreme Court ordered in 2008.

Cimatu noted as "habagat" surged, high tide rose from the normal 1.3 meters to between 1.5 meters and 1.6 meters.

"As a result, a huge amount of trash was swept by the waves which accumulated in the area," he said.

He called on the public to dispose trash properly, noting plastic cups, wrappers and styrofoam from Cavite and Manila Bay's tributaries also washed ashore and ended up in the dolomite beach.

"We at DENR believe that behavioral change is the key and ultimate solution to address the issue of solid waste management in the country," he said.

Cimatu thanked all volunteers as well as river and "estero" rangers who are helping rehabilitate Manila Bay by cleaning the Baywalk area and Baseco Beach.

Manila Bay borders the western Luzon-lying portions of Regions 4-A and 3, as well as Metro Manila. (*PNA*)

DENR leads planting of 1K mangrove species in observance of National Disaster Resilience Month

QUEZON CITY -- The Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) on Saturday, July 17, spearheaded the planting of some 1,000 mangrove trees in Macabebe, Pampanga to mark this year's observance of the National Disaster Resilience Month.

Through the Strategic Communication and Initiatives Service (SCIS), the DENR led a total of 130 participants from Lions Clubs International District 301-D2, National Bicycle Organization, Easy Swim Philippine Life Savings, Inc., Manila Standard, and Barangay Consuelo, in the planting of two variants of Philippine Rhizophora—a genus of tropical mangrove trees.

The Philippine Rhizophora species used in the planting activity consisted of bakauan-lalaki (Rhizophora apiculata Blume) and bakauan-babae (Rhizophora mucronata Lamarck).

DENR Undersecretary for Solid Waste Management and Local Government Units Concerns Benny D. Antiporda, also the Supervising Undersecretary for SCIS, encouraged the participants "to avoid the word compliance" as he reminded them "to serve without expecting anything in return."

"The word 'compliance' is only for people who are expecting something in return after what they have done," Antiporda said.

He emphasized that Filipinos "need not wait for the government to solve the problem, but to act on the problem and save the next generation."

"If we don't act on it, five years later might be too late for the next generation," he said.





DENR leads planting of 1K mangrove species in observance of National Disaster Resilience Month

According to Antiporda, planting mangrove trees in Macabebe town is "relevant to the observance of the National Disaster Resilience Month because mangrove trees help towns and provinces to be resilient from natural disasters."

Pampanga Provincial Environment and Natural Resources Officer Laudemir Salac said the mangrove planting site that was chosen is "the epicenter of the Manila Bay Rehabilitation Program in Region 3."

"With the daily cleanup activities that we conducted in this area, we were able to bring down the coliform level from 14,000 to 14 most probable number (MPN) per 100 milliliters," Salac said.

The standard coliform level for coastal waters to be classified as Class SB is 100 MPN/100 ml, which means it is suitable for swimming, skin diving, and other recreational activities.

The National Disaster Resilience Month is being observed every July of each year by virtue of Executive Order 29 signed in 2017 to emphasize the importance of disaster risk reduction management and the need to understand disaster risk, enhancing community disaster preparedness, strengthening risk governance, and investing in disaster risk reduction.

With the theme, "Tamang Pamamahala't Kahandaan, Kaalaman at Pagtutulungan sa Sakuna at Pandemya'y Kalasag ng Bayan," this year's celebration aims to emphasize the important role of disaster risk governance and the collaboration of all Filipinos to overcome the challenges of this pandemic and to build a green and resilient normal. DENR taps IPs to maintain Chico River Basin under revenue-sharing scheme

The Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) has pledged to provide compensation to Indigenous Peoples (IP) who maintain the forests of the Chico River Basin.

The compensation is part of a revenue-sharing scheme to be implemented in the watershed and agro-forestry management in Cordillera, which will ensure water replenishment for the Chico River Pump Irritation Project.

A total of 7,530 hectares of farmland depend on the Chico River Pump Irrigation Project for sustainable water supply.

"The revenue will make sure a PO [people's organization] member gets his share from whatever activity he contributes, such as growing seedlings. The government also wants to earn from its management of the natural resource," Marilyn Malecdan, regional project coordinator of the Chico River project said in a news statement.

The Cordillera provinces—Mt. Province, Kalinga, Apayao, Ifugao— will host the Chico River Pump Irrigation Project touted to be one of the flagship projects of the Duterte administration.

It was originally planned to be completed by end of 2021 or early 2022 but its implementation was stalled by the Covid-19 disease pandemic that compelled community quarantines across the country.

It is estimated to irrigate farms in Tuao and Piat in Cagayan , and 1,170 hectares in Pinukpuk, Kalinga. To be benefited are an estimated 4,350 families.

The watershed management project of DENR includes a 5,056-hectare revenue-earning agroforestry sites (grown with fruit-bearing trees and vegetables).

It was approved in 2012 and was originally conceived to preserve and conserve the Upper Chico River Basin that straddles through Mt. Province, Kalinga, Apayao, and Ifugao provinces.

The project, under the Integrated Resources Environmental Management Program (INREMP), is in its final year of completion.

A sustainability plan with a revenue-sharing scheme is now being mapped to ensure the project's success.

"Chico River Basin has vast potentials for development. It has potential for electric power, irrigation, domestic purposes, and recreation. The river harnesses the major irrigation systems to water its vast rice lands. As a result, Kalinga has been promoted as a rice granary of the region," Engr. Ralph C. Pablo, INREMP-CAR (Cordillera Administrative Region) project director said for his part.

While environmental protection is the primary aim, INREMP has successfully generated livelihood for the upland residents.

Through collaboration with other agencies like the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI) and Department of Agriculture (DA), the PO partners are able to process and market their coffee. The DENR project provided them with coffee dehullers, roasters, grinders, and other packaging tools.

Farmers in the area are also producing muscovado sugar, wine from various fruits such as Bignay, and rice and corn. The provision of rice mills, hand tractors, and multi-purpose pavement for drying products made the lives of farmers in far-flung communities of the Cordillera easier.

"Our rural infrastructure projects have greatly helped them in transporting their products. With our project we're able to help people in the far-flung areas that used to be inaccessible [due to mountain barriers]," she said.

INREMP's rural infrastructure support, in partnership also with the DA, includes rehabilitated access roads of 42.32 kilometers and a foot trail of 10,000 meters.

The infrastructure support helped the natives of Cordillera to cut hauling costs and increase the productivity of the lands. Also, women were freed from the burden of fetching water from far communal water sources.

INREMP has so far established 3,701 hectares of reforestation area (deforested but replanted) and 5,056 hectares of agroforestry (vegetable and fruit crops with dipterocarp trees planted).

Tree species planted include narra, Benguet pine, and dipterocarp trees (broad-leafed, lowland tropical trees) such as white lauan.

It has also established a total of 6,533 hectares of assisted natural regeneration area—naturally growing young trees (regenerants) that are cleaned and trimmed. The areas are supported to grow trees with ring weeding, thinning to avoid crowding, fertilizer application, and planting of open spaces.

A separate 955 hectares of commercial tree plantation (CTP) has been grown by the IPs using fast-growing tree species such as Benguet pine, Gmelina, and Mahogany (harvestable from eight to 20 years).

An area called conservation farming—where contouring and other agroforestry techniques are used to eliminate soil erosion in sloping areas—now total to 690 hectares.

With the CTP, the IPs are able to generate construction materials for their own needs such as for housing, and do not have to illegally cut trees.

"Mt. Province has become the home to high-value crops yielding legumes/beans, carrots, root crops, and other cash crops. White water rafting along the Chico River is another potential attracting local as well as foreign tourists. There are still untapped prospects that include gold, sulfur, copper, gypsum, clay and gravel, and other quarry resources," said Pablo.

INREMP is co-financed by the Asian Development Bank, allocating a restructured loan amount of \$57 million for INREMP. INREMP is receiving a grant of \$2.5 million from the Global Environment Facility.

Present during the event were representatives from the Metropolitan Manila Development Authority, Department of Public Services-Manila, Career Executive Service Board, and DENR personnel from the NCR-WFO, Manila Bay Coordinating Office (MBCO), and Task Force Tayo ang Kalikasan.

The event is just one of the thanksgiving activities lined up by the DENR for its partners involved in the rehabilitation of Manila Bay.

"The arduous task to bring back the glory of Manila Bay is a collective effort, and I'm truly grateful to our partners for remaining steadfast in our work. This rehabilitation will not only be beneficial to us but for the next generations," Cimatu said.

Data from the MBCO revealed that a total of 14,701.60 cubic meters of solid waste have been collected by DENR and MMDA from January to March 2021.

The retrieval of garbage was done through various cleanup activities in Manila Bay and connecting waterways and rivers with the use of trash traps, trash boats, and collection done by volunteers and estero rangers.

In preparation for the southwest monsoon or "habagat" season in the country, DENR-NCR Regional Executive Director Jacqueline A. Caancan has deployed 50 estero rangers in the Manila Baywalk area and 10 marshals.

They have so far retrieved 5,131 sacks of solid waste and 408 wood and bamboo poles from June 23 to July 14.

A total of 587 estero rangers are also currently deployed by the DENR-NCR WFO in the cities of Manila, San Juan, Pasay, Mandaluyong, and Makati.

Based on the DENR's monitoring, eight out of the nine monitoring stations along the Manila Baywalk have registered lower fecal coliform levels.

The most significant decrease was noted in Padre Faura Station with a fecal coliform level of 7.61 million in 2019 to 3,300 in March 2021. (SC)

DENR deploys estero rangers

MANILA, Philippines — The Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) has deployed over 500 estero rangers in the metropolis, including Manila's Baywalk, to help prevent floods during the rainy season.

DENR National Capital Region executive director Jacqueline Caancan said a total of 587 rangers were deployed in the cities of Manila, Makati, Mandaluyong, Pasay and San Juan.

Of the number, 50 DENR rangers and 10 marshals were assigned in Manila's Baywalk.

"They have collected from Manila Bay 5,131 sacks of waste and 408 wood and bamboo poles from June 23 to July 14," Caancan said.

The rangers were tasked by the DENR to help local government units address the waste disposal problem and improve garbage collection in Manila Bay.

Caancan said eight out of the nine monitoring stations along the bay have registered lower fecal coliform levels.

"The most significant decrease was noted in Padre Faura station, with fecal coliform level of 7.61 million in 2019 down to 3,300 last March," Caancan said.

Data from the Manila Bay Coordinating Office showed that a total of 14,701.60 cubic meters of solid waste have been collected by the DENR and Metropolitan Manila Development Authority from January to March this year.

With the help of volunteers, the DENR conducted cleanup in Manila Bay as well as connecting waterways and rivers with the use of trash traps and boats.

The DENR thanked its partners from the government sector, civic organizations and the department's field offices for their support in rehabilitating Manila Bay.

"The arduous task to bring back the glory of Manila Bay is a collective effort," Environment Secretary Roy Cimatu said.

President Duterte, in his final State of the Nation Address yesterday, ordered the DENR to continue the bay rehabilitation.

The Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) is banking on the deployment of "estero rangers" to keep Manila Bay clean and free of garbage.

The rangers are currently deployed by the DENR-National Capital Region West Field Office (NCR-WFO) in the cities of Manila, San Juan, Pasay, Mandaluyong, and Makati.

DENR, the lead agency tasked to lead the rehabilitation of Manila Bay, steps up the campaign amid heavy downpour in most parts of Luzon in recent days that saw thrash being wiped atop the dolomite beach along Baywalk in Roxas Boulevard on Saturday and Sunday.

To recognize their effort, the DENR recently held a thanksgiving event for the rangers, as well as partners from the government sector, civil society and DENR field offices for their continuous support to rehabilitate Manila Bay.

The appreciation event held last July 14 was initiated by Secretary Roy A. Cimatu, citing the invaluable contributions of "environmental frontliners" of the Manila Bay rehabilitation project.

"I commend all the estero rangers and partners for your unwavering sacrifices and hard work to clean up Manila Bay. I truly appreciate your efforts which resulted in the success of our program," Cimatu said in a news statement.

A total of 73 estero rangers of the NCR-WFO attended the event and cleanup activity at the beach area of the Manila Baywalk.

The activity was organized by the DENR-Strategic Communication and Initiatives Service led by Undersecretary for Solid Waste Management and Local Government Units Concerns Undersecretary Benny D. Antiporda.

MMDA CONDUCTS CLEANUP OPERATIONS IN MANILA BAY

Metropolitan Manila Development Authority (MMDA) Chairman Atty. Benhur Abalos personally supervised the agency's cleanup operations at Manila Bay earlier today, as influx of trash was swept into the bay due to heavy rains in the past days brought by southwest monsoon.

At least 70 personnel from MMDA Metro Parkways Clearing Group were deployed to clean Manila Bay.

According to Abalos, two truckloads of garbage were collected in the area yesterday, or about 40 cubic meters.

Among the trash seen from bay's shoreline were plastic bottles, pieces of styrofoam and other debris.

"Plastics are the most common trash found in Manila Bay. Undisputedly, it negatively affects the environment," Abalos pointed out.

Moreover, Abalos appealed to the public to avoid throwing discards anywhere.

"Let us start a move right now. Behavioral change among Filipinos is key to address plastic waste problem in Manila Bay. Stop the habit of indiscriminate dumping not only in Manila Bay, but also on different waterways in the metropolis," Abalos said.

The MMDA chief also expressed gratefulness to the personnel of Department of Environment and Natural Resources and City Government of Manila for their cleanup initiatives in Manila Bay.

Meanwhile, Abalos said he have sought the assistance of the Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG), asking help from the policemen to arrest individuals who will throw garbage in Manila Bay.

"I've already talked to DILG Secretary Eduardo Año on this matter. Those apprehended would be obliged to clean Manila Bay," Abalos stressed.

'DISHEARTENING' | Manila Bay dolomite beach filled with trash anew as monsoon rains hit

(July 26, 2021) – Barely a week since its reopening, the multi-million-peso dolomite sand beach in Manila Bay is now filled with garbage due to the heavy monsoon rains and strong winds that hit the capital and other parts of Luzon for days.

Dozens of workers from the local government unit (LGU) of Manila and the Metro Manila Development Authority (MMDA) collected 13.4 tons of trash on Sunday alone, which they described as "disheartening," in a bid to salvage anew the P28-million controversial project.

MMDA chairman Benhur Abalos encouraged the public to "change their mindset" to lessen waste production that can damage rivers and other bodies of water.

"Kung malinis lahat ito, there should really come a time na mag-enjoy tayo rito (sa Manila Bay)," said Abalos. "Pero as long as ganito ito, sana 'wag naman, magtulungan na lang tayo rito."

Abalos lamented the large volume of styrofoam and single-use plastics they retrieved. But he said they will send these materials to recycling facilities to make them useful.

Violators of environment regulations should also be obliged to render at least five hours of community service to mobilize more people in cleaning up Manila Bay instead of paying fines or jail time, Abalos suggested.

It was not the first time that the much-maligned dolomite sand beach was affected by natural occurrences. Last October, black sand from the sea covered a large portion of the area. It also gets quickly littered with garbage during inclement weather.

Environmental groups have repeatedly called on the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) to cancel it because of dangerous impacts on nature and people's health.

Experts from the <u>University of the Philippines</u> said dolomite sand can negatively affect marine life and further pollute the waters, contrary to its purpose of supposedly improving the conditions of Manila Bay. Health officials have also raised the possibility of respiratory problems when the material is inhaled.

But DENR easily brushed these off, even providing an additional P265 million for the second phase of the controversial project. It was added on top of the P389 million beautification plan of the entire Manila Bay.

Cause-oriented groups have continued to convince the government to rethink the dolomite beach sand given its drastic impact on the environment. Gloria Estenzo Ramos of Oceana Philippines said the administration should focus on more pressing matters instead of wasting taxpayers' money.

"Many Filipinos are still without a vaccine (against COVID-19) and here comes the government trying to beautify Manila Bay by using crushed dolomite," said Ramos last May. "It's beautification against public emergency. We're basically wasting money."

Presidential spokesperson Harry Roque said it is good for mental health.

Duterte: Dolomite beach to be replenished until better solution found

MANILA, Philippines — President Rodrigo Duterte said Monday that the artificial white sand beach made from crushed dolomite rocks needs regular replenishment until the government thinks of a better solution to Manila Bay's environmental problems.

In his final State of the Nation Address, Duterte called on the Department of Environment and Natural Resources to sustain efforts in restoring the heavily polluted Manila Bay "to its former glory."

The chief executive also mentioned the use of artificial sand and stressed the need to replenish it when it gets washed out.

- "Sometimes it disappears because of the waves. Every now and then, we still have to replenish because we cannot change the nature of our shores. It is how it is. It is not a permanent fixture there," Duterte said.
- "The only way to do it is to replenish it until we can think of a good alternative of how we can process the whole things back to its normal state," he added.

Last year, the DENR undertook a beach nourishment project using crushed dolomite rocks to help rehabilitate and protect coastal resources as well as to prevent erosion.

The estimated cost of the project was P389 million, around P28 million of which was allotted for the overlaying of the fake white sand on a stretch of Manila Bay's shoreline.

'Expensive, temporary effort'

The use of pulverized dolomite rocks has been met with criticism, with environmental groups and scientists saying the project is an expensive and temporary effort that will not address the bay's environmental problems.

They said the solutions to the degradation of Manila Bay include addressing the issue of solid waste management, and restoring mangrove forests and seagrass meadows.

In a statement Monday, the DENR said the dolomite area as well the geotubes and geotextiles installed as geo interventions for the project are "intact."

"The dolomite area has not been washed out and the dolomite pebbles were only pushed to the perimeter of the beach," Environment Secretary Roy Cimatu said.

No mention of climate action

Duterte also talked about some wins in the government's effort to rehabilitate Manila Bay such as the move to close down hundreds of open dump sites near the area and the reduction of the bay's fecal coliform level.

He also hoped that "our next leaders and future generation will not squander our natural resources and fight for the integrity of our environment in a manner fiercer and more effective than my administration has ever done."

But in a SONA that lasted for almost three hours, the longest since 1986, the chief executive made no mention of other concrete actions to protect the environment and mitigate the impacts of climate change.

DENR-3 ramps up geohazard assessment to protect communities

CITY OF SAN FERNANDO, Pampanga – The Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR)-Region 3, through its Mines and Geosciences Bureau (MGB) regional office, has strengthened its National Geohazard Assessment and Mapping Program (NGAMP) to continuously identify areas in Central Luzon that are susceptible to geologic hazards and protect communities from disaster and calamities.

Engineer Alilo Ensomo, Jr., regional director of MGB, said in an official social media post on Monday that the NGAMP is part of the country's disaster risk reduction management program and centers on rain-induced landslides, floods, flash floods, ground subsidence or sinking, and other forms of slope instabilities that are not directly induced by earthquakes or volcanic activities.

"In Central Luzon, the MGB was able to complete its 1:10,000 scale geohazard maps in 2014, and has been conducting vulnerability and risk assessment and updating of geohazard maps to identify potential areas which may be prone to natural disasters," he said.

Ensomo said the MGB conducted coastal geohazard mapping in the eastern and western seaboard of the region and completed the assessment of 39 coastal municipalities in Central Luzon in 2018.

Starting last year, he said the MGB also conducted a detailed assessment of highly vulnerable coastal barangays in Botolan and San Narcico in Zambales.

Likewise, he said the MGB expanded its NGAMP by including karst subsidence and hazard assessment in areas underlain by limestone, such as Candelaria in Zambales, San Miguel and Doña Remedios Trinidad in Bulacan, and General Tinio in Nueva Ecija.

"Let us maximize the use of these geohazard maps as fundamental tools in disaster preparation, so that potential impacts of natural calamities may be reduced and more communities will be saved from danger," Ensomo said.

Environment Secretary Roy Cimatu has described a geohazard map as a "life-saving tool" that aids susceptible communities in preparing against the destructive and life-threatening impacts of floods, landslides, liquefaction, earthquake, and other ground instabilities. (PNA)



SMC removes 330,000 MT of garbage from Tullahan River

MANILA, Philippines — Diversified conglomerate San Miguel Corp. has removed more than 330,000 metric tons (MT) of garbage from the Tullahan River over a year since SMC started the cleanup.

In a statement yesterday, SMC said it had extracted 332,192 MT of silt and solid waste from the river as of July 22.

"The waste extracted were moved to government-approved disposal centers," SMC said.

The company said the cleanup of the Tullahan River benefited the public in the past days as floods that affected Valenzuela, Malabon and Navotas subsided quickly compared to before.

"With heavy rains brought by Typhoon Fabian and the southwest monsoon in the past few days, we monitored the flooding situation at critical sections of the Tullahan River. Despite the rains, the river did not overflow and the flashfloods in nearby areas subsided in a few hours," SMC president Ramon Ang said.

Ang said the construction of the river wall, pumping stations and dredging operations helped lessen floods in northern Metro Manila.

Valenzuela Mayor Rex Gatchalian thanked SMC for the dredging efforts that significantly reduced floods in the city.

"The floodwaters subsided quickly. Yesterday, it was gone after five hours. Before, it took the whole day," Gatchalian said.

SMC has accelerated the dredging of Tullahan River and is working on the cleanup of the 27-kilometer river system, a main tributary to Manila Bay.

The company has been undertaking the P1-billion Tullahan-Tinajeros River System cleanup project.

The Tullahan River was identified as one of the top Philippine rivers polluting the oceans with plastic waste, according to a study published by OurWorldinData.org.

Apart from the Tullahan River, SMC is also working with the Departments of Environment and Natural Resources and Public Works and Highways to finalize the permits and dredging plans needed to commence the five-year program to dredge the 27-kilometer Pasig River.

Climate action must happen 'for our people, not to them', cities say

A shift to a greener economy should bring social benefits, especially for the poorest, or 'the politics will end up against us'.

Efforts to push low-carbon lifestyles and green energy to curb climate change will fail unless many people see benefits — and the poorest and most vulnerable should get the biggest gains, leading mayors and other city officials urged Friday.

"The journey to net-zero (emissions) has to happen with and <u>for our people</u>, not to them," warned Susan Aitken, leader of the city council in Glasgow, the Scottish city that will host the COP26 UN climate negotiations in November.

"It can't be about just telling our poorest residents what they have to give up ... (It) has to show how to take advantage of this changing world," she said during an online event marking 100 days until the key talks.

More than a half-century later, Glasgow is still battling social deprivation as a result of the city's painful industrial decline starting in the 1950s, Aitken said.

That has made clear that as a new major economic shift gets underway to try to ward off surging climate threats, "anything but a <u>just transition</u> we will come to regret", she said.

Nigel Topping, Britain's high-level climate action champion for COP26, said failure to make sure the coming green shift was fair and benefitted the poor as well as the rich would derail it.

"If we don't do it inclusively, the politics will end up being against us," he said during the event organised by the C40 Cities network of major cities pushing for swifter action on climate change.

<u>Cities</u> have been at the forefront of government climate action over the last decade, with many declaring net-zero emissions goals long before countries or businesses followed suit.

Today more than 750 global cities have pledged to reach net-zero emissions by mid-century, said David Miller, director of international diplomacy for C40.

As efforts to act more swiftly on climate threats build globally, "cities can show national governments the leadership that's required," said London Mayor Sadiq Khan.

Providing jobs, more affordable energy, more comfortable homes and better access to carbon-absorbing green spaces for all residents — including the poor — is a key part of that push, the mayors said.

Ada Colau, Barcelona's mayor, pointed to efforts in her city to launch a new company to supply green electricity, resulting in both lower emissions and cheaper power for residents.

Mohammed Adjei Sowah, the mayor of Ghana's capital of Accra, said his city's push to cut emissions involved recognising that informal workers make up at least 75 per cent of the city's workforce and trying to bring them into new jobs that are green and more stable.

"To ensure a truly just transition... we cannot afford to ignore the informal sector in the things we are doing," he said.

Sharan Burrow, general secretary of the International Trade Union Confederation, said ensuring a low-carbon transition focuses as much on jobs and families as cutting emissions is vital to its success.

"We know our common security is based not just on having a healthy planet but secure jobs with decent work, where people have opportunities for themselves and the future," she said.

World needs to act vs climate, UN tells G20



July 27, 2021

<u>UNITED NATIONS</u>: UN Secretary-General António Guterres on Sunday (Monday in Manila) called for leadership of the <u>Group of 20</u> (G20) on global climate action.

"The world urgently needs a clear and unambiguous commitment to the 1.5-degree goal of the <u>Paris Agreement</u> from all G20 nations. There is no pathway to this goal without the leadership of the G20," he said in a statement at the G20 ministerial meeting on environment, climate and energy.

"This signal is desperately needed by the billions of people already on the front lines of the climate crisis and by markets, investors and industry who require certainty that a net-zero climate-resilient future is inevitable," he said.

Science shows that in order to meet this ambitious, yet achievable goal, the world must achieve carbon neutrality before 2050 and cut dangerous greenhouse gas emissions by 45 percent by 2030 from 2010 levels. But the world is way off track, said Guterres.

With less than 100 days left before the <u>UN Climate Change Conference</u> in <u>Glasgow</u>, <u>Scotland</u>, he urged all G20 and other leaders to commit to net-zero by mid-century, present more ambitious 2030 national climate plans and deliver on concrete policies and actions aligned with a net-zero future, including no new coal after 2021, phasing out fossil fuel subsidies and agreeing to a minimum international carbon pricing floor as proposed by the <u>International Monetary Fund</u>.

The <u>Group of Seven</u> and other developed countries must also deliver on a credible solidarity package of support for developing countries, including meeting the \$100-billion goal, increasing adaptation and resilience support to at least 50 percent of total climate finance and getting public and multilateral development banks to significantly align their climate portfolios to meet the needs of developing countries, he said.

Guterres said he intended to use the opportunity of the upcoming UN General Assembly high-level session to bring leaders together to reach a political understanding on these critical elements of the package needed for Glasgow.



Late last year, at their summit in Riyadh, G20 leaders identified climate change as one of the most pressing challenges of the twenty-first century. "As we recover from the pandemic," their <u>communiqué</u> read, "we are committed to safeguarding our planet and building a more environmentally sustainable and inclusive future for all people." That commitment hasn't quite materialised.

To be sure, the carbon intensity of the energy supply in G20 countries is declining. Coal use is falling, power-sector pollution is edging down, and a host of new clean-transport policies is being rolled out. G20-led initiatives to encourage businesses to disclose climate risks are <u>starting to bear fruit</u>.

But none of this is happening fast enough to make a real dent in emissions, not least because G20 countries are also quietly funneling cash toward carbon-intensive sectors. According to <u>Vivid Economics</u>, of the \$4.6 trillion the world's leading economies pumped into the agriculture, industry, waste, energy, and transport sectors as part of their pandemic-relief packages, less than \$1.8 trillion was "green."

MANILA, Philippines — Health authorities on Monday reported 6,664 new coronavirus cases, bringing the country's total to 1,555,396.

Today's numbers saw active cases up by 878 from July 25's 54,262. The Department of Health said eight laboratories failed to submit testing results.

- Active cases: 55,140 or 3.5% of the total
- Recoveries: 5,766, bringing the number to 1,473,009
- Deaths: 23, or now 27,247 in total
- Delta variant threat looming
- DOH urged <u>protesters</u> during President Rodrigo Duterte's final State of the Nation Address to keep following health protocols amid the threat of the Delta variant of COVID-19.
- A health official said 9 of the total <u>Delta</u> cases are vaccinated for COVID-19. Most showed mild to no symptoms at all, while two who died from the variant were unvaccinated.
- Government figures showed there are now <u>6.08 million</u> fully inoculated against COVID-19. The number is out of the total target of 70 million.
- The Quezon City government confirmed that a <u>resident</u> who returned from abroad had been infected with the Delta variant.

PH Covid-19 recoveries rise by 5K to 1,473,009

MANILA – The nation's overall tally of coronavirus disease 2019 (Covid-19) patients who beat the disease have reached 1,473,009 as 5,766 new recoveries were recorded as of Monday.

The Department of Health (DOH) said the figure is equivalent to a 94.7-percent recovery rate from a total of 1,555,396 infections since the start of the pandemic last year.

The DOH also tallied 6,664 new confirmed cases, bringing the total number of active cases in the country to 55,140 or 3.5 percent of all cases.

Of the active cases, 93.6 percent are mild, 1.1 percent are asymptomatic, 2.3 percent are severe, 1.61 percent are moderate, and 1.4 percent are in critical condition.

Also logged were 23 new fatalities, raising the death toll to 27,247 or 1.75 percent of the total cases.

The DOH said 23 duplicates were removed from the total case count as nine of those were actually recoveries.

Meanwhile, 17 cases previously tagged as recoveries were reclassified as deaths after final validation.

According to DOH data on July 24, about 13.4 percent of 45,369 who were tested turned out positive for Covid-19.

All laboratories were operational on July 24 while one laboratory was not able to submit their data to the Covid-19 Document Repository System.

Based on data in the last 14 days, the three non-reporting laboratories contribute, on average, 2.3 percent of samples tested and 2.0 percent of positive individuals.

To date, 58 percent of 3,500 intensive care unit beds, 47 percent of 19,600 isolation beds, 44 percent of 12,200 ward beds, and 39 percent of 2,800 ventilators dedicated to patients with Covid-19 are in use nationwide.

Quezon City confirms first Covid-19 Delta variant case

Quezon City Mayor Joy Belmonte expressed confidence that the entire city government is capable of handling the new case of the Covid-19 Delta variant in the city.

The Quezon City government has reported its first case of the Covid-19 Delta variant today (July 26).

In a press statement, the city government said the new case was a returning Overseas Filipino Worker (OFW) from Saudi Arabia, who is also a resident of Quezon City.

The 34-year old male OFW arrived on June 24 and stayed in a hotel in Makati for 10 days before transferring to another hotel in Manila from July 4 to 11.

He experienced a slightly itchy throat on June 28 and was swabbed on June 30.

He was considered recovered and was allowed to go home to his family on July 11.

Quezon City confirms first Covid-19 Delta variant case

However, the result of his sequenced sample was relayed to the Quezon City Epidemiology and Surveillance Unit (CESU) Sunday evening, and the unit immediately made arrangements for another round of swab tests for him and his close family contacts today.

He and his family have been under strict home quarantine since last night.

"He will undergo another swab test, along with his family, as part of our protocol even if he is considered a recovered patient. We are doing extensive contact tracing on his close contacts just to make sure," CESU head Dr. Rolly Cruz said.

Quezon City Mayor Joy Belmonte expressed confidence that CESU and the entire city government are capable of handling the case.

"We have put in place extensive measures in preparation for the Delta variant and we continue to exert all effort to contain its possible spread. What is important is that we are intensifying testing and aggressive contact tracing," Mayor Belmonte said.

Last July 14, the city government formed Task Force Delta Variant, which identified key areas to concentrate on, including revisiting the city's disease surveillance, active case finding, and contact tracing capacity; its testing capability, and the efficiency of its molecular laboratory in processing specimens; reviewing its isolation and quarantine protocols and the status and bed capacity of its HOPE facilities; and assessing equipment and manpower resources of hospitals handling moderate to severe cases.

Task Force Disiplina was also ordered to ramp up monitoring and inspection, to ensure that minimum health protocols are followed in all public places.

The city government, through CESU, is also closely coordinating with another local government unit regarding a possible local transmission of the Delta variant.

CESU learned that a male patient who resides in another city but works in a factory in Quezon City contacted the Covid-19 variant.

His pregnant wife also tested positive for Covid-19.

CESU has been conducting contact tracing and swabbing at his place of work since Saturday.

"There are no reported cases yet at his place of work but we are doing this as a preventive measure to make sure we contain any possible transmission this early," Dr. Cruz said.

Based on available information, the factory worker experienced shortness of breathing, colds, fever, and sore throat on July 4 and tested positive the day after.

He was admitted to the Philippine General Hospital on July 5 and was discharged on July 18. His wife, who was asymptomatic, was tested on July 8 and turned out positive the next day. She tested positive again on July 17.


They are staying at a quarantine facility in another city until the end of the month. (SC)

Cause for concern: 55 new Delta variant cases reported

Health authorities urged the public anew to strictly adhere to stricter minimum public health standards as an additional 55 new cases of the Delta variant were reported on July 25.

Fifty-five additional cases of the more transmissible Delta variant of the coronavirus, first detected in India, were confirmed by the Department of Health (DOH) on Sunday (July 25), bringing the total number of Delta cases to 119.

Aside from the Delta variant, the DOH said in a statement that new cases of the Alpha variant (94), Beta variant (179), and Theta variant (9) were similarly detected, based on the latest whole-genome sequencing report by the University of the Philippines-Philippine Genome Center (UP-PGC), and the University of the Philippines-National Institutes of Health (UP-NIH).

Overall, 103 recovered, 12 are recuperating and four have died, including one of the 55, according to the report.

Thirty-seven of the 55 new cases were local cases with indicated addresses: 14 from Calabarzon, eight from Northern Mindanao, six from the National Capital Region, six from Central Luzon, two from Davao Region, and one from the Ilocos Region.

The remaining 17 were Returning Overseas Filipinos (ROFs), and one case was being verified whether it is a local or ROF case.

Other variants

Of the new 94 Alpha variant cases, 87 were local cases, one ROF, and six were under verification.

Based on the case line list, one remains active, two cases have died, and 91 cases were tagged as recovered.

To date, the Alpha variant, first detected in the United Kingdom, was seen in 1,773 cases in the Philippines.

For the 179 Beta variant cases, 168 were local cases, four ROFs, and seven cases were being verified.

Two are still active, one died, 175 have recovered, and one was being verified. The total Beta variant cases is now at 2,019.

All new nine P.3 variant cases are local cases and have recovered.

While the P.3 variant has been reclassified as "alert for further monitoring", it is still being investigated and information are continually collected to monitor its public health implication.

The total P.3 variant cases is at 244.

To date, the UP-PGC has sequenced a total of 9,351 samples.

Health authorities urged the public anew to strictly adhere to stricter minimum public health standards and continue to avoid enclosed spaces and mass gatherings with the detection of local cases with the Delta variant and other variants of concern.

Duterte says PH may go back to 'early days' due to Delta threat

Metro Manila (CNN Philippines, July 26) — While the country cannot afford more lockdowns, it may go back to the "early days" if the threat of the Delta variant persists, President Rodrigo Duterte said Monday.

"We cannot afford more lockdowns, lest our economy bleeds to the point of irreversible damage," Duterte said in his final State of the Nation Address.

"Delta, if ever it will spread, we have it here now, I hope it will not go any further, but if something wrong happens, I'll have to be strict...There will be (lockdowns) just like what happened in the early days," he added.

Early last year, Duterte placed Luzon under enhanced community quarantine for two months to help stem the spread of the coronavirus.

Duterte admitted he does not know how to handle the Delta variant, adding that he is awaiting the recommendation of local health experts on what measures to take.

"I really do not know what to do. I have to listen to the task force. This is a group of people...[who] would give you advice collectively," he said.

The Philippines so far has recorded 64 Delta variant cases.

The Department of Health earlier confirmed there is already a local transmission of the highly contagious Delta variant. Healthcare workers warned the Philippines may not be able to handle its severe impact, similar to what Indonesia is experiencing. The government, however, said it has been increasing the capacity of local hospitals as it prepares for a "worst-case scenario."

Center for disease control

Duterte also appealed to Congress to pass a law creating the country's own center for disease control and a virology institute.

"We have to pursue the creation of public entities dedicated to managing emerging and re-emerging diseases." he said.

Several bills establishing the country's CDC have been filed in Congress.

Senator Richard Gordon, one of the proponents of the measure, said the creation of a CDC and a virology institute should have been done decades ago.


"That is a step in the right direction, but should have been done 20 years ago," he told CNN Philippines.

"It is time to have a machinery na talagang titignan [that will look] 20 years from now, where are we headed and we fine tune as we go along."

For now, the President urged Filipinos to get vaccinated, as well as complete the recommended doses as scheduled.

He also asked for understanding from those who are next in line to receive the COVID-19 shots as he assured them that more vaccines will arrive in the country.

The government is expecting the arrival of a total of 36 million vaccine doses this month, he said.
