

DENR to expedite land distribution in Taytay, Rizal

THE Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) aims to complete the distribution of a land parcel in Lupang Arenda in Taytay, Rizal before President Rodrigo Duterte's term ends in 2022.

This will be done through the agency's continuous conduct of dialogues between concerned agencies and the informal settlers who have been appealing for ownership, DENR Undersecretary for Solid Waste Management and Local Government Units Concerns Benny Antiporda said.

He said the DENR has been moving to expedite the land distribution process through the resolution of issues concerning the 20,100-square-meter lot in Barangay Sta. Ana.

"I'm trying to fast track this, but, of course, it should be within the bounds of the law. I look forward that by the next time we meet, it would already be for the awarding of titles. I even hope to have our very own President Duterte award these titles," Antiporda said.

He said that it is only under the term of President Duterte that the case is being seriously dealt with and given attention.

In a recent meeting with the land claimants and officers of concerned government agencies, Antiporda settled the issue on the process of land titling with the help of the DENR regional office, Provincial Environment and Natural Resources Office (Penro)-Rizal, local government of Taytay, and Samahang Masigasig Tapayan Homeowners Association Inc. (Samathoa).

The lot is part of the 50,300-sqm lot being appealed for ownership by the long-time informal settlers in Lupang Arenda, who have been complying with the necessary requirements and clearances for titling of the lands.

Antiporda also laid out the concerns on the 20,100-sqm lot, which was certified by the Laguna Lake Development Authority (LLDA) as above the reglementary 12.5-meter elevation and is outside the shoreland of Laguna Lake.

Under the residential free patent program, Penro-Rizal is tasked to process the titling applications of the said lot for disposal.

The DENR official also instructed Penro-Rizal and Samathoa to submit a report every 15 days of the progress of actions undertaken or issues identified for monitoring and assistance of his committee.


Meanwhile, DENR-Calabarzon Regional Executive Director Nilo Tamoria committed "to provide technical assistance and oversight function over its field offices."

Penro-Rizal officer Ernesto Diso Jr. said a total of 297 lots are included in the 20,100-sqm land parcel, of which 101 applications with carpetas have been submitted and evaluated by Penro.

However, there are still 196 lots for application for the residential free patent, Diso noted.

He also reminded Samathoa to advise some of its members to submit their tax declarations on the lots they have been occupying as "tax declarations are a primary requirement in titling."





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Alliance of People's Organizations in Lupang Arenda President Vicente Barlos said they are ready to comply with the payment of real property tax for the issuance of tax declarations.

Meanwhile, Presidential Commission for the Urban Poor Chairman Alvin Feliciano is hoping that the municipality of Taytay will allow the exemption of the claimants from paying their real property tax.

Antiporda tasked Diso to endorse the Samathoa position paper for consideration for land titling on the remaining 30,200 sqm to DENR-Calabarzon.

The regional office will then give its recommendation to LLDA for the latter's evaluation and investigation.

"We are all in this together to help our fellow residents in Lupang Arenda," Antiporda said.

Sa nasabing pulong na ginanap sa DENR Central Office, inayos ni Antiporda ang isyu tungkol sa pagproseso ng land titling sa tulong na rin ng iba't-ibang tanggapan kabilang na ang DENR regional office, Provincial Environment and Natural Resources Office (PENRO), lokal na pamahalaan ng Taytay at ng Samahang Masigasig Tapayan Homeowners Association, Inc. (SAMATHOA).

Samantala, inatasan din ni Antiporda ang PENRO-Rizal at SAMATHOA na magsumite ng ulat kada 15 araw sa progreso ng aksiyon o ng matutukoy na isyu para para sa monitoring at tulong ng kanyang komite.

Nangako naman si DENR-Calabarzon Regional Executive Director Nilo Tamoria na maglalaan ito ng technical assistance at oversight function sa kanyang field offices.

Sa ulat ni PENRO-Rizal Officer Ernesto Diso, Jr., mayroong 297 lote ang kabilang sa 20,100-sq. m. land parcel kung saan ay 101 na aplikasyon na may carpeta ang naisumite at nasuri na ng PENRO.

Ngunit sinabi pa nito na mayroon pang 196 na lote ang nakalaan para sa "application for the residential free patent."

Pinaalalahanan din nito ang SAMATHOA na abisuhan ang kanilang mga miyembro na magsumite ng kanilang tax declaration para sa lupa na kanilang inuukupa dahil ito ang isa sa mga kailangan para sa pagtititulo ng lupa.

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Next mission: DENR focuses on cleaning PH oceans

After the closure of all 335 open dumpsites nationwide, the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) is now shifting its focus to cleaning the country's oceans.

Undersecretary for Solid Waste Management and Local Government Units Concerns Benny D. Antiporda on Saturday, June 26, urged Filipinos to take part in clean-up drives initiated for the country's oceans to protect marine resources from the growing problem of marine pollution.

"If every person throws a piece of candy wrapper in the ocean, after just a few months, we would lose our oceans. This is the simplest form of explanation to this growing problem," he said.

Marine pollution is one of the main reasons the DENR closed all illegally operating open dumpsites nationwide as it is in line with the ongoing rehabilitation of Manila Bay.

Antiporda, who is also the head of the Manila Bay Anti-Pollution Task Force, pointed out that one of the objectives of the Manila Bay rehabilitation program is to save the oceans.

"In cleaning Manila Bay, we have three objectives – to see is to believe, dapat wala na tayong makikitang debris (there should be no debris). Second, to smell is to believe – dapat pag dumaan tayo diyan, ang simoy ng hangin ay amoy dagat na at hindi amoy kubeta (when we pass by the bay, we must only the smell of the sea and fresh air), and third, to test is to believe – 'pag test natin ng water quality, dapat standard na siya (the water quality must be at par with the standard)," he said.

The DENR also partnered with the Philippine Coast Guard (PCG) and Philippine National Police-Maritime Group (PNP-MG) to inspect marine vessels at the Navotas Fish Port and Del Pan Bridge on June 4.





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During the inspection, the team noted that many of the vessels docked alongside the Manila Bay area were rusted. Floating debris were also seen in the area. To check possible chemical contamination and to assess the water quality, the DENR-Environmental Management Bureau (EMB) took water samples from the site.

"Despite our campaign to clean our oceans, if the sea vessel operators will not help in this endeavor, we will not be able to clean it up," added Antiporda.

He also met with the captains of the wooden cargo vessels known as batil to discuss the wastewater discharge from the vessels, and their solid waste management system. He likewise sought the support of the shipyard owners in addressing the pollution in Manila Bay.

"We are racing against time, and unless something is done and fast, then we could one day wake up and learn that we already lost our oceans and marine resources due to our neglect and irresponsibility. We need to take action now to save the environment," Antiporda stressed.

HERMOSA, BATAAN — To help protect the waters and coastal areas of Manila Bay, the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) in Central Luzon and the local government unit (LGU) here partnered to propagate more bamboo species while establishing a 1.7 hectare bambusetum and bamboo nursery.

DENR executive director Paquito Moreno Jr. said that the planned bamboo nursery and bambusetum will help boost the rehabilitation of the Manila Bay while stabilizing the riverbanks around it.

He added that the propagation of bamboo is in support of the marching order of Environment Secretary Roy Cimatu to plant and use bamboo as priority species to rehabilitate riverbanks and the Manila Bay.

Moreno said that the agency and the LGU have already planted some 30 propagules of Yellow bamboo in the closed sanitary landfill in Barangay Mambog in Hermosa town.

"We are eyeing the planting of another 950 propagules of Giant Bamboo, Yellow bamboo, Budda belly bamboo, Kawayan tinik, Kawayan kiling and Bayog species.

These species are a potential source of engineered bamboo and as planting material to control soil erosion, stabilize river banks and rehabilitate degraded areas," Moreno said.





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Bataan, DENR boost bamboo propagation

Since 2011, the DENR has already established more than 14,000 hectares of bamboo plantation in the region under the National Greening Program (NGP).

According to study, there are 62 bamboo species in the Philippines and 21 of these are considered endemic to the country.

MORE than 4,000 mangrove propagules covering two hectares were planted on June 26, 2021 in the coastal waters of Barangay Consuelo in Macabebe town, Pampanga, in a bid to strengthen the protection of marine ecosystem and help boost the rehabilitation of Manila Bay, and in line with the celebration of Philippine Arbor Day and Philippine Environment Month this year.

Laudemir Salac, head of the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) provincial office in Pampanga said, mangrove species are important component of coastal environment because it served as spawning and breeding ground of fishes, mollusks, shrimps, crabs and other marine

"Mangrove can provide numerous benefits like food and livelihood. It also acts as natural barrier against strong typhoons and storm surge that enable to protect our coastal communities," he explained.

He added that the mangrove planting event was a collaboration between the DENR regional office, the DENR Provincial Environment and Natural Resources Office (PENRO) in Pampanga, the local government of Macabebe, the Professional Regulations Commission (PRC) and the Society of Filipino Forester Incorporated (SFFI)- Pampanga Chapter.

"Restoring our environment is a challenging task that needs the active participation of every individual. That is why collaboration with the different stakeholders of the environment is vital to bring positive changes in our environment," he said, adding that the establishment of mangrove forest is vital in the rehabilitation of Manila Bay.

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Ilocos Norte lauds ranger officers for forest rehab efforts

LAOAG CITY – The province of Ilocos Norte has lauded the efforts of its barangay ranger officers (BROs) for safeguarding its upland forest and watersheds.

Running for eight years now, the provincial government, through its Environment and Natural Resources Office, has sustained its local greening program particularly in ensuring the upkeep of the so-called "Green Wall" of Ilocos Norte that spans around 8,000 hectares of forest lands and watersheds in the municipalities of Solsona, Marcos, Nueva Era, Dingras, Vintar and the cities of Batac and Laoag City.

Parts of it can be accessed through bike and other four-wheeled vehicles, which serves as added highway and eco-tourism attractions of Ilocos Norte especially in this time of the pandemic.

According to Community Development officer Estrella "Baby" Sacro, they can not thank enough the barangay ranger officers (BRO) who are responsible for planting and growing thousands of forest tree seedlings and fruit-bearing trees in these areas.

With a minimum salary of PHP3,000 a month, hundreds of them are deployed up in the mountains to plant more trees and at the same time, guard the area from various threats.


On Thursday, at least 65 of them came down and went to the Capitol to receive their stipends, which were personally handed to them by Governor Matthew Joseph Manotoc.

Each of them receives PHP12,000 which accounts for their salary from January to April.

"Our BROs are responsible for preventing forest fires, planting fruit and tree seedlings as well as in ensuring a high survival rate of the plants through applying fertilizers and safeguarding the watershed," said Sacro in an interview Friday.

The program of recruiting BROs is also meant for job-generating purposes.

Sacro said that aside from their cash allowances, they can also grow some root crops such as ginger, taro, and sweet potatoes which they can sell to sustain their family needs.

Under Governor Matthew Joseph Manotoc's leadership, the hiring of more BROs for every town is a priority program to address and find solutions for various climate change issues in the province such as landslides and frequent droughts. (*PNA*)





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

The DILG under Secretary Eduardo M. Año is one of the agencies that has vowed for intensified forest protection in the wake of the devastations caused by Typhoon Ulysses. The same agency led the arrest of the professional squatting syndicate in San Mateo, Rizal in December 2020.

The joint mission was attended by representatives from the youth, indigenous, media, government, and environment sectors to promote truth and a common understanding of the challenges of our watershed.



Nearly 10,000 hectares of Manila Bay from Navotas City to Cavite were supposed to be included in 25 reclamation projects.


Duterte earlier said the proposed Manila Bay reclamation projects will "choke the entire Manila."

MANILA – President Rodrigo Duterte revealed Friday that he thumbed down the proposals of private companies to conduct massive land reclamation activities in Manila Bay because of corruption issues.

In a speech delivered at Camp Crame in Quezon City, Duterte said the processing of thousands of applications for reclamation projects in Manila Bay was stopped due to corruption.

"You know, *itong sa* Manila Bay *na* reclamation (the planned reclamation in Manila Bay), thousands have applied. But because of the corruption that I've heard early last year, there's no more processing of papers. *Hininto ko* (I stopped it)," he said.

Duterte did not specify the companies embroiled in corrupt activities, but hinted they earned "lots of money" in the reclamation proposals.

He said he would not allow firms to bribe government officials in exchange for preferential treatment.

"It has caused the big companies lots of money just for delayed projects," he said. "I told you, do not give money to the people in government. If I know that you have given even a single centavo, I will throw your application to the wastebasket. And I have done that and I am doing it everyday *para talagang magtino ito* (so this government will be free of corruption)."

In February 2020, Duterte said he may only consider government-related reclamation projects at Manila Bay. He added the private sector can wait for his successor to pitch their proposed reclamation activities.

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'No to BIDA' tarps spread around Boracay

BORACAY Island, Malay Aklan — The proposed measure seeking to create a Boracay Island Development Authority (BIDA) last year is being met with fierce opposition as tarpaulins bearing "No to BIDA" sprouted around this resort island.

This developed after both the committee on government enterprise and privatization and the committee on good local government in Congress jointly approved the BIDA bill which aimed to place Boracay under the Government Owned and Controlled Corporation (GOCC).

In President Rodrigo Duterte's State of the Nations Address last year, he called on Congress to pass a law that will oversee the management of this resort island to ensure environmental sustainability.

Aklan Governor Florencio Miraflores said that they support the BIDA Law only if it is for regulatory purposes and not as a government controlled body.

For his part, Provincial Board Member Jay Tejada said that the Sanguniang Panlalawigan of Aklan along with several stakeholders in Aklan oppose the GOCC concept of the BIDA Law.

"The BIDA as a GOCC concept has been patterned to that of the creation of the Subic Bay Metropolitan Authority. But the situation of Subic is different from Boracay," Tejada said.

The local government of Malay is also invoking the local government code to strongly oppose the passage of BIDA law as a GOCC.

The tarpaulins here were installed by a group which call themselves the One Boracay Movement. The tarpaulins were placed at the front beach, passenger boats, jetty ports, residential houses and business establishments.

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Coral restoration in Marinduque begins

The Department of Science and Technology has collaborated with the provincial government of Marinduque, Bureau of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources (BFAR), local government units and their fisherfolk to deploy coral transplantation technology off the coast of Buenavista, Marinduque, the DOST said in a news release.

This is the first large-scale restoration effort in the Mimaropa region that seeks to reverse reef degradation and improve the productivity of marine resources.

Ten coral nursery units (CNUs) were placed in the Marine Protected Areas of Tungib-Lipata in Buenavista on June 10 and 11, while another 10 CNUs were established in Poctoy, Torrijos, on June 22 and 23.

CNUs are used to facilitate the growth of the asexually reproduced corals or live coral fragments—also known as the "corals of opportunity" (COPs)—dislodged from a colony through the natural process of fragmentation.

CNUs are set up 25 feet underwater with each CNU designed to hold 500 COPs per batch several times a year.

The technology was developed by the University of San Carlos under the "Filipinnovation on Coral Reef Restoration Program" of the DOST-Philippine Council for Agriculture, Aquatic and Natural Resources Research and Development.





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Coral restoration in Marinduque begins

In 2018, the DOST-Mimaropa initiated the assessment of coral reef areas in Marinduque through the adoption of the Automated Rapid Reef Assessment System (Arras) that successfully generated a comprehensive report and maps of the coral reef and seagrasses.

Arras is a program for coral reef monitoring developed by the University of the Philippines Diliman and funded by the DOST.

The long-term monitoring project revealed that major areas in the province have no live coral cover due to siltation and sedimentation along the coast. Hence, a high priority for management and protection was recommended for these degraded areas.

For a holistic approach to address the problem, DOST-Mimaropa collaborated with different stakeholders, including government agencies and communities.

The provincial offices of the BFAR and the Department of Environment and Natural Resources conducted their monitoring and evaluation to provide pertinent data for the project and processed the necessary permits.

Meanwhile, the provincial government of Marinduque and Marinduque State College engaged experts to install, monitor and maintain these CNUs and covered training expenses.

DOST-Mimaropa led in procuring and deploying the CNUs, provided technical diving experts, conducted periodic monitoring and evaluation of the coral's growth and survivorship and conducted forum and other awareness activities.

It also ensured that communities were involved in the activities—from planting the coral fragments to setting up the CNUs.

The office plans to deploy the technology to six other municipalities in Marinduque by the end of July.

Ocean conservation advocate and diversater Danny Ocampo is appalled by the sight of plastic waste every time he takes a dive in Anilao, a famous dive spot in the town of Mabini in Batangas.

Ocampo, together with his fellow dive enthusiasts, makes it a point to pick up trash, mostly single-use plastics on the ocean floor, as part of their diving and sightseeing activities.

"But what [are we] to do with garbage?" he asked.

Ocampo refers to the wreckages or remnants of failed artificial reef and coral gardening projects that he finds on the ocean floor, which end up polluting the coastal and marine environment in the Philippines.

On his Facebook post to celebrate World Oceans Day on June 8, Ocampo shared the photos he took from his past dives, expressing dismay over what he calls the creeping garbage of man-made reefs.

Man-made reefs

An artificial reef is a man-made structure deployed in the ocean to mimic the functions and characteristics of a natural reef.

In the Philippines, the deployment of artificial reefs or artificial habitats aims to address the decline in fish production by allowing the natural regeneration and recolonization of degraded coral reefs and their environment.





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Coral gardening, meanwhile, is a method of regenerating corals by transplanting live coral fragments either over the surface of a natural structure such as rocks or degraded reefs, or manmade structures deployed for the purpose. It also aims to provide another tourist attraction in the oceans.

Feel-good projects

According to Ocampo, diving resorts offer artificial reef and coral gardening projects in their tour packages for foreign and local tourists, which they consider a way of bringing back to life the country's degraded coastal and marine environment.

- "[These tourists] feel good leaving behind something, but after a year this is what happens," O campo told the BusinessMirror in an interview over Zoom on June 20.
- "These projects are supposed to have permits from the government. Some are even implemented together with the BFAR [Bureau of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources], Philippine Navy, and [Philippine] Coast Guard," he lamented.

Fad since the 70s

Dr. Wilfredo Y. Licuanan, founding director of the Br. Alfred Shields FSC Ocean Research Center of the De La Salle University (DLSU), said artificial reef or artificial habitat projects became widespread in the 1970s up to the 1980s.

This period saw old tires, and even old cars, dropped on the ocean floors to provide artificial homes to fish or as replacements to coral reefs damaged by destructive fishing methods.

He also said that even old ships were sunk to provide an artificial habitat for fish and other marine life—an old practice but not a very good idea.

Reef heals itself

"One of the things we point out why it's not a good idea is, in most cases, it is best to just allow the reef to heal itself," he said.

A full professor at the DLSU Biology Department, Licuanan explained that similar projects commonly shown on social media are not addressing the reason why the reefs are dying to begin with.

"If the factors that kill the corals are still there, gathering the corals in one place makes them more likely to die because they are not normally transferred," he said.

Licuanan noted that there is a joint order that provides the guidelines for the establishment and management of artificial reefs in the Philippines, referring to the Departments of Environment and Natural Resources, Agriculture and National Defense Memorandum 2000-01.

According to Licuanan, artificial reefs and coral gardening should require special permits from the local mayor and BFAR.

The regulation was put in place because these artificial reef and coral gardening projects, which were borne out of the goodness of people, lack the much-needed science, he said.





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However, these guidelines were not implemented or followed, resulting in failed projects, including those implemented by communities without the guidance of concerned authorities and experts in related fields of science.

Different reef species

Many believe that what they see on social media could be replicated anywhere else, but "they need to realize that there are different species of reefs," Licuanan said.

The Philippines has, by conservative estimate, about 600 species of reefs, while other areas have no more than 50 coral species.

"This is the big difference," he said.

Another difference is that rich countries such as the US can spend money on reefs, but this is "not realistic for low- or middle-income countries like the Philippines."

In a Department of Science and Technology-funded project, Licuanan undertook a nationwide assessment of the coral reefs in the Philippines and found that they are in a worst state.

"Zero percent of the country's coral reefs are in excellent condition," he said.

Extensive study needed

For coral reef and coral gardening projects to succeed, Licuanan said there should be an extensive study on where an artificial reef can be deployed, stay in place and not easily destroyed by ocean current, especially during strong typhoons. It should also determine which coral species can be used in coral gardening for a particular area.

"Because of the huge number of species here in the Philippines, even experts have difficulty identifying them, so that's already a problem," he said.

When the wrong coral species is placed beside another species, one of them tends to die due to competition for essential nutrients, food and space.

Alarming trend

According to Licuanan, there is reason to be alarmed when an increasing number of resorts with diving schools or offer diving as an attraction includes artificial reef and coral gardening project as part of a tour package.

He noted that some resort owners who have the capacity to finance such projects—without consulting the experts—may exploit the good intention of people.

In coral gardening, for instance, he noted that some fishermen tapped by these resorts tend to gather live coral fragments by cutting them off from healthy corals and offering them as "corals of opportunity" to be transplanted by tourists.





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Reef monitoring

Licuanan said that, to help protect and conserve these corals, activities should be limited and communities should be empowered to help in reef monitoring.

Reef monitoring, he said, will enable concerned authorities to know in advance which reefs, natural or man-made, are exposed to serious threats, and can then introduce measures to reduce stress to the threatened corals. This is particularly helpful in case of ocean warming that cause coral bleaching.

"Monitoring provides us early warning. We can identify the areas [where corals are] prone to bleaching as opposed to areas [where] corals recover that are not experiencing bleaching at all. That way, we can do something about it," he said.

For his part, Ocampo appealed to resort owners and fellow divers to organize activities to help protect and conserve the corals, such as monitoring various threats to them.

Besides coral bleaching, divers can also undertake activities that will address, if not prevent, the outbreak of crown-of-thorns starfish that can extensively damage and even wipe out an entire coral reef in a matter of days.

More important, he said, is for dive resorts, dive instructors and divers themselves to discourage artificial reef and coral gardening projects that tend to do more harm than good to the coastal and marine environment.

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'State of emergency' eyed for trash woes

CEBU, Philippines — Acting Cebu City Mayor Michael Rama is contemplating on declaring a state of emergency or calamity in Barangay Inayawan to address the "sorry state" of the city's garbage disposal system.

But Inayawan barangay captain Kirk Bryan Repollo said such declaration will be useless if politics will come in the way.

"In just a few weeks serving as acting mayor of Cebu, I have come to realize the sorry state of our garbage disposal. This is truly a cause of concern, not only of the Cebu City government but the whole citizenry of the City," Rama said in a press conference at the Cebu City Hall's Social Hall yesterday.

The problem at hand is that the garbage collected from different barangays in Cebu City end up being stalled at the transfer station in Inayawan because the contracted garbage hauler of the city has been refused to dump at a landfill in Binaliw due to its supposed financial obligations.

Docast ready to settle?

Rama is bent on having the city government and the civil society acting as one to address the problem in Inayawan first.

"Last Wednesday, I visited the transfer station in Barangay Inayawan. Mind you, the situation there is beyond comprehension. Piles of garbage can be found everywhere and the stench is unbearable causing so much inconvenience and threat to the health of over 6,000 households within the area," he said.





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'State of emergency' eyed for trash woes

Apart from the threat to the health of residents, Rama also took notice of the road condition in Inayawan that, he said, added injury to the situation.

John Javier, general manager of DOCAST, denied that its firm has P18 million in unpaid dues to the landfill operator ARN Waste Management Inc. He said he was even ready to settle things with the latter but was allegedly not allowed to enter ARN's office.

DOCAST does not have its own transfer station for the north and south districts. Neither Javier nor Department of Public Services (DPS) head John Jigo Dacua commented on this matter.

Dacua said that though he was part of the Bids and Awards Committee, he was not in a position to speak on the committee's behalf. He promised that DPS will continue to serve the Cebuanos.

For his part, Acting Vice Mayor Donaldo Hontiveros has also expressed his full support to address the city's garbage problem and is willing to form a task force in the City Council to this end.

He said a series of meetings are taking place already to address the situation in Inayawan but he is also open to the possibility of declaring a state of emergency or a state of calamity in Inayawan if needed.

Fell on deaf ears?

Meanwhile, Repollo said that he had long lobbied for the fixing of the road leading to the transfer station in Inayawan but the request appeared to have fallen on deaf ears.

"If only our concern had been addressed when I raised the road condition in 2019 after I appeared in the city council session. If DPS is just fully conversant (or if they have knowledge but they just turned a blind eye) on the terms of reference in the bidding documents for the bidding for the private hauler and if only the Cebu City government had not been too focused in trying to politicize Barangay Inayawan in the hope of paralyzing me as the barangay captain, then there should have been no need to declare a state of emergency or calamity," Repollo lamented.

Repollo also aired his gripe over the Mayor's Information and Liaison Office (MILO) of Inayawan which has a "direct line" to the Office of the Mayor.

"What had they been doing? If, indeed, they would pursue the declaration of a state of emergency or calamity, would they stop politicking the services? Would they coordinate with the barangay and not on their useless MILO?" he said.

Repollo said declaring a state of emergency or calamity will just be a waste of funds if the current administration will politicize the situation.

"But they should just make sure that whatever funds will be released, it should be properly accounted for. There should be itemization and cost of the scope of the declaration and proper liquidation later because I don't want that Barangay Inayawan be used as a possible money- making venture by anyone," said Repollo.

Repollo earlier filed a complaint against Cebu City Mayor Edgardo Labella and Department of Public Services (DPS) head John Jigo Dacua before the Office of the Ombudsman due to uncollected garbage in his barangay but Labella labeled it as a "cheap shot." —JMD (FREEMAN)

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KALAHI-CIDSS, RRP:How these DSWD programs addressed coastal, soil erosion in Siargao Island

The Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) has vowed to continue implementing programs that would strengthen community resilience to lessen the damages brought by climate change-induced disasters and calamities.

One of its programs seeking to mitigate the impacts of climate change is the Kapit-Bisig Laban sa Kahirapan – Comprehensive and Integrated Delivery of Social Services (KALAHI-CIDSS) that benefits the residents of Barangay San Roque in the municipality of Pilar, one of the communities In Siargao Island, Surigao del Norte, affected by coastal erosion due to the rising sea water caused by global warming.

"During high tide, sea water reaches the community through an inlet – an indentation of a shoreline, usually long and narrow, such as a small bay or arm, that often leads to an enclosed body of salt water. Since waves, no matter how big or small, continuously creep towards the village's banks, it erodes the land, leaving residents worried that the sea would one day claim their houses and properties," the DSWD said.

Through KALAHI-CIDSS, the San Roque residents were able to carry out a community project that would address coastal erosion in their area.

Using the community-driven development (CDD) strategy, KALAHI-CIDSS allows communities to gain control over decisions and resources.





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"Through the program, community members actively participate to identify and prioritize their community's concerns and allow them to design, implement, and manage solutions to their priority problems," the DSWD said.

It was during the second cycle of the implementation of KALAHI-CIDSS in 2016 when the San Roque residents decided to pursue the construction of the 80-linear meter wharf that will serve as a barrier to the rising sea water and at the same time, will also be used as mini port and fish landing area.

The project, which started on June 9, 2016, has a budgetary requirement amounting to more than P1.27 million.

Through the collaboration of DSWD KALAHI-CIDSS, the municipal government of Pilar, the barangay local government of San Roque, and community volunteers, the wharf was immediately finished on August 17 of the same year, the DSWD cited.

"Aside from serving as a fortification against sea water, the wharf has also helped ease the transportation woes of residents since small boats and bancas now have a sturdy structure where they can dock and get passengers. Normally, these boats ferry the villagers to the open sea and to the shores of the town center of Pilar and other neighboring coastal villages. Most residents prefer to ride boats because the fare is much cheaper compared to land transportation," it said.

Prior to the implementation of the project, San Roque barangay captain Nilda Gonzales recalled the plight of the residents, particularly the students, saying that "it's so hard here in the past. Students often get muddy [boarding a boat to school."

"The wharf is such a huge defense against the seawater," she added.

The DSWD also implemented in 2020 its Risk Resiliency Program (RRP) that benefited the San Roque residents.

"The RRP, through the Cash-for-Work (RRP CFW) on Climate Change Adaptation, Mitigation, and Disaster Risk Reduction aims to strengthen the resilience of vulnerable families and communities by providing cash assistance and involving them in temporary employment activities that address climate and disaster risks," it said.

Under RRP, the residents were paid to build a stone wharf to address soil erosion in the area.

"As the lead agency in disaster response, DSWD will continue to ensure the implementation of programs and services that will encourage disaster preparedness and mitigate the impacts of climate changes, especially to vulnerable communities around the country," the DSWD said.





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DOST to unveil 3 health research breakthroughs under DDR, climate change adaptation program

The Department of Science and Technology (DOST) announced Saturday, June 26, that it will unveil its three major health research projects under the disaster risk reduction and climate change adaptation (DRR-CCA) program of its Philippine Council for Health Research and Development (PCHRD).



The three DDR-CCA projects will be presented during the second Talakayang HeaRT Beat (Health Research and Technology) of 2021 on Monday, June 28 via Zoom.

In a statement issued to the media on Saturday, the DOST said one of the completed DRR-CCA projects is the development of ready-to-eat food products for children aged one to five years old in response to nutrition and food security concerns during disaster events.

"This research developed emergency food products that will address age-appropriate nutrient requirements of children. Enriched with essential micronutrients, the ready to eat food products are developed to treat possible nutritional deficiencies and acute malnutrition of children in events of disaster," it said.

The second project that will be featured during the event is the development of microfluidic paper-based analytical devices (µPADS) for the detection of diarrhea causing pathogens in water.

"After the onset of disasters, water-borne diseases like diarrhea are among the most documented outbreaks caused by poor water quality. Recognizing the importance of monitoring water quality,





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this project developed a microfluidic paper-based analytical device or μ PADs that can detect diarrhea-causing pathogens by assessing the water-quality after disaster events," the DOST said.

"It uses the "lab-on-paper" concept which condenses the equipment, resources, personnel and time needed to obtain an accurate result," it added.

The development of Health Index and Vulnerability Reduction System for Region 4B (D-HIVE 4B Capital) will be the third project to be unveiled.

"To increase resiliency of island provinces in the country, this project developed the eSalba system, a web-based and mobile application that aids emergency responders in making absolute decision during disasters and helps prepare the local government unit of Region 4B in health monitoring, route planning, defining optimal evacuation policies and adaptation measures in events of disaster," the DOST said.

Included in the list of resource persons of the Talakayang HeaRT Beat are DOST Secretary Fortunato T. de la Peña, DOST Undersecretary for Research and Development Rowena Cristina Guevara, DOST Undersecretary for S&T Services Renato Solidum, PCHRD Executive Director Jaime Montoya, and the DRR-CCA project leaders—Ms. Ma. Christina Ramos of Philippine Women's College of Davao, Dr. Lori Shayne Busa of Nueva Viscaya State University, and Dr. Delia B. Senoro of Mapua University.



Elephant exodus sign of habitat loss

YUNNAN: A mammoth trek across southern China by a herd of elephants that has captivated the world with their playful antics has thrown a spotlight on the loss of their habitat and conservation challenges.

The lumbering mammals have journeyed around 500 kilometers from their home in one of the longest animal migrations of its kind recorded in China. Scientists are still baffled by what prompted the elephants to leave their home at the Xishuangbanna National Nature Reserve, bordering Laos.

Since setting off in spring last year they have pilfered shops and trampled crops worth over \$1 million, and thousands of residents have been evacuated from their path.

"For some reason these elephants felt that their traditional home range was no longer suitable... and then they just left to find somewhere else," Ahimsa Campos-Arceiz, an elephant specialist at the Xishuangbanna Tropical Botanical Garden, told Agence France-Presse.

"But they didn't have a destination in mind. They are just moving around trying to find a place that will work for them." Officials have been tracking the wandering herd with drones round the clock, worried they might go on a rampage if they are stressed.

Elephants rely on infrasonic sound - the vibration of their feet - to communicate but in towns they can be easily confused due to vehicle noises.


"What has surprised me the most is that these elephants are very healthy and look very happy despite roaming in densely populated, unfamiliar areas," Campos-Arceiz said. "These elephants are very playful, which tells me that they are fine," he added.

Forests in far southwest Yunnan province, where the elephants came from, are rapidly giving way to rubber and tea plantations, and herds have become marooned in disconnected preserves.

China is one of the few places in the world where the population of the endangered Asian elephant is increasing, due to strict anti-poaching laws and conservation efforts.

The country's wild elephant numbers have doubled to over 300 animals in the past three decades.

Vaccination programs in 'race against time' to contain Delta variant, experts warn

- The highly contagious Delta variant is <u>causing</u> a surge in new COVID-19 cases even in countries with high vaccination rates -- and experts warn that immunization campaigns are in a race against time to contain it.
- In Indonesia, <u>over a dozen fully vaccinated doctors have died of COVID-19</u>, a medical association said Friday, as the Southeast Asian country battles a rash of severe cases in inoculated medical workers, the Delta variant and other highly infectious new virus strains.
- The National Task Force Against COVID-19 on Friday <u>said</u> it is confident that it will reach the "important milestone" of administering over 10 million jabs before the month of June is out.

- Dr. Rontgene Solante said this amid the delayed delivery of 50,000 doses of Sputnik V "due to ongoing upgrades and latest developments. The doses were intended as the second shot for those who have been inoculated with the Russian-made vaccine early in June.


