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DENR Earth Day clean up nets 2,000 kilos of

waste

OVER 200 government employees of the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) in the City of San Fernando and partner agencies converged in a fun run and cleanup activity in support of the annual celebration of the Earth Day.

The group collected over 2,000 kilos of solid waste from canals and creeks within the Diosdado Macapagal Government Center in Pampanga.

The event, dubbed as "KapaligiRUN: Kalinisan at Kalusugan, Dahil Ikaw, Ako, Tayo ang Kalikasan," was a plogging activity that combined running with cleaning and picking up of trash.

DENR Assistant Regional Director for Technical Services Arthur Salazar noted that the activity called for strategic partnership and cooperation among government agencies to uphold environmental protection and sustainability.

He said the initiative was a value-adding component to the government's continued efforts to clean and rehabilitate creeks, tributaries and river systems that drain to the Manila Bay.

Joint Letter to President Duterte and DENR Secretary Sampulna: PUT CONSERVATION FIRST IN MASUNGI & THE UPPER MARIKINA WATERSHED

We, concerned leaders, experts, and citizens, appeal to Philippine President Rockigo R. Duterte and Department of Environment and Natural Resources. Acting Secretary Jim O. Sampulna, to immediately cancel the Mineral Production Sharing Agreements found within the Upper Marikina River Basin Protected Landscape (UMRBPL, Presidential Produmation 295) and the Unnamed National Park (Presidential Produmation 1636).

According to Section 18 of the e-NIPAS Act (RA 11038), mineral exploration, mining, and quarrying are prohibited inside protected areas. In addition, based on documents from the Mines and Geosciences Bureau (MGB) itself, the subject quarry companies have committed "gross violations constituting breach in their contracts".

We believe these are more than enough grounds to ment the expedicious cancellation of the said MPSAs. We are deeply concerned that despite the orders from former CENR Secretary Roy A. Cimatu to cancel the MPSAs, no formal cancellation has been issued by the DENR for two years hence and until his resignation. We condemn the reported moves of cartain efficials to approve similarly harmful and contradictory activities inside the protected area, such as the construction and operation of certain swimming pool resorts that disrupt and divert waterways inside the critical watershed.

It is know, and disheartening that instead of canceling the quarying agreements and removing flegal permanent structures, there are now threats of removing the avard-asinning reforestation work of the Massingi Georgianie Foundation in the area.

In the period 2014 to 2018, the Manila Observatory found a persistent decliner in the tree-covered areas of the UMRSPL despite its most recent proclamation as a protected area in 2011, independent scientific studies estimate the remaining forest cover of the Upper Marikina Watershed to be 19.4% in 2006 and only 11 % in 2021. This dire situation could significantly worsen the extent of flooding in low-lying reaches of the Upper Marikina Watershed, including the cities and communities of Metro Manila and Rizal Province.

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Legarda wants stricter implementation of Solid Waste Law

Senatorial aspirant Loren Legarda pushed for a stricter implementation of Republic Act No. 9003, or the Ecological Solid Waste Management (ESWM) Law.

"It is lamentable that years after the measure was enacted into law, compliance rate is still very low," Legarda said.

Legarda added that she remains optimistic that more LGUs will be able to properly implement the law.

"We have allocated funds for capacity building programs and concerned government agencies are also looking into LGUs that are not compliant so that legal actions may be undertaken," she added.

Furthermore, all LGUs should have a solid waste management plan, which should be submitted to and approved by the NSWMC.

More importantly, the law dictates that there should be mandatory segregation of waste at source and a "no segregation, no collection" policy. All barangays should have a materials recovery facility (MRF), where waste materials are sorted for composting and recycling and the residual waste will be brought to sanitary landfills.





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"There are very few LGUs that have effectively and efficiently complied with the ESWM Law. The fact that there are compliant LGUs only means that it is doable and there is no reason why other LGUs could not follow suit. I hope our leaders will have the political will to implement the law at full speed," Legarda concluded.

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Legarda shares tips to protect environment through daily practice



Senatorial aspirant Loren Legarda shared how she has been incorporating her advocacies on environmental protection and climate change mitigation in her daily practice, hoping that more people would be inspired to do the same.

"I wish to share how each individual can be part of the effective implementation of our laws. These practices do not demand much from us. In fact, many of these can immediately be practiced as soon as today. It has every bit of potential to become second nature to us. We just have to take that first crucial step of actually taking action," said Legarda.

Legarda added that people should eat more local, plant-based food, noting that food that comes from distant places utilizes more energy for transportation and preservation, therefore resulting to greater carbon emission.

"I plant vegetables in my garden so I am able to eat them fresh. We should encourage families to plant vegetables in their backyards or community vacant lots, or to cultivate pinakbetgardens to provide food on the table and address the needs of growing numbers of malnourished children," she said.

She also said that traditional energy and water conservation measures remain relevant—use low-wattage appliances, turn off and unplug electronics when not in use, turn off lights when leaving a room, open curtains for natural lighting, gather and store rainwater for daily chores, turn off faucets properly, repair leaking pipes and running toilets immediately, and other similar practices.

Moreover, energy- and cost-efficient transport modes, like walking, biking, taking public transport, and carpooling, should be considered whenever possible.

She likewise stressed the importance of practicing ecological solid waste management, starting with segregation at source.

"Every household should have separate trash cans for biodegradable and food waste, recyclables or residual waste, and special or hazardous waste, including busted lamps, radio and cellphone batteries; while paper that can be recycled should be placed flat in a box or in a paper bag," Legarda added.

Bring containers when going to market or the grocery to avoid using plastic bags. Reusable containers can be used in purchasing fish, meat and other poultry products; while bayong and reusable cloth bags can be used for other items.

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Davao hazard maps showcased in weeklong Earth Day celebration

DAVAO CITY – As a guide for businesses and potential property buyers here, the city government has issued hazard maps indicating disaster risks for specific areas.

Ivan Cortez, the city planning and development Office (CPDO) coordinator, said Monday the maps aim to guide the public on which locations offer the best deal for their investments.

"We want the people to be aware of the current hazards already mapped in our zoning ordinance such as landslide-prone areas, areas that are prone to flooding, areas that are prone to storm surge, and areas that are within the fault line," Cortez said.

The maps can be viewed at the exhibit organized by the CPDO and City Environment and Natural Resources Office (CENRO) in SM City Ecoland until April 28.

Apart from the maps, local government offices also post information on the efforts being implemented to address environmental damage.

Cortez said the activities allow Dabawenyos to mitigate the risks they might face due to climate change.

The exhibit also allows Dabawenyos to learn some interesting facts about the 2013 zoning ordinance, which includes the declaration of Shrine Hills as an Urban Ecological Enhancement Sub-Zone.

Cortez said the ecological zone "will start providing something of a lung to the urban center because we cannot allow the entire area to be a concrete jungle. We also need the real jungle to be within us as we continue to enjoy living in Davao City."

To institutionalize greening initiatives, he said the city government also requires every subdivision project "and every commercial institutional project to have 10 percent of their total area devoted to greening."

"We are part of the solution. Everything that we do will always redound to something that will destroy or benefit the environment. The choice is ours," Cortez said.

The exhibit also intends to solicit suggestions from the public to further improve the environmental and infrastructure services of the city government. (PNA)

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50 years of Earth Day: Celebrating gains

The celebration of Earth Day last Friday in the Philippines was muted by the election campaign noise, while in other parts of the world, matters of war or the rising cost of living dominated concerns over environmental problems.

It's been 50 years since the International Mother Earth Day became a global movement. In 1972, the UN Conference on Human Development in Stockholm first raised the protection of the human environment as a major issue. The broad framework of action agreed then became the basis for a more detailed platform in 1992 in Rio de Janeiro where the sustainable approach to environment protection was agreed on.

We live in a world today that is far more endangered than half a century ago, but awareness continues to be high and growing despite the many different distractions that from time to time divert people's attention from the task of protecting and saving Earth.

For the Philippines, the more apparent need to focus attention to the environment is brought about by the prevalence of stronger and more destructive typhoons, likewise of hotter summers. Many now believe that this change in climate conditions is an issue that should be tackled with more resources and commitment.

Where the feeling of powerlessness was once dominant, humans are now inspired and being galvanized to act. Never has there been a time when so much science is being utilized to understand weather conditions and to devise ways of avoiding and dealing with damage from natural disasters.

More importantly, never has there been a time when innovation is the overriding force in developing new technologies that can provide solutions to the phenomenon of global warming caused by excessive carbon emissions in the atmosphere.

Collective action

As UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres noted in commemorating 50 years of Earth Day, "we have seen what is possible when we act as one." People's efforts over the last decades have yielded quite remarkable feats. According to Guterres, "We have shrunk the ozone hole. We have expanded protections for wildlife and ecosystems. We have ended the use of leaded fuel, preventing millions of premature deaths. And just last month, we have launched a landmark global effort to prevent and end plastic pollution."

We must add to these achievements the unmistakable tide against the use of finite fuels for power generation and transportation as nations adopt programs that lean to and direct more use of renewable energies in the coming years.

Wind and solar are just two of the emerging technologies for power generation that clearly are winning the war against fossil fuels, even if and when global crude oil prices normalize.

Such renewable energies have also inspired the shift of personal mobility from combustion engines to electric engines. We are seeing the production and sales of more electric cars and electric bikes, the former becoming even cheaper than the current gas and diesel vehicles.

Food production, similarly, is slowly embracing sustainability and healthier tenets. Agriculture is increasingly cognizant of the damage that can be done to the environment due to the use of chemical fertilizers and pesticides, or the razing of forest lands to support industrial commodity farming.





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A growing community of "smart" eaters recognize the need to support farms that produce food sustainably while protecting the environment, while also preaching against the practices of commercial farms that "waste" produce that do not meet the standards of mass consumers or when farmgate prices are too low.

There are so many other stories: plastics and disposable diapers made into bricks or road pavers, abandoned coal mines replanted with indigenous trees and vegetation, better light bulbs to replace incandescent, and the emerging technology to capture carbon dioxide from the air on a commercial scale.

People have put their hearts and minds into finding solutions to repairing the damage done to Earth. By putting together such collective efforts, it was possible to introduce remedies to the triple planetary crisis of climate disruption, nature and biodiversity loss, and pollution and waste.

During his video message for Earth Day 2022, Guterres said, "This triple crisis is threatening the well-being and survival of millions of people around the world. The building blocks of happy, healthy lives – clean water, fresh air, a stable and predictable climate – are in disarray, putting the Sustainable Development Goals in jeopardy."

For Earth Day 2022, the rallying cry for those who care is Invest in Our Planet. It's a call not only to the youth, but also for businesses to continue tackling the monumental challenges of restoring back Earth's health.

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'Bike Action for Climate' takes off in Davao

DAVAO CITY: At least 40 bikers from different groups here participated in Davao Bike Action for Climate simultaneously held across the Philippines and Asia on Sunday, April 24.

The route of the bike ride started at Freedom Park along Roxas Avenue to MacArthur Highway, Quimpo Boulevard and back.

In its report, Davao Sustainable Movement (DSM) said that through bike riding, the organizers and participants expressed their solidarity and demands to highlight the gravity of the climate crisis and the urgency of bold, ambitious, just and equitable climate solutions.

The activity also aims to raise awareness of the worsening impacts of climate change and to pressure governments and corporations to take urgent and necessary actions.

The group also demanded an urgent resolution to various local environmental issues in the city such as refusing dirty energy, rejecting waste-to-energy incineration and investing in true zero waste solutions.

DSM are also calling on the city to increase green spaces in the city, saving heritage trees, urban wetlands and watersheds.

Rara Ada, campaign coordinator of the Philippine Movement for Climate Justice, said that it is high time for highly-urbanized cities such as Davao to intensify their support for renewable and clean energy and stop dependence on deadly fossil fuels, improve their roads to be conducive for bikers and pedestrians and invest more in green infrastructure.

Ada said this effort will ultimately help in the fight against climate change.

Interfacing Development Interventions for Sustainability Executive Director lawyer Mark Peñalver said that cities are now becoming major sources of higher carbon emissions due to unsustained development in the area of transportation, infrastructure, energy and industry.

He said cities should improve public transportation and cut travel time and time spent on the road to reduce carbon emitted by vehicles.

He added that cities should invest more in green infrastructure and incorporate nature-based designs in order to mitigate flooding and reduce the urban heat island effect by increasing green spaces.

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PH bats for climate financing to nations vulnerable to global warming

Asia-Pacific nations should forge stronger partnerships to address the impact of changing climate by making climate financing available and accessible to developing countries that bear the brunt of global warming, the

Philippines' top climate official said.

Climate Change Commission Secretary Robert Borje made this pronouncement during the 4th Asia-Pacific Water Summit in Kumamoto City, Japan, on Sunday, April 24.

In his speech, Borje noted that every country was responsible for formulating and implementing water development strategies and trajectories in the era of climate change – up to the last mile, up to the last person.

"To this end, we need climate financing. Make it more accessible and available. Unlock it for the developing world," he said.

"This is not a plea for handouts, Excellencies, ladies, and gentlemen. This is an urgent call for a responsible partnership. We want to contribute more, but we in the developing world need to help ourselves first," he added.

According to Borje, the core of climate change adaptation and mitigation is climate justice and underscored that more should be done to the least responsible for climate change and with the least resources and the most exposed and vulnerable.

"Through the 4th Asia Pacific Water Summit, the Philippines hopes this message is heard clearly and acted on urgently," he said.

The Filipino official raised the Philippines' experience following the onslaught of recent series of typhoons in the country.

He particularly mentioned Tropical Depression Agaton, which inundated large swaths of the Visayas region at the height of summer and displaced many residents. He noted that the total damage was estimated at \$1.6 billion, representing the country's health insurance budget for around 60 percent of the total population.

"The narrative can still be transformed: from frustration and desperation to one of action and inspiration," Borje said.





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"This is where climate justice becomes relevant in what we do - a guiding light towards a more informed collaboration among our nations so that our peoples, across generations, will be equipped to restore and ensure the quality of and access to water for all - as a matter of life - a dignified life," he added.

Borje's speech echoed President Duterte's pronouncement in his Talk to the People last week, where he stressed that wealthy countries must be held accountable for erratic severe weather events caused by climate change drivers that caused damage and destruction to developing nations like the Philippines.

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Due to foul smell: CH shuts down waste management firm

CEBU, Philippines — Cebu City Mayor Michael Rama has ordered the issuance of a cease-and-desist order against Bio-Nutrient Waste Management, Incorporated, acting on complaints of offensive smell found to be coming from the company's composting facility in Barangay Inayawan.

"What is needed and urgent is for them to cease operating. And definitely, they will be made to do this and that. As your mayor, I cannot be waiting with our constituency howling, making an outcry on the indescribable, filthy, obnoxious odor," Rama said.

Residents nearby have been complaining over the past week about the smell, which has reportedly worsened lately.

After a series of site inspections conducted by the Cebu City Environment and Natural Resources Office (CCENRO), Department of Public Services (DPS), and the City Environmental Sanitation Enforcement Team (CESE in Inayawan, the city found out that the smell originated from the private composting facility of Bio Nutrient Waste Management Inc.

The facility handles biodegradable market wastes.

"Mga kuan siya, tae sa manok, and kanang tinae... Mao toy naka-cause og baho kaayo labi na kaning tinae sa manok, grabeng baho, nag-juice naman siya," said CESET's head, Grace Luardo.

Luardo said someone called their office to complain about the foul smell, albeit the person could not determine the exact source of the odor.

"Naa gyuy nanawag namo kay di na nila maagwanta ang kabaho... hadlok sila nga masakit sila, ing-ana," Luardo said.

Acting on the complaint, CESET personnel went to the area and found more residents complaining.

"Pag-adto nato, daghan gyung nanuol. Lipay sila ug nagpasalamat pud nga naaksyonan gyud dayon," Luardo said.

Right after investigation, CESET issued a citation for air pollution that is hazardous to health.

The company will have to report to CCENRO after receiving the citation.

"Muado pa na sila sa CCENRO, mu-meet pa na sila sa gi-assign and mo-checkup pa na sa sila didto kay dili ra citation ang order ni mayor gud," Luardo said.

CCENRO head, Engr. Editha Pero, for her part, said they have invited the facility officials to a meeting to discuss the situation.

This is the first time that the facility received a complaint.

"Sa akong pagkahibawo, taud-taud na gyud na sila diha and sa akong knowledge, karon pa pud sila nakadawat ug complaint. Sa time nga naa na kos DPS, and katong sa CCENRO pa ko, mao pa niy nitumaw nga complaint sa ilaha," said DPS head, Atty. Jigo Dacua.





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The facility serves only private clients and does not serve the city.

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A call to invest in nature

There are a number of ways by which we can show our "investments."

First, let us invest in behavior and lifestyle modification. Global food waste, for example, is responsible for 6-8 percent of greenhouse gas emissions. This, in addition to making more food available for those who are in need, is a tradeoff we make if we are not prudent in our consumption.

Everyday decisions, such as minimizing the use of plastics, can mean a lot in turning the tide in our campaign against marine litter. Reducing the volume of our wardrobe and the frequency we buy new clothes is another way we can make a difference. The fashion industry alone is responsible for 2.1 billion metric tons of GHG emissions in 2018 or 4 percent of the global total. This is equivalent to the same quantity of emissions of the entire economies of France, Germany and the UK combined!

Second, let us invest in risk-informed planning and development. Decisions on location of settlements, industries, city centers; and the way we plan spatial development in cities, greening our infrastructure can mean a lot in preventing lives and saving costs through efficiency gains. Mapping of hazards and exposure of population and assets, and providing alternatives and development controls, zoning regulations can save the government billions of dollars of losses and damages from powerful typhoons and earthquakes.

Third, let us ensure financing is geared towards sustainability. This means ensuring that capital is channeled towards investments that either do no harm or result in positive impacts on environment. There are available tools to guide decision making on this, and metrics to guide us in measuring results. This entails the active application of environment, social and governance (ESG) principles; aligning with the Sustainable Finance Roadmap and ensuring each project is evaluated against social and environmental impacts. There are big wins in doing this – the Better Business Better World Report of UNDP has estimated that around \$82 trillion in investment opportunity and 4.4 million new jobs will be created if directed towards those in support of SDG positive investments.

Lastly, all of these will not happen without an environmentally aware citizenry and supportive leadership. At this crucial time, we enjoin all Filipinos to make their voices heard and advocate for environmental sustainability and sustainability financing as priority agenda for the country's path for development. The clock is ticking, and every second of inaction may cause us generations lost.

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Can we heal the damage we have already done to the Earth?

Is it possible to heal the damage we have already done to the Earth? - Anthony, 13



Sometimes it may seem that humans have altered the Earth beyond repair. But our planet is an incredible system in which energy, water, carbon and so much else flows and nurtures life. It is about 4.5 billion years old and has been through enormous changes.

At some points in Earth's history, fires burned over large areas. At others, much of it was covered with ice. There also have been mass extinctions that wiped out nearly every living thing on its surface.

Our living planet is incredibly resilient and can heal itself over time. The problem is that its self-healing systems are very, very slow. The Earth will be fine, but humans' problems are more immediate.

People have damaged the systems that sustain us in many ways. We have polluted air and water, strewn plastic and other trash on land and in oceans and rivers, and destroyed habitats for plants and animals.

But we know how to help natural processes clean up many of these messes. And there has been a lot of progress since people started waking up to these problems 50 years ago.





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There still are problems to solve. Some pollutants, like plastic, last for thousands of years, so it's much better to stop releasing them than to try to collect them later. And extinction is permanent, so the only effective way to reduce it is to be more careful about protecting animals, plants and other species.

Reversing climate change

The most serious damage humans are doing to the Earth comes mainly from burning coal, oil and gas, which is dramatically warming its climate. Burning these carbon-based fuels is changing the fundamental chemistry and physics of the air and oceans.

Every lump of coal or gallon of gasoline that's burned releases carbon dioxide into the atmosphere. There it heats the Earth's surface, causing floods, fires and droughts. Some of this added carbon dioxide dissolves into the oceans and makes them more acidic, which threatens ocean food webs.

Climate change is a problem that will get worse until humans stop making it worse—and then it will take many centuries for the climate to return to what it was like before the Industrial Revolution, when human actions started altering it on a large scale.

The only way to avoid making things worse is to stop setting carbon on fire. That means societies need to work hard to build an energy system that can help everyone live well without the need to burn carbon.

The good news is that we know how to make energy without releasing carbon dioxide and other pollution. Electricity made from solar, wind and geothermal power is now the cheapest energy in history. Cleaning up the global electricity supply and then electrifying everything can very quickly stop carbon pollution from getting worse.

This will require electric cars and trains, electric heating and cooking, and electric factories. We'll also need new kinds of transmission and storage systems to get all that clean electricity from where it's made to where it's used. The rest of the carbon mess can be cleaned up through better farm and forest management that stores carbon in land and plants instead of releasing it into the atmosphere. This is also a problem that scientists know how to solve.

The Earth will certainly heal, but it may take a very long time. The best way to start is with everyone doing their part to avoid making the damage any worse.

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Boracay rehab projects to continue even after Duterte's term

P1.9-billion circumferential road, removal of beach-encroaching structures among to be completed by 2023

ILOILO CITY—Several rehabilitation projects on Boracay Island will be continued after President Duterte steps down on June 30.

The projects will be implemented by concerned government agencies since the term of office of the Duterte-created Boracay Inter-Agency Task Force (BIATF), which manages the island's rehabilitation, will end also in June, according to Martin Jose Despi, general manager of the Boracay Inter-Agency Rehabilitation and Management Group, the implementing body of the task force.

Despi said among the major rehabilitation projects that would still be completed was the clearing of structures encroach-

ing on the beachfront, the main road and on forest lands.

The BIATF is targeting the removal of 38 remaining structures encroaching on the 30-meter beach easement by June.

These include seven commercial properties, six big residential structures and 25 houses by local inhabitants.

Around 158 structures encroaching on the road easement along the island's circumferential road have yet to be removed. These are mostly residential structures along the road from City Mall to Barangay Yapak, Despi said.

The City Mall-Yapak road section is under Phase 4 of the rehabilitation of the 21.64-kilometer circumferential road, costing P1.94 billion.

pervise Boracay's rehabilitation in 2018. Its term was supposed to end in May 2020 but Mr. Duterte extended it twice until June 30.

Bida issue still unresolved

The creation of the controversial Boracay Island Development Authority (Bida), intended to replace the BIATF as a permanent body, is still pending in Congress. The House of Representatives last year approved a bill that provides for the creation of Bida as a corporate body but counterpart bills are still pending in the Senate.

The Bida bill is being opposed by Aklan officials and various sectors because it will create a government-owned and-controlled corporation with corporate powers.

The circumferential road is the main access connecting the three villages of the island—Manoc-Manoc, Balabag and Yapak. Phase 3 was completed last month while Phase 4 is targeted to be completed in 2023.

Despi said unfinished projects will be implemented by various agencies and by the local governments—the municipality of Malay and Aklan province—when the BIATF's term ends.

The BIATF was formed to su-

tourists from April 26 to Oct. 25, 2018, to undergo rehabilitation after Mr. Duterte called the island-resort a "cesspool" due to problems on pollution, unregulated development and other environmental concerns.

During the closure, thousands of workers and residents lost their jobs or livelihood. Many businesses shut down or suspended operations.

The island had just recovered when it was closed to tourists several times over the course of two years since March 2020 due to the coronavirus pandemic. The island has reopened since the start of the year to fully vaccinated travelers and has been bursting at the seams with tourists eager to resume leisure travel held back by the pandemic. INQ

50 years of Earth Day: Celebrating gains

The celebration of Earth Day last Friday in the Philippines was muted by the election campaign noise, while in other parts of the world, matters of war or the rising cost of living dominated concerns over environmental problems.

It's been 50 years since the International Mother Earth Day became a global movement. In 1972, the UN Conference on Human Development in Stockholm first raised the protection of the human environment as a major issue. The broad framework of action agreed then became the basis for a more detailed platform in 1992 in Rio de Janeiro where

the sustainable approach to environment protection was agreed on. We live in a world today that is far

more endangered than half a century ago, but awareness continues to be high and growing despite the many different distractions that from time to time divert people's attention from the task of protecting and saving Earth.

For the Philippines, the more apparent need to focus attention to the

environment is brought about by the prevalence of stronger and more destructive typhoons, likewise of hotter summers Many now believe that this change in climate conditions is an issue that should be tackled with more resources and

Where the feeling of powerlessness was once dominant, humans are now inspired and being galvanized to act.

Never has there been a time when so much science is being utilized to understand weather conditions and to devise ways of avoiding and dealing with damage from natural disasters.

More importantly, never has there been a time when innovation is the overriding force in developing new technologies that can provide solutions to the phenomenon of global warming caused by excessive carbon emissions in the atmosphere.

Collective action

As UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres noted in commemorating 50 years of Earth Day, "we have seen what is possible when we act as one." People's efforts over the last decades have yielded quite remarkable feats. According to Guterres, "Ve have shrunk the ozone hole. We have expanded protections for wildlife and ecosystems. We have ended the use of leaded fuel, preventing millions of premature deaths. And just last month, we have launched a landmark global effort to prevent and end plastic pollution."

We must add to these achievements the unmistakable tide against the use of finite fuels for power generation and transportation as nations adopt programs that lean to and direct more use of renewable energies in the coming years.

Wind and solar are just two of the emerging technologies for power generation that clearly are winning the war against fossil fuels, even if and when global crude oil prices normalize.

Such renewable energies have also inspired the shift of personal mobility from combustion engines to electric engines. We are seeing the production and sales of more electric cars and electric bikes, the former becoming even cheaper than the current gas and diesel vehicles.

Food production, similarly, is slowly embracing sustainability and healthier tenets. Agriculture is increasingly cognizant of the damage that can be done to the environment due to the use of chemical fertilizers and pesticides, or the razing of forest lands to support industrial commodity farming.

A growing community of "smart" eaters recognize the need to support farms that produce food sustainably while protecting







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the environment, while also preaching against the practices of commercial farms that "waste" produce that do not meet the standards of mass consumers or when farmgate prices

There are so many other stories: plastics and disposable diapers made into bricks or road pavers, abandoned coal mines replanted with indigenous trees and vegetation, better light bulbs to replace incandescent, and the emerging technology to capture carbon dioxide from the air on a commercial scale.

People have put their hearts and minds into finding solutions to repairing the damage done to Earth. By putting together such collective efforts, it was possible to introduce remedies to the triple planetary crisis of climate disruption, nature and biodiversity loss, and pollution and waste.

During his video message for Earth Day 2022, Guterres said, "This triple crisis is threatening the well-being and survival of millions of people around the world. The building blocks of happy, healthy lives - clean water, fresh air, a stable and predictable climate - are in disarray, putting the Sustainable Development Goals in jeopardy."

For Earth Day 2022, the rallying cry for those who care is Invest in Our Planet. It's a call not only to the youth, but also for businesses to continue tackling the monumental challenges of restoring back Earth's health.

House, Senate probes sought on IP issues highlighted in Bukidnon shooting

RESOLUTIONS have been filed in both chambers of Congress seeking investigations on a shooting incident in Bukidnon province during a protest activity of an indigenous peoples (IP) community that was attended by labor leader and presidential candidate Leodegario "Ka Leody" de Guzman on April 19.

"This violence and the attacks against indigenous people have been ongoing with impunity for quite some time now without resolution and proper intervention by the government," Bayan Muna Party-list representatives said in House Resolution 2561.

Five members of the Manobo-Pulangihon IP community in Quezon town were injured after private security personnel shot at the group. The police regional office said last week that charges have been filed against the suspects.

"The recent shooting incident that includes the party of Ka Leody de Guzman is emblematic of how our justice system continues to fail them, an act which members of Congress should not countenance," they added.

The Manobo-Pulangihon are asserting their claim on their ancestral domain, which

they said has been illegally taken by a private firm that grows and exports pineapples.

Meanwhile Senator Ana Theresia "Risa"

Meanwhile, Senator Ana Theresia "Risa" N. Hontiveros-Baraquel has also filed a Senate resolution to probe the land-grabbing allegation.

"Land disputes have been a longstanding issue in our country that often end in violence," she said in a statement on Monday.

"Such incidents are repeated because we do not have a proper policy that will finally end the violence, especially against our indigenous people."

"It's time we have proper legislation that can address this," she added. — **Alyssa Nicole O. Tan**

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BBM unveils environment initiatives; eyes IT-based Disaster Risk Information Roadmap

COMPREHENSIVE Internetbased Disaster Risk Information Roadmap as part of a program to protect the general population and environment from the illeffects of natural disasters is on the agenda of presidential frontrunner Ferdinand "Bongbong" Marcos Jr. if he is elected in the May 9 polls.

In a news statement, Marcos bared plans to replicate and use as model the United Nation Disaster Risk Reduction (UNDRR) system.

Under such program, UNDRRhas comprehensive information on all dimensions of disaster risk, including hazards, exposure, vulnerability and capacity, related to persons, communities, organizations and countries and their assets.

The road map will be implemented through an IT program accessible in all parts of the country, the former senator said.

"This is very important to protect our environment as we institute programs to balance economic gains and environment," said Marcos.

In UNDRR, disasterriskinformation includes all studies, information

and mapping required to understand ing risk factors.

Earlier, Marcoscited environment protection and preservation as part of his priority program, as he stressed the need to institute policy reforms and programs that create a peaceful balance between economic development and the environment.

"Nature has its rights that should be protected. It should be allowed to flourish, reproduce and attain its abundance side-by-side with human civilization in perfect balance and harmony with our growing communities," he said in a recent sidelines interview while on a provincial sortie.

"We should do this if we want to safeguard the most vulnerable members of our society from the onslaught of natural calamities," he added.

Among his plans is to create the Department of Disaster Resilience, taking the US Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) as an effective model of disaster resilience that integrates many other agencies.

Promoting reforestation and the disaster risk drivers and underly-pushing for stricter anti-illegal logging law will also be given priority in a Marcos administration, as he will push industrial forest plantations to supply market demand for wood.

> Inmining, Marcossaidhisadministration will forge a collaborative relationship with all stakeholders to guard against abuse, and ensure mining helps the economy recover from the pandemic.

> He is also eyeing a Department of Water and Resources Management to ensure that clean and potable water is available to every Filipino.

> Marcos vowed to also focus on solid waste management including "waste to energy programs" that he deems an income-generating initiative of his administration.

> Likewise, the presidential frontrunnersaidhe plans to create an ecology-based Disaster Risk Reduction program that should be addressed from the point of view of environmental degradation especially on forests, wetlands, coastal and marine and dry lands.

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

MANILA – The country's daily average Covid-19 cases went down to 209 from April 18 to April 24 or 12 percent lower than the new infections prior to the week in review, the Department of Health (DOH) reported Monday.

In its latest case bulletin, the DOH said there are 1,456 new cases of the coronavirus in the recent week.

For the same period, there were no cases added to the tally of severe and critical infections, which stood at 726.

Only 16.9 percent or 479 out of the 2,841 intensive care unit (ICU) beds in the country are used while 16.9 percent or 4,112 out of 24,309 non-ICU beds are utilized.

Meanwhile, there were 213 verified deaths recorded during the past week.

About 74.98 percent of the country's target population has been vaccinated against Covid-19.

The DOH also reported that 76.35 percent of the senior citizens have been inoculated against the disease.

The elderly group is composed of 8,721,357 individuals while the country's target population for inoculation is 80 percent (90,005,357 individuals) of the country's entire population.

As of April 22, DOH data showed 67,485,479 individuals are fully vaccinated while 12,939,274 people have received their booster shots. (PNA)

MANILA, Philippines — The Philippines recorded 1,465 new COVID-19 cases and verified 213 deaths from April 18 to 24, the Department of Health said Monday.

The daily average during that period was 209 infections, which was 12% lower than a week earlier.

Local health authorities have registered over 3.68 million COVID-19 cases since the pandemic started in 2020.

There are currently 726 patients with severe or critical illness, which represent 12.7% of the country's total COVID-19 admissions.

According to the DOH, 16.9% of 2,841 intensive care unit beds nationwide have been used, while 16.9% of 24,309 non-ICU beds have been utilized as of Tuesday.

Of the 217 deaths verified during the past week, 31 occurred from April 11 to 24.

More than 67.4 million Filipinos have completed vaccination against COVID-19. Of the figure, only 12.9 million people have received booster shots.

The country on Monday began administering second COVID-19 booster shots to immunocompromised individuals. The government targets to give around 690,000 immunocompromised people with additional protection against the virus.

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Philippines rolls out 2nd COVID-19 booster shots to immunocompromised

MANILA, Philippines — The Philippines on Monday began administering second COVID-19 booster shots to immunocompromised individuals in a bid to provide Filipinos additional protection against the virus.

The Philippine Children's Medical Center in Quezon City, Dr. Jose Rodriguez Memorial Hospital (Tala) in Caloocan City, Valenzuela Medical Center, and the local government of Makati are scheduled to give second booster doses to vulnerable sectors, the Department of Health said in a message to reporters.

More vaccination sites will start administering second booster shots in the coming days. The National Vaccination Operations Center targets to give additional protection to around 690,000 immunocompromised individuals. Immunocompromised individuals are defined as those with or are:


- Immunodeficiency
- HIV
- Active cancer
- Transplant recipients
- · Undergoing steroid treatment
- Bedridden

According to the DOH, the initial rollout aims to reach approximately 1 to 2% of the target, or about 7,000 to 13,000 individuals. Then, local government units will take the lead in expanding the rollout.

The Food and Drug Administration earlier authorized a second booster shot for senior citizens, immunocompromised individuals and health workers. For immunocompromised individuals, the second booster shot should be administered at least three months after the first booster dose.

More than 66 million Filipinos have completed vaccination against COVID-19. Of the figure, only around 12 million have gotten booster shots.


