New mask order to reduce wastes by 50% – DENR exec

N official of the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) on Thursday said that the lifting of the mandatory use of masks will reduce the accumulation of waste by 50 percent.

DENR Environmental Management Bureau (EMB) Director William Cuñado also recommended the use of reusable masks. "It will help greatly in the reduction in the volume of face masks. Assuming at least 50 percent of the population will not use face masks, that will be a good contribution in terms of the reduction of the solid waste or infectious wastes," Cuñado şaid.

President Ferdinand "Bongbong" Marcos Jr. issued Executive Order (EO) 3 making mask wearing optional in open spaces or non-crowded outdoor, areas with good ventilation.

"In terms of solid waste volume, this will greatly reduce the volume of the masks that will be disposed of or stored in our sanitary landfill area after the treatment," Cuñado added.

He said that the DENR recommends the use of reusable masks such as cloth masks.

"For us, it will be advisable to use washable masks," he added.

Under EO 3, senior citizens and immunocomprovaised individuals are highly encouraged to wear masks.

Masks remain mandatory indoors when riding public transportation and in outdoor settings where physical distancing cannot be maintained.

CMA CGM, Plastic Flamingo renew waste deal

FRENCH shipping company CMA CGM Group and social enterprise Plastic Flamingo on Thursday said they have renewed a partnership to reuse trash and ease plastic pollution in Metro Manila.

In three years, the project aims to collect and reuse 600 metric tons of plastic waste from the streets, coastlines and the Pasig River in the capital region, they said in a statement.

The Plastic Flamingo will collect and reuse riverine plastic, which requires more cleaning and handling to separate from marine debris.

The plastics will join the hard-to-recycle plastic sachets on the CMA CGM-funded recycling line to be transformed into eco-planks and boards.

The partnership was first launched in 2021 in the Philippines, where single-use plastics are a major source of ocean pollution. — LMJCJ

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PBBM's speech at UN to tackle economic policies, climate

change

PRESIDENT Ferdinand
"Bongbong" R. Marcos
Jr. is set to tackle pressing
international concerns such as
climate change and the country's
economic policies during his
speech before members of the
United Nations (UN) when he flies
to New York next week.

Likewise, he will also try to attract potential foreign investors

during the brief US visit to help the country achieve its goals in food



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security, energy security and sustainable economic development, among others.

Marcos is expected to fly to the US this Sunday to participate in the UN General Assembly (UNGA) debate at approximately 3:15 to 3:30 in the afternoon, New York time next Tuesday.

The Department of Foreign Affairs (DFA) said the President will be discussing climate change, the rule of law and food security in his first ever address in the UNGA.

In a virtual press conference on Thursday, Press Secretary Beatrix "Trixie" Cruz-Angeles said Marcos is also expected to tackle his economic policies in his UNGA speech.

"We don't announce the details of the speech until it's actually been made. But in this case, the President's primary objective and in fact this means policy in his governance, in this administration, is economic recovery," Angeles said.

Around 152 heads of states are expected to participate in the event with the theme: "A Watershed Moment: Transformative Solutions to Interlocking Challenges."

Angles said they are still awaiting confirmation on whether Marcos will hold bilateral talks with the other participating state leaders.

Economic briefing

AFTER the UNGA event, Marcos will hold an economic briefing together with other members of the Philippine business delegation, to include Philippine private sector leaders.

"This briefing is expected to attract institutional investors, senior corporate executives, business analysts, and even academic think tanks and entrepreneurs," Foreign Affairs Assistant Secretary Jose Victor Chan-Gonzaga said.

Marcos will also meet with members of the US Chamber of Commerce, the US-ASEAN Business Council, and the US-Philippine Society.

"At these engagements, he will be able to have wide-ranging and candid discussions with political, business and community leaders on raising the profile of the Philippines in the United States, contributing to the President's economic agenda and strengthening Philippine-US political, economic and cultural ties," Gonzaga said.

The President is expected to fly home on Sept. 24, 2022.

Marcos to tackle climate change, economic recovery at 77th UNGA in NY

PRESIDENT Ferdinand "Bongbong" Marcos Jr. will tackle climate change will tackle climate change and economic recovery, among others, when he addresses the 77th session of the United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) on September 20 in New York, the Department of Foreign Affairs (DFA) said yesterday.

In a virtual press briefing held jointly by the Office of the Press Secretary and the DFA, Foreign Affairs Assistant Secretary

fairs Assistant Secretary Kira Christianne Azucena Kira Christianne Azucena said the President is expected to deliver at 3:15 p.m. (New York time) the Philippine national statement before the 152 world leaders who will participate in the high-level meeting at the UN headquarters in New York.

With this year's theme

With this year's theme "A watershed moment: "A watershed moment: transformative solutions to interlocking challenges," Azucena said Marcos' statement is expected to identify these challenges and the solutions to address them, the role of the United Nations (UN), and how the Philippines intends to contribute to these efforts to build a "more sustainable and resilient world

for all". The UNGA's theme stems from the recognition that the world is at a critical moment in the history of the United Nations due to complex and interconnectcomplex and interconnected crises, including the COVID-19 pandemic, the war in Ukraine, humanitarian challenges of unprecedented nature, a tipping point in climate change as well as growing concerns about threats to the global economy, the UN said.

Marcos will also articulate his administration's priorities, such as the rule

priorities, such as the rule of law, energy security, food security, and sustainable economic development,

among others.
The President will take the opportunity to meet with other state leaders and ey UN officials on the side lines of the UNGA session.

lines of the UNGA session. The meeting, however, is still being arranged, the Assistant Secretary said. Regarding Marcos' meeting with US President Joe Biden, DFA Assistant Secretary Jose Victor Chan-Gonzaga said they are still in consultation with the White House and the Na-White House and the National Security Council (NSC) in Washington DC.
Azucena explained the

President's participation in the opening of the UNGA is "important" because it marks his first engagement

with the UN, which the Philippines recognizes as the world's most important multilateral organization. In the US program of activi-ties, the high-level general debate is the most important event politically because "this is where world leaders articulate policy statements on world affairs and inter-

on world arians and inter-national relations."

Chan-Gonzaga said

Marcos wanted his meet-ings with fellow world lead-ers and the United States corporations to focus on finding the necessary partnerships or synergies to benefit the Philippine economy and the Filipino peo-

The other most impor-tant speech that the Presi-dent will deliver in New York aside from his UNGA address will be at an economic briefing. This briefing is expected to attract institutional investors, senior corporate executives, business analysts, and even academic think tanks and entrepreneurs," Chan-

entrepreneurs," Chan-Gonzaga said.
He added the briefing will be an opportunity to outline the key economic priorities of the administration to expand and strengthen Philippine-US trade and investment.

interest to potential US investors and partners.

He is also set to partic-

He is also set to participate in top business executive meetings designed to promote the Philippines as an important emerging economy and investment destination in Asia.

Marcos is also expected to meet with the US Chamber of Commerce, the US-ASEAN Business Council, and the US-Philippine Society to raise the Philippines' profile in the US and contribute to the administration's economic agenda and strengthen the Philippine-US political, economic, and cultural ties.



In a Teleradyo interview on Thursday, Marikina Mayor Marcelino Teodoro said the program started on Wednesday and will run until Friday.

The captured rodents may be brought to the City Environment and Management Office (CEMO) headquarters, located at Gil Fernando Avenue in Barangay Sto. Nino between 9

a.m. to 4 p.m.
Each rat, dead or alive, that weighs 150 grams and above can be exchanged for PHP200 while smaller rats can also be surrendered for a smaller amount.

a smaller amount.

"Last Wednesday,
around 1,700 rats were
brought to the CEMO and
disposed of properly. We
disposed of them like we
were handling infectious
waste," Teodoro said.

As of Thursday, the city
government has collected
over 3,700 rats from residents.

He added that the city overnment has already government has already handed out close to PHP300,000 in exchange for these pests. The funds were initially

provided by the local gov-ernment but several private group sponsors also joined the initiative.

Teodoro said the manner of disposing of these pests is in line with the guidelines of the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) and the Department of Health (DOH).

Teodoro assured that the rats "undergo a proper method of collection, trans-

portation, and disposal."
The program which started in 2020 has generated more "hunters" now that more people have become aware of the program.

At present, Teodoro said there are only three cases of leptospirosis in Marikina City, of which two were identified as construction workers and one facto-

ry worker.

They were infected through floodwaters in their workplaces outside the city.

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We need to talk about (our lack of) water

Te're in the midst of the rainy season, so some might find it strange that I'm talking about a lack of what seems to be all around us: water.

Because we live in a tropical archipelago that sits directly on the typhoon belt, we tend to take water for granted. In fact, we tend to think that we have too much of it, if only because of the floods that beset us


This misconception that we have more than enough fresh water is a detriment to the agriculture industry. According to Ernesto Ordoñez, chairperson of Alyansa Agrikultura (AA) and president of the Water Security Movement, Inc. (WSM), said in his statement at this month's Philippine Chamber of Agriculture and Food Inc. (PCAFI) roundtable, "La Niña has arrived. Floods and crop damage will occur. Water is everywhere. But when drought comes, water is nowhere.

That is because we only have a dismal four percent water harvesting rate, compared to the

compared to the 60 percent rate in India's selected areas."

It may be hard to believe because of the heavy rains and occasional typhoons, but the country has a water crisis. Many smallholder farmers do not have access to irrigation facilities, and so have to completely rely on the annual rains to water their crops. This is part of why many farmers produce less than they are actually capable of cultivating. Not only does this lessen their income, it lessens local production in general, which affects the nation's food security, depriving Filipinos of the opportunity to buy local and reinforcing the country's need to rely on importation of even the most basic goods.

According to Ordoñez, "Aside from a food crisis, we have a water crisis. Fifty-five



He noted that though the National Irrigation Administration's (NIA) budget has been increased by \$\mathbb{P}9.2\$ billion next year for a total of \$\mathbb{P}40.8\$ billion, the agency tends to concentrate on larger irrigation projects, whereas smaller ones like Small Water Impounding Project (SWIP) tend to get overlooked, despite their larger ROI (Return on Investment).

According to the Bureau of Soils and Water Management page on the Gov.ph website, SWIP "is a structure constructed across a narrow depression or valley to hold back water and develop a reservoir that will store rainfall and run-off during the rainy season for immediate or future use," with projects classified as, "earthen dams with structural heights of not more than 30 meters and a volume storage not exceeding 50 million cubic meters."

Ordoñez cited a study of a ₱800,000 SWIP project covering 46 hectares conducted by Professor Ray Naval of Divisoria Norte, Quirino: "At ₱17,400 a hectare cost, return was an average ₱31,314, or 180 percent return (ROI). For regular irrigation costing

P300,000 a hectare, the return is P44,800 a hectare, or a 15 percent return (ROI). Therefore, the SWIP in this case yields 12 times the return of regular irrigation (180 percent/15 percent). For the additional P9.2 billion NIA will get next year, similar SWIPs should be considered instead of allocating all the extra funds to large irrigation projects."

Since a majority of Filipino farmers have small farms, smaller irrigation projects will be of more benefit to them. That it's cheaper to build and run and has the potential to be more useful than a bigger and more expensive irrigation system is a huge plus for everyone.

Ordoñez urged better coordination between agencies, as well as reiterating a recommendation from the authors of the National Water Roadmap for "the creation of a Dept. of Water, improved water harvesting, and the strengthening of the 18 major public-private River Basin Management Councils to implement the globally recognized Integrated Water Resource Management (IWRM) system."

Given all this, he stressed that, "Congress must therefore consider ROI when they review the budgets. It should also look at increasing the funding of the 18 River Basin Management Councils."

Don't be fooled by the rainy season. The Philippines is in dire need of proper water management. The sooner we can control our water crisis, the easier it will be to secure our food future.

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Tampakan seeks P397M from mining firm

HE local government of Tampakan town in South Cotabato province has demanded tax dues worth P397 million from Sagittarius Mines Inc. (SMI), the operator of a controversial \$5.9-billion mining project.

The mining firm, however, questioned the local government unit's (LGU) bid to collect the amount before a local court.

Tampakan Mayor Leonard Escobillo on Wednesday confirmed that they already received last week a copy of the civil case filed by the SMI against the LGU.

Escobillo earlier ordered the office of the municipal treasurer to review the taxes paid by all business establishments operating in the locality over the past few years.

According to the municipal treasurer's office, the SMI was found to have deficiencies for business tax from 2020 to 2022 and mayor's permit fees and other regulatory fees from 2013, to 2022.

Escobillo said the LGU is unfazed by the case filed by the SMI.

"We have sent them three notices to settle their tax obligations but to no avail. I am just implementing our local (tax) ordinance in effect since 2012," he added.

The LGU, according to the mayor, was willing to discuss a settlement but the SMI decided to bring the matter to court.

The Tampakan project is considered as the largest undeveloped copper-gold minefield in

Southeast Asia and among the largest of its kind in the world.

Based on a company study, the Tampakan project has the potential to yield an average of 375,000 tons of copper and 360,000 ounces of gold in concentrate per annum in the expected 17-year-life of the mine.

The national government granted the SMI a 25-year Financial and Technical Assistance Agreement (FTAA) that expired on March 21, 2020.

The mining firm sought and was granted a 12-year extension for the original FTAA, or until March 21, 2032, renewable for another 25 years.

The FTAA covers about 10,000

hectares straddling the towns of Tampakan in South Cotabato, Kiblawan in Davao del Sur and Columbio in Sultan Kudarat.

The project, however, has been staunchly opposed by the local Catholic Church and environmental groups on concerns over the environment, food security, health and human rights.

In 2010, the South Cotabato provincial government imposed a landmark ban on open-pit mining, the method that the SMI said is the most viable way to extract the deposits lying near the surface.

The ban hindered the bid of the mining company to proceed to commercial operation. In May 2022, the Sangguniang Panlalawigan of South Cotabato lifted the ban, removing the decade-old thorn in the throat of the SMI.

South Cotabato Gov. Reynaldo Tamayo Jr., however, vetoed the measure, thus the ban on openpit mining remains in effect across the province.

The Tampakan project has obtained an environmental compliance certificate from the Department of Environment and Natural Resources and a certification precondition from the National Commission on Indigenous Peoples, which are vital requirements to proceed to commercial mining operation.







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Web-based app to improve PH disaster response, rehab

overnment agencies led by the National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council (NDRRMC) has launched a web-based application that will assist local government units (LGUs) and other disaster response policy-makers to respond efficiently in times of natural calamities.

Dubbed as PlanSmart Ready to Rebuild, NDRRMC Executive Director Raymundo B. Ferrer said it is also designed to help LGUs to plan for disasters more efficiently and to build back better faster.

"We welcome the development of the PlanSmart Ready to Rebuild app and its support capacity building program as tools for our LGUs that are at the forefront of mitigating and managing disaster risks. This app, which will systematically generate RRPs using science-based information and pro-forma templates, will significantly help LGUs plan for quick and resilient recovery," said Ferrer.

Department of Science and Technology (DOST) Sec. Renator Solidum said the app speeds up the development of RRPs (rehabilitation and recovery plans) and supports evidence-based decision-making and planning for pre- and post-disaster events.

The app, which is an offshoot of the GeoRiskPH Integrated Platform developed by DOST and the Ready to Rebuild (R2R) Program led by OCD, enables LGUs to autogenerate an RRP through the use of a pro-forma document template.

"Through PlanSmart, it is my vision that we will have a geospatially-enabled Philippines where we evaluate data, time and location together for better analysis and decision-making," said Solidum.

He said the development of the app was a product of the coordination of the Philippine Institute of Volcanology and Seismology (PHIVOLCS), the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG), the Office of Civil Defense (OCD), and the World Bank.

Ndiamé Diop, World Bank Country Director for the Philippines, Malaysia, Thailand, and Brunei said the PlanSmart Ready to Rebuild app is just the first of a series of planning tools that are being developed under the PlanSmart platform.

"This is an opportunity to continue highlighting the importance of access to risk information to support comprehensive hazard and risk assessments and data sharing among national government agencies, LGUs, and the public for science-based planning and investments programming," said Diop.

DILG Sec. Benhur Abalos, Jr., for

DILG Sec. Benhur Abalos, Jr., for his part, urged the LGUs to maximize the use of PlanSmart Ready to Rebuild app in every aspect of their respective disaster risk management – recovery and rehabilitation, preparedness, response, and prevention processes, mechanisms, and strategies.

"For us to be able to effectively and efficiently utilize the PlanSmart Ready to Rebuild application, I am also encouraging our LGUs to populate the baseline data in the GeoRiskPH Integrated Platform to enrich the database of the platform," he said.

The PlanSmart Ready to Rebuild launch also heralds the rollout of capacity building activities to enable LGUs, particularly data managers, DRRM officers, planning officers, and other staff involved in disaster rehabilitation and recovery programs, to use the app for the creation of their local RRPs.

For its pilot run, the training program intends to equip more than 400 participants from 137 LGUs in the National Capital Region, Region IV-A (CALABARZON), Region V (Bicol), Region VII (Central Visayas), and Region XIII (CARAGA).

LGU participants in the pilot run will include R2R Program graduates, those with existing GeoRiskPH Memorandum of Agreements with DOST-PHIVOLCS, and those located in areas that were identified by the Cabinet Cluster on Climate Change Adaptation, Mitigation, and Disaster Risk Reduction as vulnerable to impacts of climate change and disasters.

CSC EYES REWARD FOR GOV'T CONTRACTUALS

The Civil Service Commission (CSC) is eyeing a "preferential rating system" for contractual and job order (JO) government workers who have been serving in their respective agencies for a long time, for them to be absorbed as full-time civil servants should they take the civil service examinations.

CSC chair Karlo Nograles disclosed during the agency's swift budget deliberations at the House committee on appropriations on Thursday that there are a total of 642,077 workers in the government serving under the contract of service (COS) and JO arrangements as of its June 30 data.

Of that total, Nograles said 107,409 of COS and JO workers were from national government agencies; 487,149 in local

governments; 22,937 in state universities and colleges; 6,593 in local water districts; and 17,979 in government-owned and -controlled corporations.

Limitations

During the budget hearing, Rep. France Castro of ACT Teachers party list asked Nograles if the CSC has any proposal to Congress to lessen the number of COS and JO workers.

Nograles responded that while the CSC always wanted to absorb those workers under COS and JO, he noted limitations on why they can't be absorbed by their respective offices.

One limitation, he said, was that local governments are allowed by law to have COS and JO workers but in national agencies, they are covered by the Department of Budget and Management (DBM) and the

Commission on Audit because their salaries are charged under the agency's maintenance and other operating expenses and not from its personnel services.

"So it's really under the issuance of the DBM and COA but this issuance is only until Dec. 31, 2022," Nograles told the House panel.

He explained that by Dec. 31, COS and JO state workers should be absorbed by their respective agencies, although he noted that most positions in government offices require that the worker must be a civil service exam passer, which was another limitation that the commission saw.

Plus points

Because of this, Nograles said he and CSC Commissioners Aileen Lizada and Ryan Alvin Acosta have discussed giving a "preferential reward system" wherein COS and JO workers who have been in government offices for several years, would be given "plus points" once they take their civil service examinations.

Under this system, Nograles explained that this could boost the COS and JO workers' chances of getting 80 percent in their exam scores, making them eligible for certain government positions. The passing score of 80 percent is applicable to all levels of the civil service exams.

The additional points will be credited based on the number of years the COS and JO workers have in their respective government offices.

"So, they still need to get the civil service exam and should they take it but fail to get an 80 [percent], there would be a number of points [to be added to their raw scores] equivalent to the number of years they served," Nograles pointed out. INQ




