

MUKHANG nakakita na ng kakampi ang mga resort owner at residents ng Lian, Batangas sa pamunuan ngayon ng Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) sa katushan ni Usecc Benny Antiporda na hindi naman maikakaila na dati ring mamamahayag.

Kay Usecc Antiporda kasi nila naramdamang tunay na pagmamalasakit matapos tugunan kaagad ang ka-

Lumiham na rin aniya

sila sa tanggapan ni Mayor Isagani Bolompo upang humiling ng kopya ng pam-publikong pagdinig kung mayroon man bago ipasa ang ordinansa na dati'y P5 lamang subalit itinaas sa P25 kada tao.

Gayunman, wala pa aniyang tugon ang munisipalidad sa kanilang liham na malinaw na paglabag sa umiiral na batas sa ilalim ng R.A. 6713 o ang Code of Conduct and Ethical Standards for Public Officials and Employees.

Batay aniya sa huling impormasyong ibinahagi sa kanila ng lokal na pamahalaan, nanakaw umano ang tinatayang P500,000 pondo ng environmental user's fee subalit duda sila rito dahil wala namang inihaing rekalamo o kaso ang munisipyo.

Bukod dito ibinahagi na rin ng grupo kay Usecc Antiporda ang umano'y

pagkakaloob ng permiso ng munisipalidad sa development at quarrying sa kanilang lalawigan kahit walang Environmental Compliance Certificate (ECC).

Nagpasalamat din ang grupo kay Usecc Antiporda dahil kaagad na nagpada-la ng kinatawan sa kanilang lalawigan upang suriin ang lugar at siyasatin ang kanilang hinaing.

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HINDI TATANTANAN NG TASK FORCE POGI ANG PAGLABAN SA ILLEGAL WILDLIFE TRADE



hindimagbabago ang paninindigan ng gobyerno upang mabigyan ng proteksyon ang wildlife at mahinto ang illegal trafficking at maaresto ang nagbebenta ng wildlife species.

Writ of kalikasan sought to protect West PHL Sea

APETITION was filed on Tuesday before the Supreme Court seeking the issuance of a writ of kalikasan to compel concerned government agencies to rehabilitate and protect the West Philippine Sea, particularly Panatag Shoal, Ayungin Shoal and Panganiban Reef from environmental damage due to poaching and other illegal activities being undertaken by Chinese nationals.

In a 35-page petition, the members of the Kalayaan Palawan Farmers and Fisherfolk Association (KPFafa) and the Integrated Bar of the Philippines (IBP) is seeking the same relief that the Court issued in 2008 when it ordered all concerned government agencies to coordinate for the cleanup, restoration and preservation of the Manila Bay.

The petitioners used as basis the documents submitted by the Philippine government in the interstate arbitration proceedings under Annex VII to the 1982 United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea (Unclos) as well as the 2016 award by the tribunal in the South China Sea Arbitration, which established that foreign poachers and foreign construction and land-reclamation entities have caused massive environmental damage in Philippine waters and the Philippine exclusive economic zone (EEZ).

The Philippines won the arbitration on July 12, 2016, but the Philippine government has failed or refuses to enforce the ruling in a manner that is beneficial to Filipinos, particularly local fisherfolk, the petitioners said.

"The fishing communities in Palawan, together with the Integrated Bar of the Philippines, now seek a writ of kalikasan and writ of continuing mandamus from this Honorable Court, in assertion of their constitutional right to a balanced and healthful ecology, their public right to obtain the prosecution of violations of Philippine

environmental laws in the Philippine EEZ and their right to prevent the further destruction of the marine environment in the Philippine EEZ," the petition read.

The petitioners accused foreign fishermen and other entities of harvesting threatened and endangered species and using cyanide and explosives in Panatag Shoal and Ayungin Shoal, as well as undertaking illegal construction activities in Panganiban Reef.

They noted that the SCS arbitral tribunal has upheld the Philippine government's claim that Ayungin Shoal, Panganiban Reef and Panatag Shoal are well within the Philippine EEZ; thus, the country's environmental laws are required to be enforced in the said areas.

"Chinese fishermen harvested endangered and threatened species and used cyanide and explosives in their fishing. Foreign entities engaged by Chinese authorities constructed and damaged coral reefs in the process. The marine environment and resources in the areas were damaged severely and extensively in spite of adequate Philippine laws to protect them. Clearly, the damage is brought upon by lack of enforcement of Philippine environmental laws by respondents," they claimed.

Under Presidential Decree 1599, the petitioners said the government is mandated to exercise its sovereign right to conserve and manage the natural resources, preserve the marine environment, and prevent and control pollution in the Philippine EEZ.

Among those named as respondents in the petition for the issuance of a writ of kalikasan and a writ of continuing mandamus are Environment Secretary Roy A. Cimatu, Agriculture Secretary Emmanuel F. Piñol and Philippine Coast Guard chief Admiral Elson E. Hermogino.

Co-counsel with the IBP is the Free Legal Assistance Group headed by La Salle Law School Dean Jose Manuel Diokno.



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Ban plastics

A FORMER chairman of the Metropolitan Manila Development Authority (MMDA) has called on government offices and agencies to gradually ban the use of plastics and do regular clean-up activities.

The ex-MMDA chair, Francis Tolentino, aired the call as part of a serious and concerted effort to encourage a culture that cares for the environment, which is being threatened by climate change.

Tolentino's remark coincided with the start of this year's Earth Month commemoration. Earth Day will be celebrated on April 22.

"Our ultimate goal should be the total ban of plastics nationwide, but we have to start somewhere, and government is a good place to start," said the soft-spoken but workaholic Tolentino.

We agree with Tolentino, when he said that the government cannot expect the citizens to value cleanliness if we who serve do not actively implement pro-environment measures.

"An effective ban should focus on single-use plastics, which include plastic bags, coffee cups, bottled water, straws, coffee stirrers, and food packaging or wrappers," said Tolentino, a senatorial bet in the May 13 polls.

A 2015 report by the United Nations Environment Program revealed that about half of all of the plastic waste that ends up in the oceans comes from five Asian countries.

These are China, Indonesia, Philippines, Thailand and Vietnam. Of the five countries, only China is not a member of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN).

Specialists and experts across the globe agree that the continued use of plastics would have untold consequences for tourism, fisheries and other industries.

Let's stop manufacturing and using single-use plastics if we are to save the Planet Earth.

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SAVE OUR SHOALS — PINOY FISHERS

THE Supreme Court was asked yesterday to compel the government to protect disputed shoals in the West Philippine Sea where Chinese fishermen have reportedly been harvesting marine resources.

In a 34-page petition filed through the Integrated Bar of the Philippines, a group of fishermen from Palawan and Zambales asked the SC to issue a writ of Kalikasan and writ of continuing mandamus ordering the government to protect, preserve and rehabilitate the environment in Scarborough or Panatag Shoal, Ayungin Shoal and Mischief Reef or Panganiban Reef.

They sought relief from the SC against what they called "neglect of performance of the duties of the government in violation of environmental laws resulting in environmental destruction of damage in the shoals."

They said the government failed to act on activities of Chinese fishermen in the disputed areas, which violate the country's environmental laws.

"Chinese fishermen harvested endangered and threatened species and used cyanide and explosives in their fishing... the marine environment and resources in the abovementioned areas were damaged severely and extensively in spite of adequate Philippine laws to protect them. Clearly, the damage is brought upon by lack of enforcement of Philippine environmental laws by respondents," they argued.

Petitioners also cited the island-building activities at Panganiban reef.

"Based on compelling evidence, expert reports, and

critical assessment of Chinese claims described above, the Tribunal (international arbitral court) has no doubt that China's artificial island-building activities on the seven reefs in the Spratly Islands have caused devastating and long-lasting damage to the marine environment," they added.

Giant clams

The harvesting by Chinese vessels of giant clams in the Scarborough or Panatag Shoal is a violation of Philippine territory and sovereignty, Malacanang said.

"Siyempre (of course), natural because if it's our territory, therefore it is an affront to our territory and to our sovereignty," Presidential Spokesman Salvador Panelo said in a Palace briefing yesterday.

Panelo said Foreign Secretary Teddyboy Locsin will take legal action after filing a note verbale against the Chinese activities that endanger maritime resources at the shoal claimed by the Philippines.

However, Panelo refused to preempt Locsin's next move because "that is his territory."

Meanwhile, Panelo said that "China, as far as it is concerned, it owns the vast South China Sea, hence, it will be performing acts of ownership or sovereignty over those areas.

"In other words, they are just being consistent with themselves. Eh tayo rin, we have to be consistent with ours. As far as we are concerned, that is ours so we will be objecting to any intrusion into our own territory," added Panelo.

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IBP, fisherfolk groups ask high court to order govt to enforce laws protecting West Philippine Sea

MEMBERS OF farmers and fisherfolks groups, together with the Integrated Bar of the Philippines (IBP), have asked the Supreme Court (SC) to direct the government to enforce laws protecting the country's territories in the West Philippine Sea (WPS). In a petition for the issuance of Writ of Kalikasan, the Kalayaan Palawan Farmers, Fisherfolk Association, and the IBP said the government has refused to take legal action against violations of environmental laws committed specifically by Chinese at the Panatag Shoal (Scarborough Shoal), Ayungin Shoal (Second Thomas Shoal) and Panganiban Reef (Mischief Reef). Respondents in the case are Environment Secretary Roy A. Cimatu, Agriculture Secretary Emmanuel F. Piñol, Philippine Coast Guard Admiral Elson E. Hermogino, Philippine Navy Flag Officer-in-Command Robert A. Empredrad, and Bureau of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources National Director Eduardo B. Gongona, among others. "Respondents have failed to perform their duties as mandated in the above-mentioned environmental laws and regulations. Petitioners have no other plain, speedy and adequate remedy as Petitioners are complaining of acts by the government agencies themselves who are supposed to be upholding Philippine environmental laws and protecting the environment and resources in Philippine territory," the petitioners said. They cited, among others, the Philippine Fisheries Code of 1998 which mandates the government to prosecute perpetrators of illegal acts. They also noted that the July 2016 international arbitral ruling won by the Philippines found that Chinese fishing vessels have been involved in harvesting threatened and endangered species in Panatag and Ayungin Shoals. It also found island-building activities led by China at the Panganiban Reef. They also said that in May 2013, two Chinese vessels accompanied by two Chinese Marine Surveillance ships were spotted near Ayungin Shoal gathering corals and clams and undertaking dredging activities. —

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Compel govt to protect disputed islands, SC urged

A GROUP of fishermen asked the Supreme Court (SC) on Tuesday to compel the government to protect disputed shoals in the West Philippine Sea (South China Sea), where Chinese fishermen have reportedly been harvesting marine resources.

In a 34-page petition for a "Writ of Kalikasan" to order the government to protect, preserve and rehabilitate the environment in Scarborough (Panatag) Shoal, Ayungin (Second Thomas) Shoal and Mischief Reef (Panganiban) Reef, the group of fishermen from Palawan and Zambales named the Department of Environment and

Natural Resources, Department of Agriculture, Philippine Navy, Philippine Coast Guard, Philippine National Police and Department of Justice as respondents.

The petitioners, represented by the Integrated Bar of the Philippines, stated that Ayungin Shoal and Panganiban Reef are part of the exclusive economic zone

(EEZ) of the Philippines on the basis of the 2016 decision of the Permanent Court of Arbitration in The Hague.

Scarborough Shoal is likewise part of the EEZ under Republic Act 9522 or the "Philippine Baselines Law."

They argued that since the three areas are part of the country's EEZ, these should be covered by environmental laws of the country such as the Philippine Fisheries Code.

They argued that they "have no other plain, speedy and adequate remedy as petitioners are complaining of acts by the government agencies themselves who are supposed to be upholding Philippine environmental laws and protecting the environment and resources

in Philippine territory."

"Respondents have failed to perform their duties as mandated in the above-mentioned environmental laws and regulations," they pointed out.

"Chinese fishermen harvested endangered and threatened species and used cyanide and explosives in their fishing... the marine environment and resources in the abovementioned areas were damaged severely and extensively in spite of adequate Philippine laws to protect them. Clearly, the damage is brought upon by lack of enforcement of Philippine environmental laws by respondents," they added.

The group also slammed the island-building done by China on Panganiban Reef.
